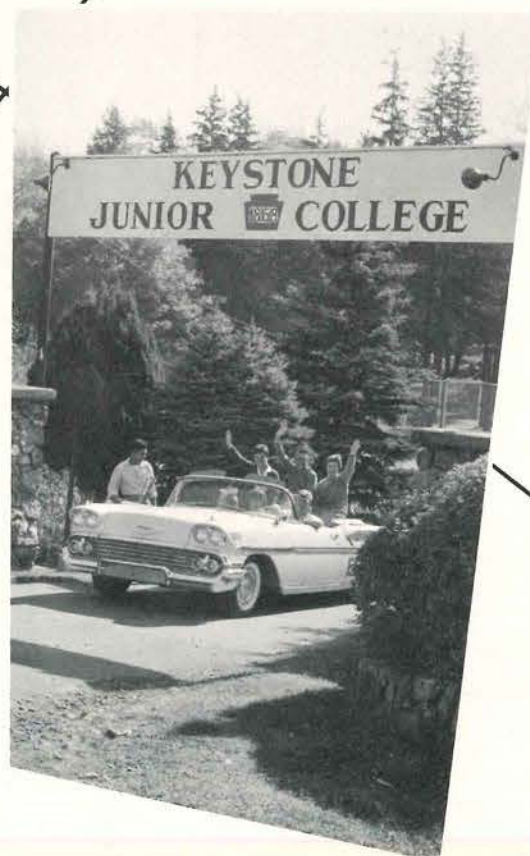

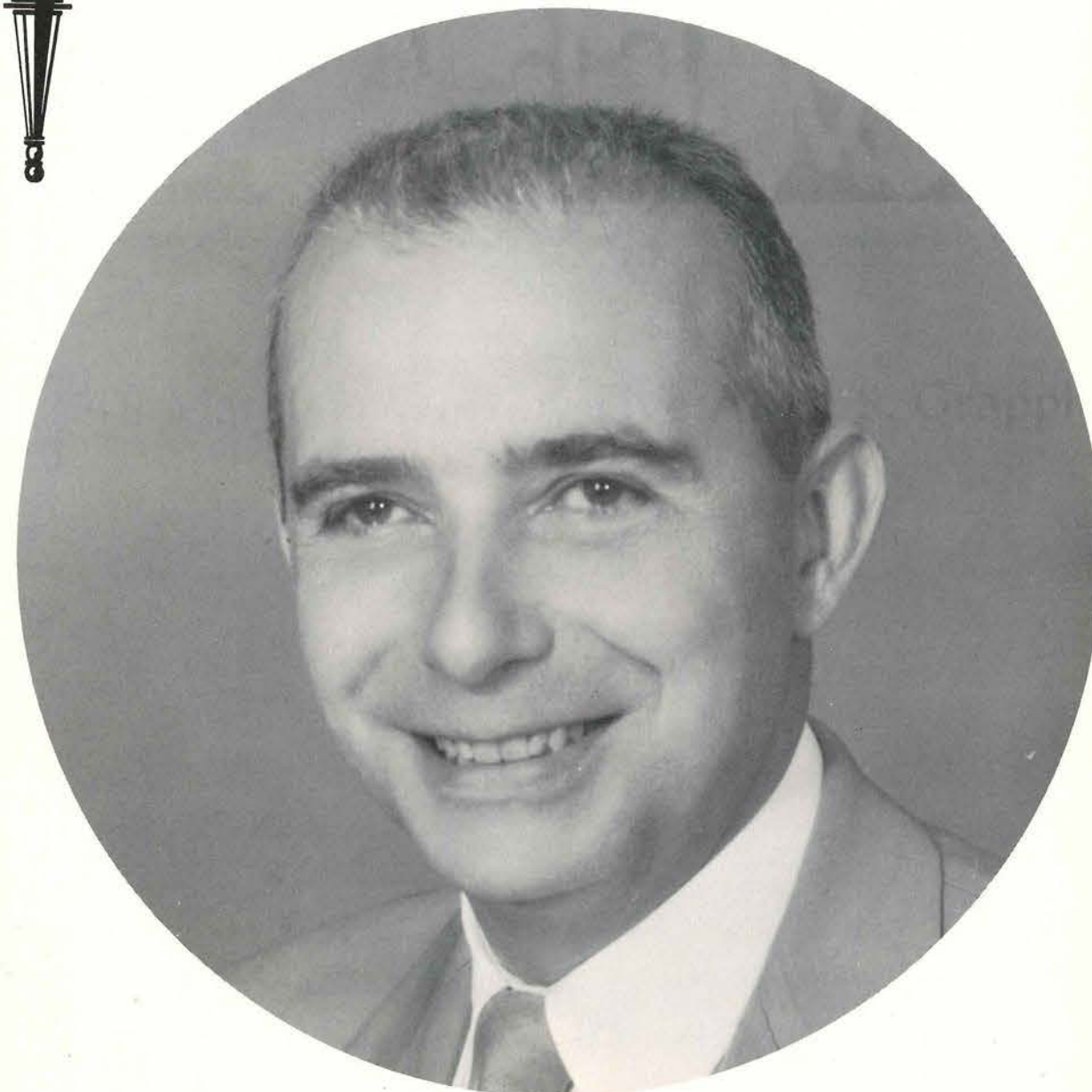
