

DR. LONG ADDRESSES MONTGOMERY LIONS

President of Dickinson Seminary Discusses "Our Relations to Young People" at Luncheon Meeting of Club This Week.

Montgomery, Jan. 19.—Dr. John W. Long, president of Dickinson Seminary, addressed the members of the local Lions club at their regular luncheon, Monday noon, on the popular question of "Our Relations to Young People."

He stated that the young persons of today take liberties which the past generations did not take or enjoy. As the editor of the Cornell College Newspaper has stated, "The responsibility of determining the right and wrong traits for young folks rightfully belongs to the older folks."

Dr. Long went on to say that this is a great day for alibis. All sorts of excuses are given for the actions of the young persons. Too much emphasis should not be placed upon the doctrines of the scientist concerning the environment and inheritance guiding the lives of the younger generations, although these and other doctrines are true to a certain degree. The young person should not be taught that no matter what his actions are, he is not individually responsible for things which he does. They are still more susceptible than the older folks to the belief that the older generations called Calvinism.

He said too, that the attitude taken by people must be either to "let them go" or to concern ourselves and try to interest the young people by providing the right type of amusement and recreation, such as instituting libraries and community houses by which young persons may gain in knowledge and learn to live cleaner and have more wholesome minds and bodies.

Following the address, the weekly issue of the "Peptimist" was read by Reynier Soulsbury.
