

Seminary Defeats Frosh of Western Maryland by 13-0

Westminster, Md., Nov. 19.—Earl Z. McKay's Dickinson Seminary football team ended its 1938 grid season in a blaze of glory, here today by rushing across two fourth quarter touchdowns to defeat the Western Maryland Freshmen, 13-0.

The victory constituted the third in the last four starts, the other being a scoreless deadlock against Wyoming Seminary, after the Goldbugs got off to a slow start.

Played on a converted hockey field that was ankle-deep in mud and water, the contest was Dickinson Seminary's from start to finish, the Hilltoppers boasting a wide statistical advantage.

Play during the first half took place mostly within the two 30-yard lines, Dickinson gaining 40 yards from scrimmage and Western Maryland netting 37 up until intermission. It was during the second canto that the McKaymen finally clicked through the air. Two passes netted 20 and 8 yards, but the ground game bogged down, and the half ended scoreless.

Freeman Scores Twice

Early in the fourth quarter, Seminary recovered a Frosh fumble at midfield, and immediately carried down the wet gridiron to a score. With Miller and Stofer alternating behind the superb blocking of Kranish, Dickinson registered four first downs before Jack Freeman took the ball into pay territory. Stofer rushed the extra point.

Shortly afterward, the Gold and White again took the oval at midfield, and another sustained drive put the game on ice. Miller, Freeman, and Stofer again did the most effective ball carrying, with Kranish, blocking back, paving the way, and Freeman crossed the goal line for the second time in the afternoon to make the score 13-0.

The defensive play of the Dickinson line was exceptionally brilliant, the yearlings being able to successfully penetrate no position.

The observance will close with the ensemble singing "America, Oh Wondrous Land," written by an alumnus of the school, Harry Webb Farrington.

Junior College Library Grows

The library of Williamsport Dickinson Seminary and Junior College has been steadily growing during recent years. New addition of valuable books have resulted from private gifts and Carnegie Fund awards.

The Rev. Morris E. Swartz, D.D., pastor of Newberry M. E. Church, presented the library a 12-volume set of "The Encyclopedia of Religion and Ethics." This has been an outstanding contribution to the library facilities of the department of religion.

In addition, books valued at \$250 have been purchased through the Carnegie Fund. This Carnegie allotment comes as a result of competition with 450 junior colleges, from which 92 were selected for special award. Williamsport Dickinson was given the full award of \$3,000, which is being expended for the development of the junior college library facilities.

S. Latourette; "The Doomsday Men," by J. B. Priestly; "The Yearling," by Marjorie Rawlings; "Science for the Citizen," by Lancelot Hogben, and "A Southerner Discovers the South," by Jonathan Daniels.
