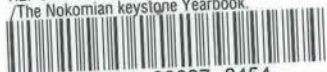

## Senior Class History

When we arrived upon the campus on September 23, 1946, we were immediately tagged as the largest freshman class (220 of us) to register at Keystone since the school's founding in time primeval. Hazing that first week was confined to non-veterans. After the confusion of the first week at college had subsided, the "lost my way" excuse was no longer valid for tardies so we buckled down under the supervision of our professors. Sadie Hawkin's Day was not observed that semester but no one seemed to mind. Freshman couples soon discovered that Keystone had a back campus as well as a front campus.

Keystone's Little Giants tied Wyoming Sem in the traditional football game on November 16. Despite several big snowfalls that winter, Keystone held classes as usual. The spring of 1947 ushered in softball and the second Lodge show, "The Pog-lers". Engineered by John Reid, the show featured caricatures of the faculty. "They didn't miss many" was Registrar Robert Rinehimer's classic remark. Remember Frank Giles, Ray Sarakauskas, and Buzz Bendock's rendition of "Cigareets, Whiskey, and Wild, Wild Women"?

Spring also saw the advent of political campaigns and the introduction of political parties. Ronny Long's Popular Party defeated Carl Kleckner's KEYPAC in an exciting, poster-cluttered campaign for Senior class president. Soon afterwards, William Dempsey defeated Ed Baker for Student Council head. The last poster campaign of the year was conducted by Joe Dinoto, Morgan Davis, and John McHenry in their three-cornered race for "Junior" Senior class president. Independent Party-backed Morgan Davis emerged victorious in the close contest.

Final exams caught everyone unprepared but after a hectic week of cramming we filled dozens of questionnaires with doodles and walked out of exam rooms with a prayer for a C. Then we packed our toothbrushes and headed for home—and vacation.

We returned to Keystone campus September 23, 1947. After we unpacked the toothbrush we had packed so hastily in May, we began to investigate the new situation. In our absence, a few plugging students had attended the summer semester and as a result, several students who had been admitted in February of 1947 were now members of our class, Randy Coe, Darrel Benson, and Jack Kline were a few who had caught up with us. A few familiar faces had been lost on transfers but most of us had returned to continue our studies.

The new freshman girls were eagerly absorbed by the male population; the Keystoneian even saw fit to chose six freshman beauties! Our second year also saw many changes in the "back campus" department. The girls in our class acquired new boy-friends as well as the "new look." Keys Honor Society was re-organized after being inactive since 1942. One of the stormy issues at hand was the resignation of the Student Budget Committee upon their declaration that their services were ineffective. The refusal of the administrative body to declare a half-holiday on "Home Coming Day" led to the effigy-burning of the five faculty members concerned. Only slight mention should be made of the decorations on the eve of "Home Coming Day" and the excitement of the "Hallowe'en Blitz."

The football season was satisfactorily concluded with the sound defeat of a determined Wyoming Sem squad by a valiant Little Giant eleven; the score was 13-0 when the final whistle blew. The new gym was completed in time for the reception of this year's basketball team.

The February class, consisting of 27 members, graduated February 2 following a graduation dinner held in their honor. This was the first mid-term Commencement in the history of the College. Spring again brought softball back to Mathewson Field but our minds were occupied with the impending graduation. The frantic scramble to make up credits for transfer reminded the vets in our class of an almost forgotten scramble for discharge points. Those of us who intend to continue our education began corresponding with the registrars of the large colleges and universities, while the others began to acquire the harried countenance of a disgruntled job-seeker.

