

SEM YIELDS TO WYOMING SEM OUTFIT

After four consecutive victories, the pace finally got Dickinson Seminary Saturday night, when the Gold and White capitulated before Wyoming Seminary, 48-36, at Kingston.

It was a repetition of the Dickinson-Wyoming games of previous years on the small Kingston floor, and Paul Smith's varsity squad took the usual body beating.

Sem made an impressive start but slumped in the second and third quarters and then found its comeback efforts in the closing quarter futile. Dempsey, however, matched Riofski, Wyoming forward for high point honors with eleven points.

SEM CLEANS UP ON YORK COLLEGIATE

Dempsey Rolls in 16 Points As Gold and White Checks in With Sixth Victory on Overnight Trip.

Dickinson Seminary applied the finishing touches to its rout of southern Pennsylvania prep school opposition Saturday by annihilating York Collegiate Institute, 38-19, on the York boards.

The overnight trip netted the Gold and White its fifth and sixth victories of the season, offsetting a lone reverse at the hands of Wyoming Seminary which may be avenged in a return game here a week from Friday.

In conquering Harrisburg Academy and Y. C. I. on successive nights, Dickinson rolled up a total of 81 points and held the two opponents to 37.

The Seminaricians lived up to their sobriquet of "iron men" by playing 80 minutes of ball with only one substitute, Frank O'Brien replacing Jack Stokes in the final period of the York game when the Girardville boy was banished on personal fouls.

York issued its only threat to the Gold and White in the wee minutes of the game, but Sem managed to pull ahead by 11-7 as the first period closed, and thereafter the Roses wilted by degrees. At the half the count was 23-9.

Sem eased up in the third quarter as York trimmed the lead to 29-17, but Paul Smith passed the order for full speed in the closing period and the Roses were left in the lurch, despite the removal of Stokes on personals.

Bernard "Peanut" Dempsey was a thorn in the petals of the Roses as he shot with unerring accuracy on the break and piled up 16 points. Whenever the going got tough Dempsey came through with timely field goals that took the heart out of the York quintet.

On defense Staff Cassell and Charley Luty checked their men in a flawless manner, and Howd Springman contributed his usual quota of double deckers.
