## Dr. Rustin to Give Second Address At College Chapel

Dr. John W. Rustin will speak this morning in the second of three chapel meetings highlighting the observance of Religion-in-Life Week at Lycoming College. His subject will be "A Sustaining Philosophy of Life."

Dr. Rustin spoke on "What is Religion" at the first chapel exercise yesterday. According to the pastor of the Bellemont Methodist Church of Nashville, Tenn., religion is "a long, slow process of growth of man trying to find his Creator." He stated that "we climb on the shoulders of those who have gone before us," and that the main ingredient of this climb is love, exemplified by Christ, our living example of "that heavenly grace."

### Informal Discussion

Last evening Dr. Rustin expanded his ideas in an informal discussion in the Rich Hall Day Room built around the topic "Moral Standards in a Confused World for the Individual in the College Community." Showing the influence of Harry Emerson Fosdick, Dr. Rustin said that right is "anything that lifts human personality," while evil is "anything that degrades human personality." Pointing out that good and evil are relative matters he stated that to do the lesser of two goods is just as much sin as doing an evil, and that doing the better of two evils is not a sin, as he sees it.

He also stated that "moral issues of old are not the moral issues of today. It is now harder to draw the line on issues." Drawing upon his 14-year pastorate in Washington, he stated that people want someone who will rule them, as they are tired of making decisions. He also expressed a desire to train scientists in some field of high thought to complement the great power at their disposal.

Also scheduled for today are two panels composed of local citizens in the Rich Hall Day Room and Lounge on the topic "The Role of Laymen and Women in the Home and Community."

## Temple University Prof Suspended

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Temple University announced yesterday it has suspended Dr. Barrows Dunham, professor of philosophy, for his failure to answer questions before the House Un-American Activities Committee.

Dr. Robert L. Johnson, Temple president, in a letter mailed to Dunham, told the head of the university's philosophy department "you have deliberately created a doubt as to your loyalty status." Dunham declined to answer questions before the committee, probing possible Communist infiltration in the country's education system, beyond his name, age and address. He declined to answer questions about his occupation.

Dunham termed the House group's investigation "a medieval inquisition." He was not available for comment on the university's action.

## Name Educator To Speak at College Dinner

A Pennsylvania State College official will be the principal speaker at the annual Greater Lycoming Banquet and Dance on the Lycoming campus Saturday night.

Dr. Marion R. Trabue, dean of the department of education at Penn State, was announced as the speaker today by Don L. Larrabee, chairman.

Dr. Trabue's message is expected to be of interest to Lycoming's alumni and friends because of the proposed addition of education courses to the college curriculum.

A member of the board of directors of Lycoming College, Dr. Seth W. Russel, assistant dean of the school of liberal arts at Penn State, will be the toastmaster for the evening.