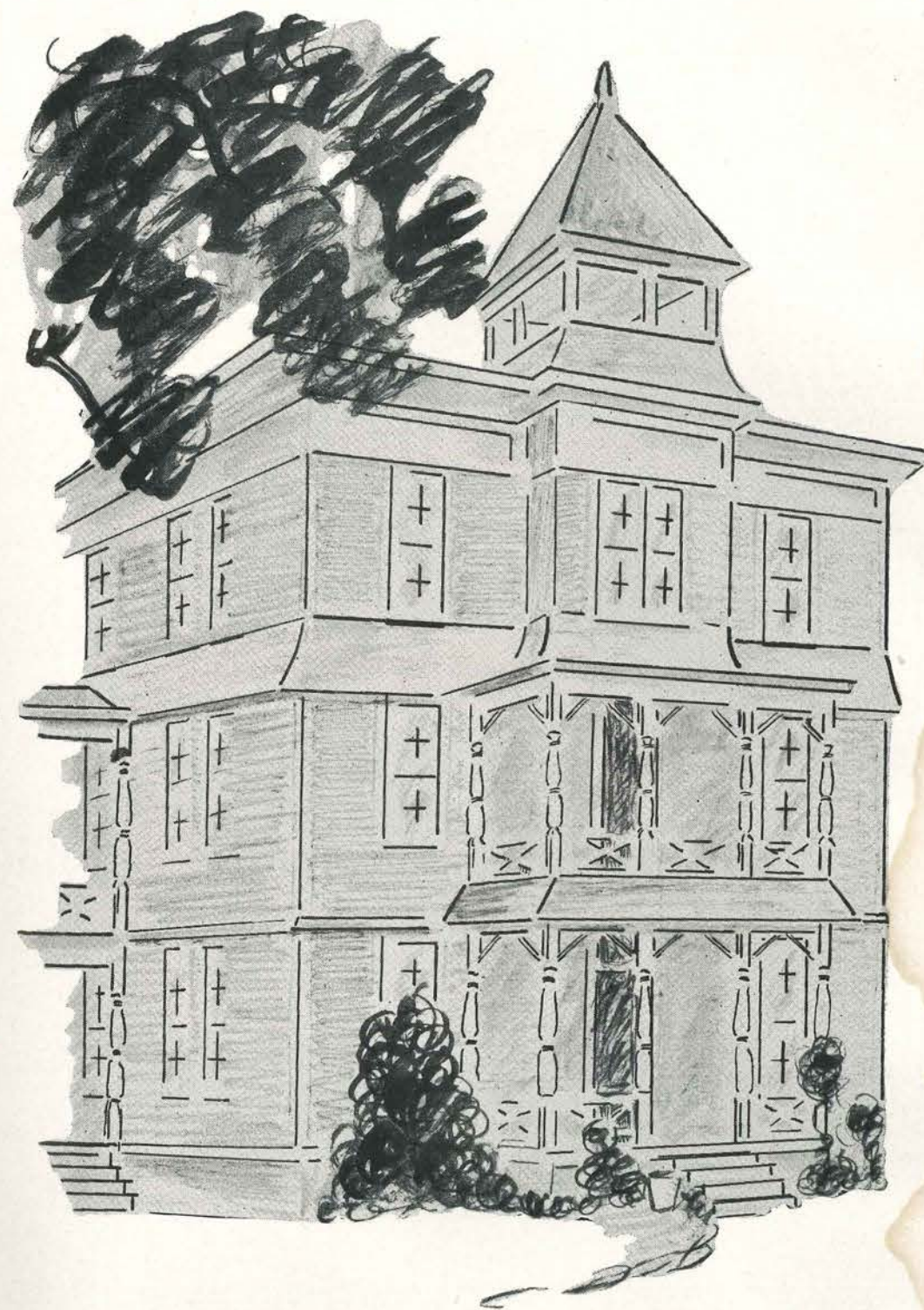

We made it through the hazing season with dink and pigtail and a large percentage of the class made it through finals with honors as Phi Theta Kappa membership rolls will show.

