
Future Farmers Of America



Producing a profound effect upon the student's learning of a particular language, the language laboratory helps him in pronunciation of the specific tongue by the use of tapes, recorded in the native language.

Films of graded difficulty and other audio-visual materials also increase the student's general knowledge and comprehension of the language.



In their senior year, the students study trigonometry. This year a new math elective, advanced math, was offered to seniors.

Science



Biology furnishes the student with information about himself and other organisms affecting his daily life. It also provides a thorough background for more advanced studies in this field of science.


Chemistry acquaints the student with the complex world of elements and chemical substances.




Studies
