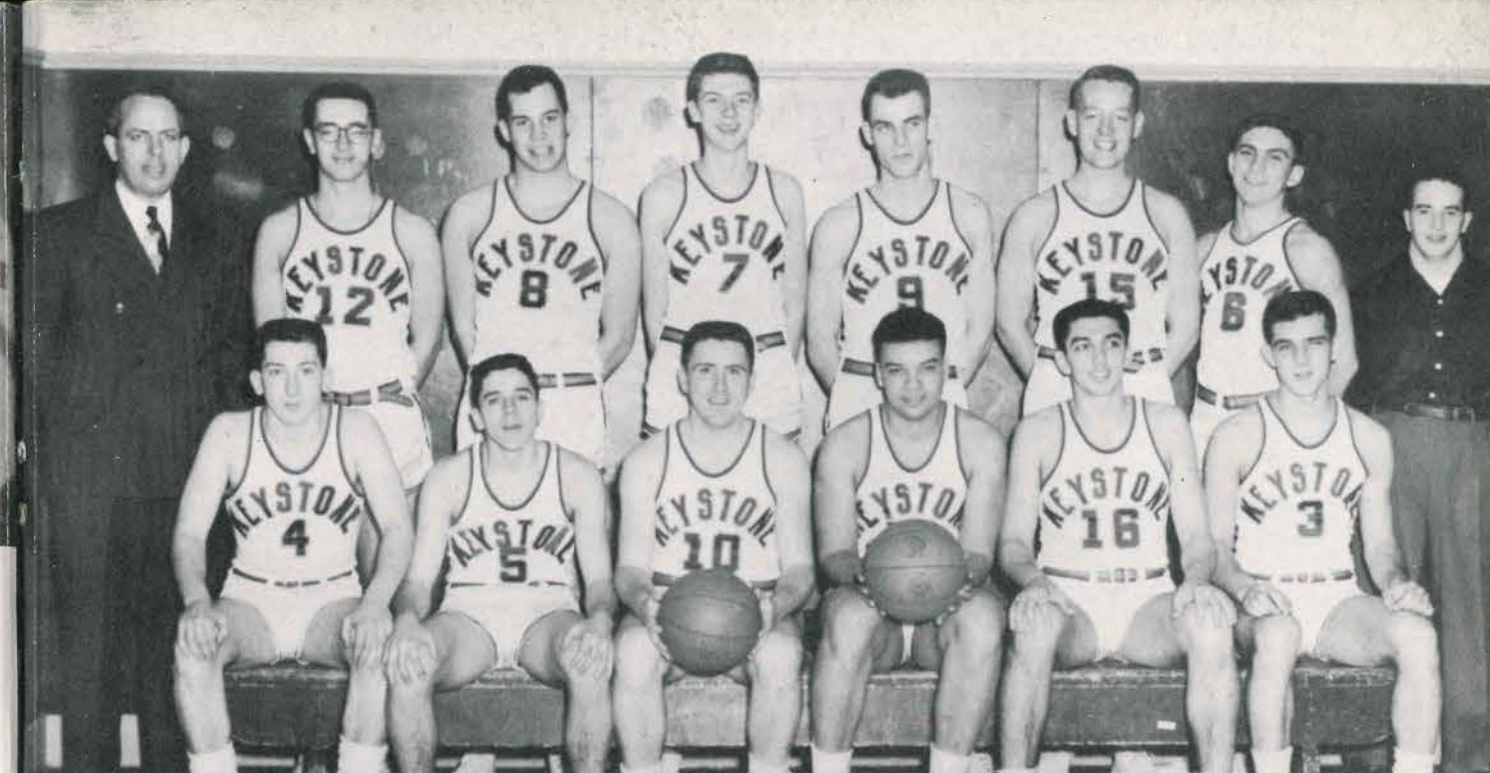

MEN'S VARSITY BASKETBALL

A rundown of the season shows that although handicapped by height, the Little Giants never stopped trying and quite a few of their wins can be attributed to sheer grit and perseverance.

Keystone opened its season by scoring an impressive win over the Wilkes College J. V. five, 47 to 40, only to have the Wilkes-Barreans retaliate in a second meeting, 79 to 56.

The Little Giants defeated an Alumni team 63 to 53 and then lost to KJC's rivals from New York State, Broome Tech, 70 to 62. Keystone avenged this loss by turning back Broome Tech 60 to 56 in a second encounter.

Powerful Blair Academy trounced the Little Giants, 81 to 58. In the season's first league contest, Keystone drubbed Altoona Center 72 to 58 only to lose by an 87 to 70 score at Altoona.

Keystone split even in a pair of contests with Johnstown, losing a heart-breaker at home 60 to 53, but turning the tables on Johnstown by knocking them out of a three-way tie for first place and a possible championship by defeating them, 58 to 57, in a thrilling contest. This game also clinched a play-off berth for the Keystone five, in the Penna. Junior College League.

York walloped the Little Giants 95 to 58, but were hard pressed in the second encounter before winning again, 60 to 48.

Keystone overcame a 14 point deficit to defeat Hershey in the ebbing seconds, 69 to 66, and duplicated the feat at home, only more decisively, 58 to 49.

Hazleton wrecked the Little Giants in two contests, 77 to 47 and 72 to 53.

Keystone and Mont Alto broke even in a pair of duels; the first went to Mont Alto 74 to 68, Keystone taking the second, a thrilling overtime contest, 61 to 55.

In the playoffs of the P. J. C. A. A. at Johnstown March 5, the Hazleton five did it again 69-51. This stacked the Little Giants up against Johnstown in a consolation game that went against KJC 62-42 in the last quarter, with Johnstown having only a slight edge of 36-34 at the end of the third.

All in all it was a good season, considering that for the second time in nine years the Little Giants entered the race for the PJCAA tournament crown.

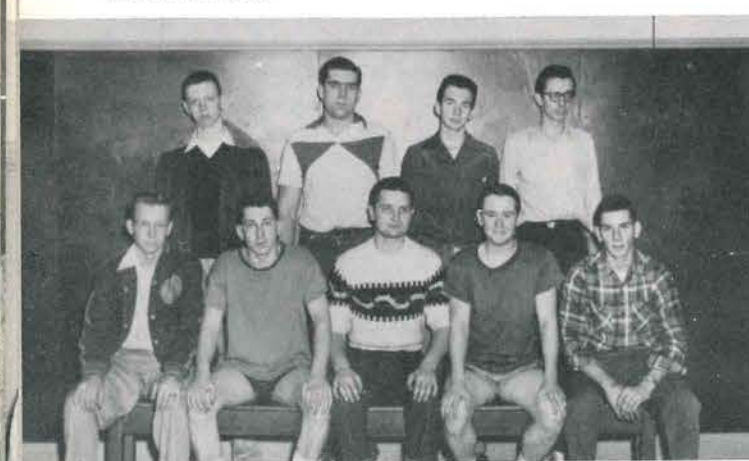