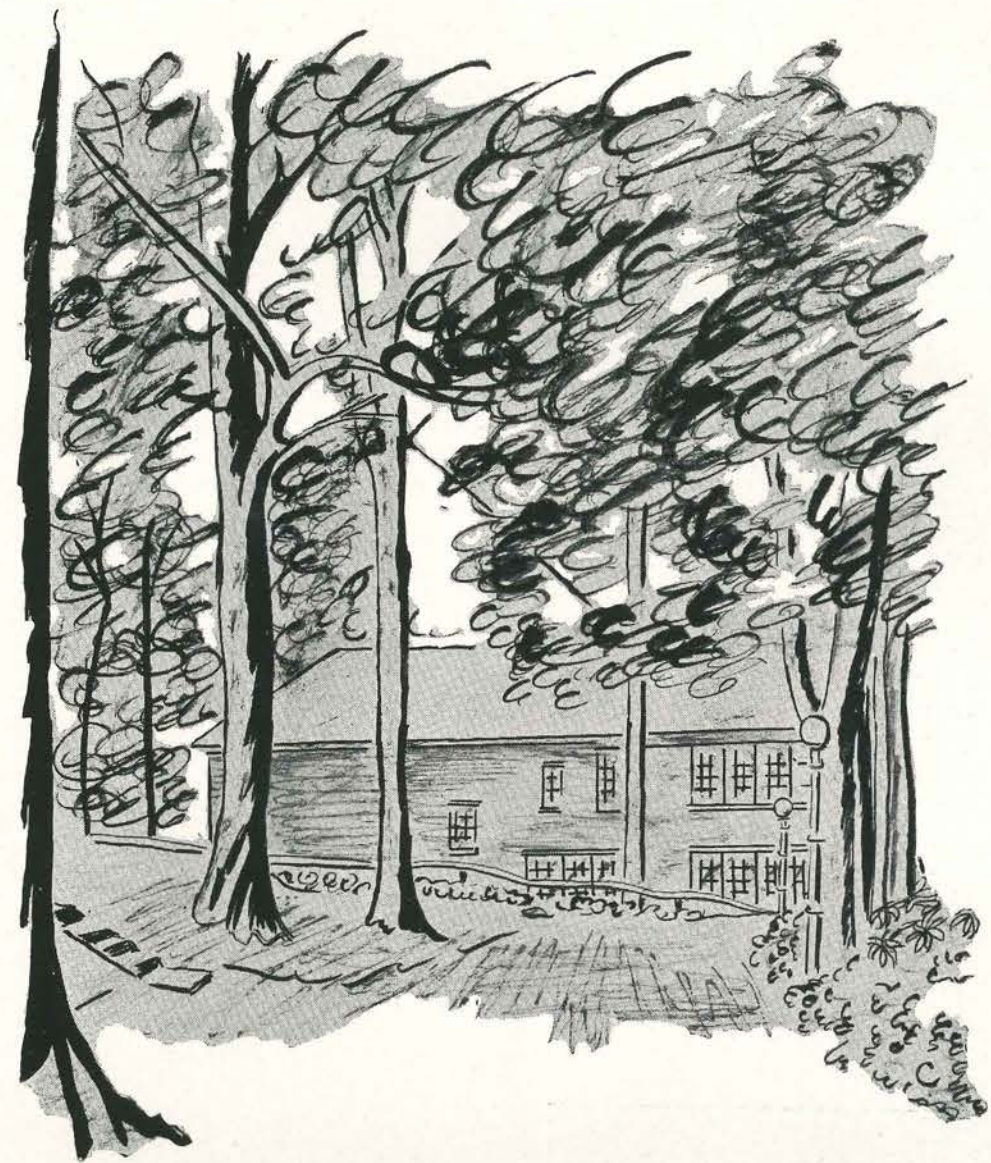

William Brink was president, and keys and pins were awarded activity members at the close of the term.

