And now, to wit, February 20th, 1914,


it appearing to the Court that a Bill of Complaint on the part of the United States of America, in the above entitled case, has been duly filed in this Court; that a chancery subpoena, issued pursuant to said complaint, was served upon the above named Respondent; that said Respondent has not ~~entered an answer~~ or filed an answer thereto; and that the United States has entered a decree Pro Confesso against said Respondent;

On motion of E. Lovry Humes, United States Attorney, it is therefore ordered, adjudged, and decreed that the order and decree of the **Court of Common Pleas of Cambria County, Pennsylvania,**

made on the <sup>24</sup> day of August, 1904, admitting said Respondent as a citizen of the United States, be, and the same is, hereby vacated, annulled, and set aside as having been illegally procured; and it is further ordered that said Respondent deliver the certificate of citizenship, issued to him pursuant to said order and decree admitting him to citizenship, to the Clerk of this Court; and it is further ordered that said Clerk mark the said certificate "cancelled and vacated" and file it with the records of this Court; without prejudice, however, to the right of said Respondent to apply again for admission as a citizen of the United States.

To the Honorable the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of the County of Warren,  
at a Court holden in and for said County, the second day of  
August A. D. 1904;

The petition of Salvatore Sarravalli, a native of  
Italy  
now residing in Johnstown, in the  
County of Warren and State of Pennsylvania, respectfully showeth:

That your petitioner arrived in the United States of America, to-wit: At the port of New York, in the State of New York, on or about the 30th day of March A. D. 1895, being then under the age of eighteen years, to-wit, of the age of twelve years, and is now above the age of twenty-one years; that he has resided within the limits and jurisdiction of the United States for five years last past, and for one year last past within the State of Pennsylvania, and that during more than two years last past, it has been his intention to become a citizen of the United States; that he has never borne any hereditary title, or been of any of the orders of nobility in

Italy from whence he came; that he does not disbelieve in nor is he opposed to all organized government; that he is not a member of, or affiliated with, any organization entertaining and teaching such disbelief or opposition; that he does not advocate or teach the duty, necessity or propriety of the unlawful assaulting or killing of any specific individual or of officers generally, of the Government of the United States or of any other organized government, because of his or their official character; and that he has not violated any of the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled "An Act to regulate the Immigration of Aliens into the United States," approved March 3, 1903. He therefore prays your Honor to admit him to become a citizen of the United States of America, agreeably to the Act of Congress in such case made and provided.

Witness: Salvatore Sarravalli

I, Salvatore Sarravalli, the petitioner above named, do in my solemn oath declare that the contents of my petition are true; that for upwards of two years next preceding it has been my bona fide intention to become a citizen of the United States; that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and that I do absolutely and entirely renounce and abjure all allegiance and fidelity to every foreign prince, potentate, state and sovereignty whatsoever, and particularly to the King of Italy of whom I was a subject.

Oath of Witnesses

we Charles Perry and A. Monteverde do swear that the petitioner above named has resided in the United States of America three years next preceding his arriving at the age of twenty-one years, and continued to reside therein to the time of making this application, and has resided within the limits and under the jurisdiction of the United States of America five years at least, and within the State of Pennsylvania one year at least; that he now resides in Johnstown (South Ward) Pennsylvania;

that during that time he has behaved as a man of good moral character, attached to the principles of the Constitution of the United States, and well disposed to the good order and happiness of the same; and that to the best of deponent's knowledge and belief, it has been for two years next preceding this application the bona fide intention of the petitioner to become a citizen of the United States; that the applicant or petitioner does not disbelieve in, nor is he opposed to, all organized government; that he is not a member of, or affiliated with, any organization entertaining and teaching such disbelief or opposition; that he does not advocate or teach the duty, necessity or propriety of the unlawful assaulting or killing of any specific individual or of officers generally, of the Government of the United States or of any other organized government, because of his or their official character; and that he has not violated any of the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled "An Act to regulate the Immigration of Aliens into the United States," approved March 3, 1903.