Foreword

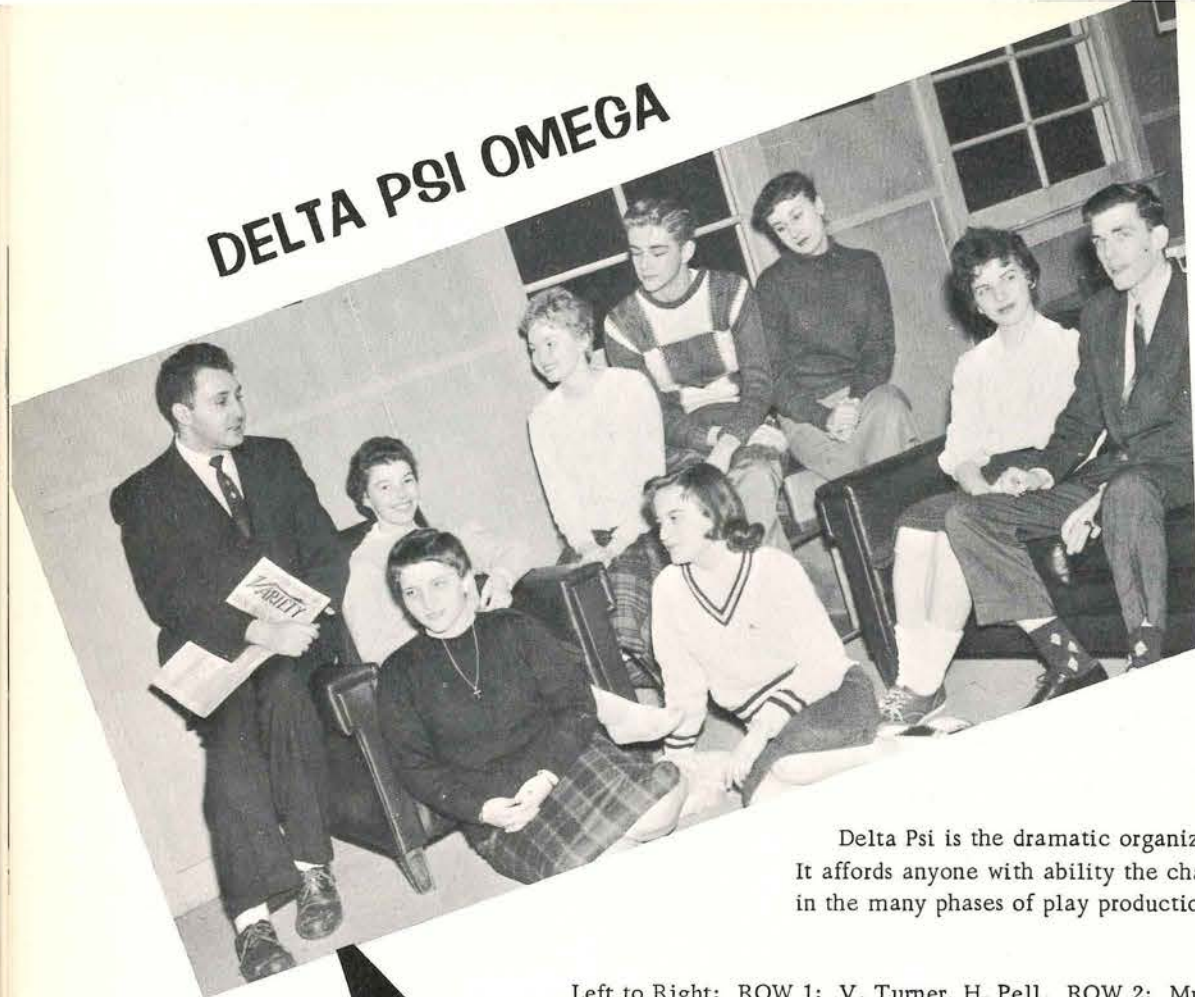