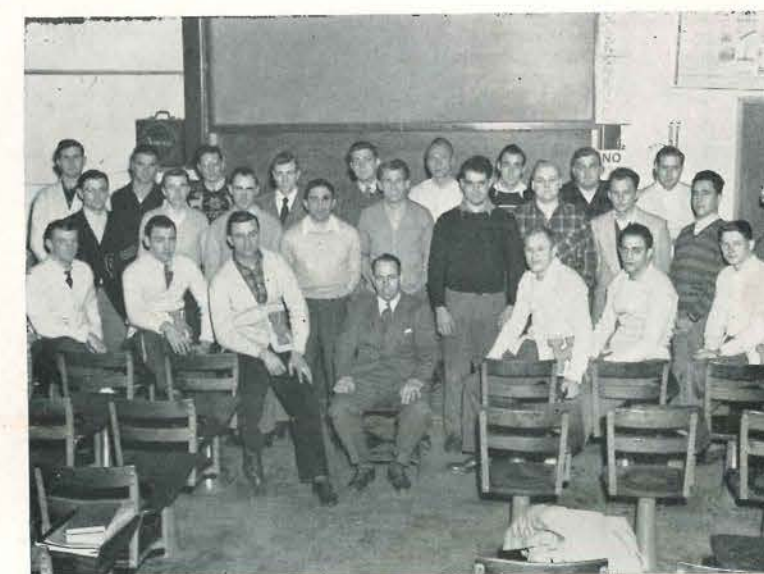


## Budget

## Alpha Kappa Tau

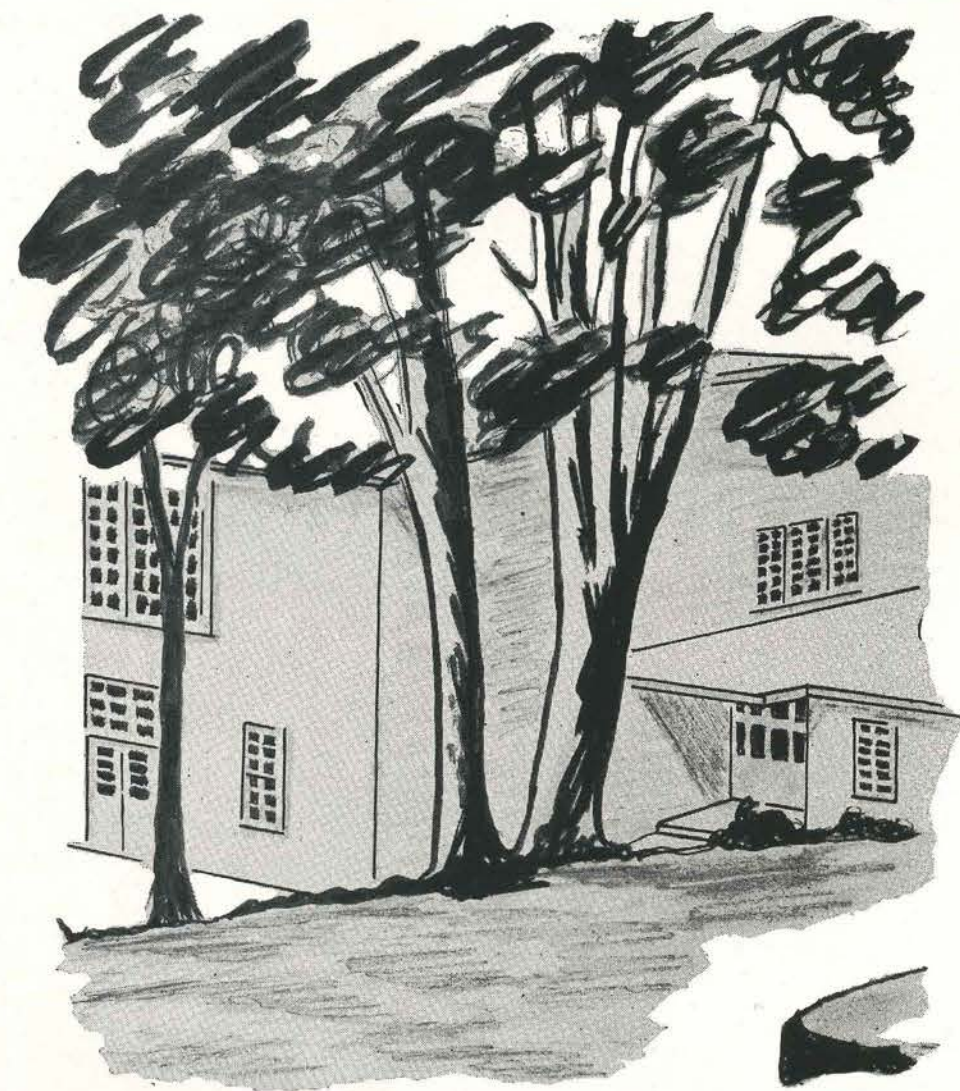

