Frill and Frown Prepares Comedy

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Robert Goldsand ^{3/25/50} To Present Concert At College April 20

Robert Goldsand, internationally known pianist and head of the piano department at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, will appear at Lycoming College April 20 as the fourth and final artist on the 1949-50 Artist and Lecture Series.

At the present time Mr. Goldsand is on tour giving a series of concerts encompassing the works of Chopin.

The Viennese-born artist began the study of the violin at the age of four and one year later started to study the piano. At 10 he made his debut in a piano recital in Vienna and at 12 was soloist with the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra.

During 27 years of international concert appearances—Goldsand is now 37—his prestige has steadily mounted until today he is recognized as one of the outstanding established exponents of piano literature and one of its most brilliant performers.

Mrs. Hazel Dorey, instructor in piano at Lycoming College, studied under Mr. Goldsand for three years. The artist will be a guest of Mr. and Mrs. Dorey while he is in Williamsport.

The piano concert is scheduled at 8.15 p.m. in the Clarke Building and some seats will be available to non-college persons.

Brig. Gen. H. H. Whitney, ^{4/2/48} Distinguished Alumnus of Local College, Dies at 82

The name of one of the oldest and most distinguished graduates of Lycoming College was crossed from the alumni roster this week with announcement of the death of Brig. Gen. Henry Howard Whitney.

The general died Sunday in Madison, N.J. He was 82 years old.

A graduate of West Point, class of 1892, he was the son of a Methodist minister of the Central Pennsylvania Conference. He was born at Glen Hope and attended Dickinson Seminary, forerunner of Lycoming College.

Graduated 65 Years Ago

He was graduated from the Seminary with the class of 1884.

General Whitney was one of the heroes of the Spanish-American War. When that war broke out in April, 1898, he was a young lieutenant in the 4th Artillery of the U.S. Regulars. (Andrew Siegel, a former prothonotary of Lycoming County, served under him in the 1890s.)

He was selected by President

McKinley to land on Spanish-held Caibarien, Cuba, penetrate the jungle interior, and make contact with the Cuban General Gomez, insurgent leader.

To execute that mission, he disguised himself as a kerosene salesman. Although the Spanish arrested him three times in two months, he managed to escape each time. Finally, by June 15, 1898, he got back to the United States with maps of the island's harbors, fortifications and roads.

He retired as a brigadier general before World War II.
