

Sem Flays Frosh, 40-12

McKay's Goldmen Outplay Their Yearling Opponents, As Allen Paces Offensive

Hilltoppers Take Most Decisive Win of Season on Carlisle College Court

 Harrisburg, Feb. 8.—With only a slight let-up in the scoring potency they evinced the night before in a victory over Wyoming Seminary, Earl McKay's Goldmen took an overwhelming decision from Dickinson Frosh on the Carlisle College court last night, 40-12.

Although the record of the frosh team is not sufficient to attach any titanic significance to the victory, the margin was such that the superiority and general class of the local junior college team cannot be questioned.

Another Allen Night

It was Cliff Allen, mighty scoring threat, again leading the Sem pack, with Ray Schneider lapsing into defensive obscurity after his big evening against Wyoming. Bill Bowers and Sub Johnny Morrocco had their eyes on the hoop, too.

In the first quarter Sem scored almost at will, with the Frosh waiting until the second chapter to rack up a tally. When the first ten minutes were over the McKay charges had flipped 13 points worth of buckets.

Midway in the second frame Pollock sank two fouls for the first home marks. Meanwhile, Sem was continuing a mild scoring rampage to lead 23-10 when the half closed.

Subs Used at Large

Substitutions had flooded the Sem line-up during the first half, but the starters were back for the final leg. Bowers and Allen were brilliant on a defense that developed into an effective offense.

They intercepted passes to dribble the length of the floor to score. On one particular shot Allen grabbed a Frosh heave to dribble into the corner of the

opposition, but before he went out of bounds he flipped a pretty shot over his shoulder. After he got up from the floor, his mates told him that the shot had been good, as if the cheers of the crowd were not sufficient evidence.

Quarters Shortened

The Frosh were a little stronger by comparison in the latter half, or the Dickinson attack was relaxed. At the request of the Frosh mentor, the last two quarters were limited to 8 minutes.

After the game the Sem team was taken to different fraternity houses on the Dickinson campus where George Long, son of the junior college president, made rooming reservations for the Gold squad.

This week the Hilltoppers are slated to meet Juniata Frosh on the home court, but developments point to a postponement. There will definitely be a trip to Cornell for the Goldmen, Friday, when they will engage the Big Red Jayvees.

CHEMISTRY SHOW THURSDAY EVENING AT JUNIOR COLLEGE

Presentation Another in the Lecture and Entertainment Series at School.

The traveling chemistry show of the Franklin Institute of Philadelphia is being brought to Williamsport Dickinson Junior College Thursday evening of this week at 8.15 o'clock in the Dickinson gymnasium, by the lecture and entertainment committee of the college.

The chemistry show is a series of scientific demonstrations for the general public by practical chemists who know what will appeal to the average audience. They show what black magic was and how alchemists plied their arts. They show the difference between hot and cold fire, how a coat of many colors can be produced in one dye bath and where our perfumes come from.

More than 200,000 persons have seen the chemistry show which has been carried by truck many thousand miles from Michigan to Connecticut and Virginia.

Thirty-nine experiments which will be on the stage of the Junior College gymnasium tell a living, practical story of chemistry. This story is not a lecture, but is a show of action, thrills and excitement, presented in non-technical language that young and old, men and women and even children understand.

The chemistry show is a presentation of the lecture and entertainment series of the Junior College under the direction of the faculty and student committee headed by Miss Lulu Richardson.

The general public is invited to attend.