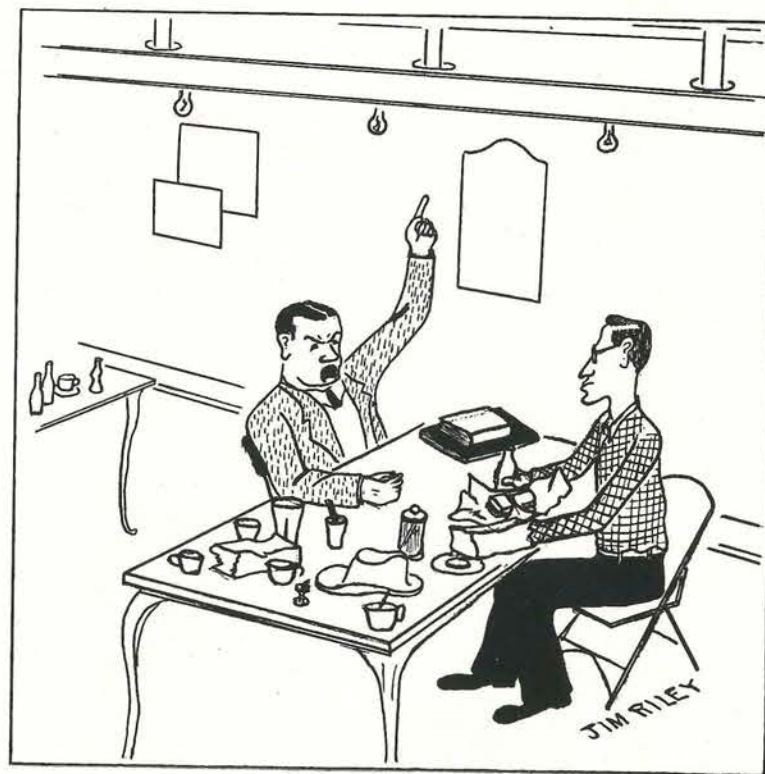

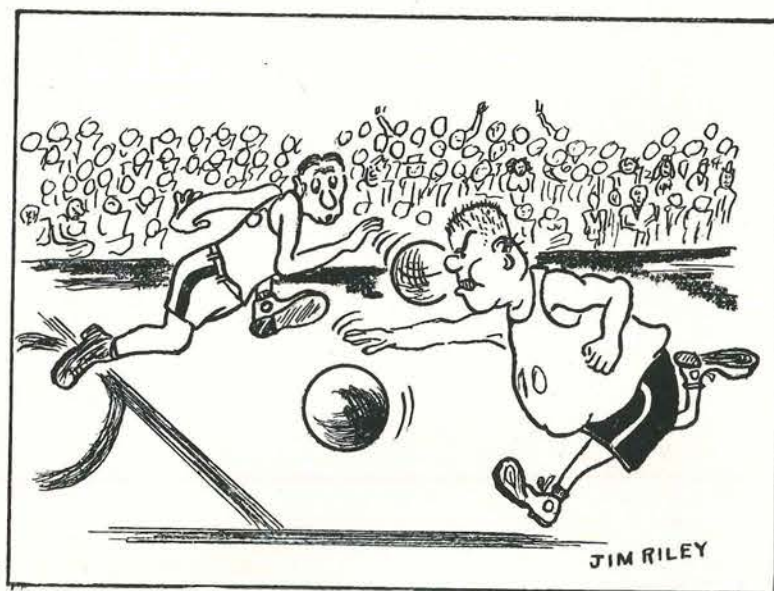
