

W. E. Schimpff, 1875-1945

William E. Schimpff died just a few days after the completion of our freshman year. But his spirit of "You'd better work at it" and his own willingness to work have stayed with us and today we would dedicate this book to his memory.

Many mourned his passing; not only those who responded to his "You're at the Board" in mathematics and physics classes, but those others who knew him only as another faculty member. All recognized a great loss in his dying.

We shall never forget his extreme personal interest in everyone. He had a story or an anecdote apropos to every situation. His worldly knowledge was almost infinite and as many of us have marvelled, "He knew his stuff."

Mr. Schimpff had a phenomenal faith in human nature. He helped anyone who needed aid, never questioning whether or not the student deserved the extra time. He was genuinely congenial and his sincerity was unbounded. He knew everyone by his first name after only a few days of school. A student never failed to go to Mr. Schimpff for assistance in classroom problems or in an everyday disturbance.

Keystone and the Class of 1946 will never forget him. We remember him especially with the publication of this 1946 Nokomian.



Soon the days of hazing were over, with the result of mutual friendship among all Keystoneians. A party in the gym highlighted the end of Freshman Days. We were now one big family.

Our class officers were soon chosen. These honored freshmen included Walter Lewis, president; Jean Weber, vice-president; Ronald Hodgson, secretary; and Harry Morgan, treasurer.

But this is not the complete story of our freshman class. In February 1946 our number was augmented with about a hundred new students, all but a few of them veterans. With the enrollment of these new students, Keystone's population reached an all time high.

Thus another class of young men and women have pledged a loyalty to Keystone. It is with joy and affection that we reminisce on our Freshman Days. But, although they are gone forever, we can now look ahead, with relish, to the days when we'll be the dignified seniors . . . when we will be able to do the hazing instead of being hazed.





Under the leadership of the Rev. Edward E. Chipman, the Inter-Faith Fellowship was organized at Keystone this year.


