The Class . . .



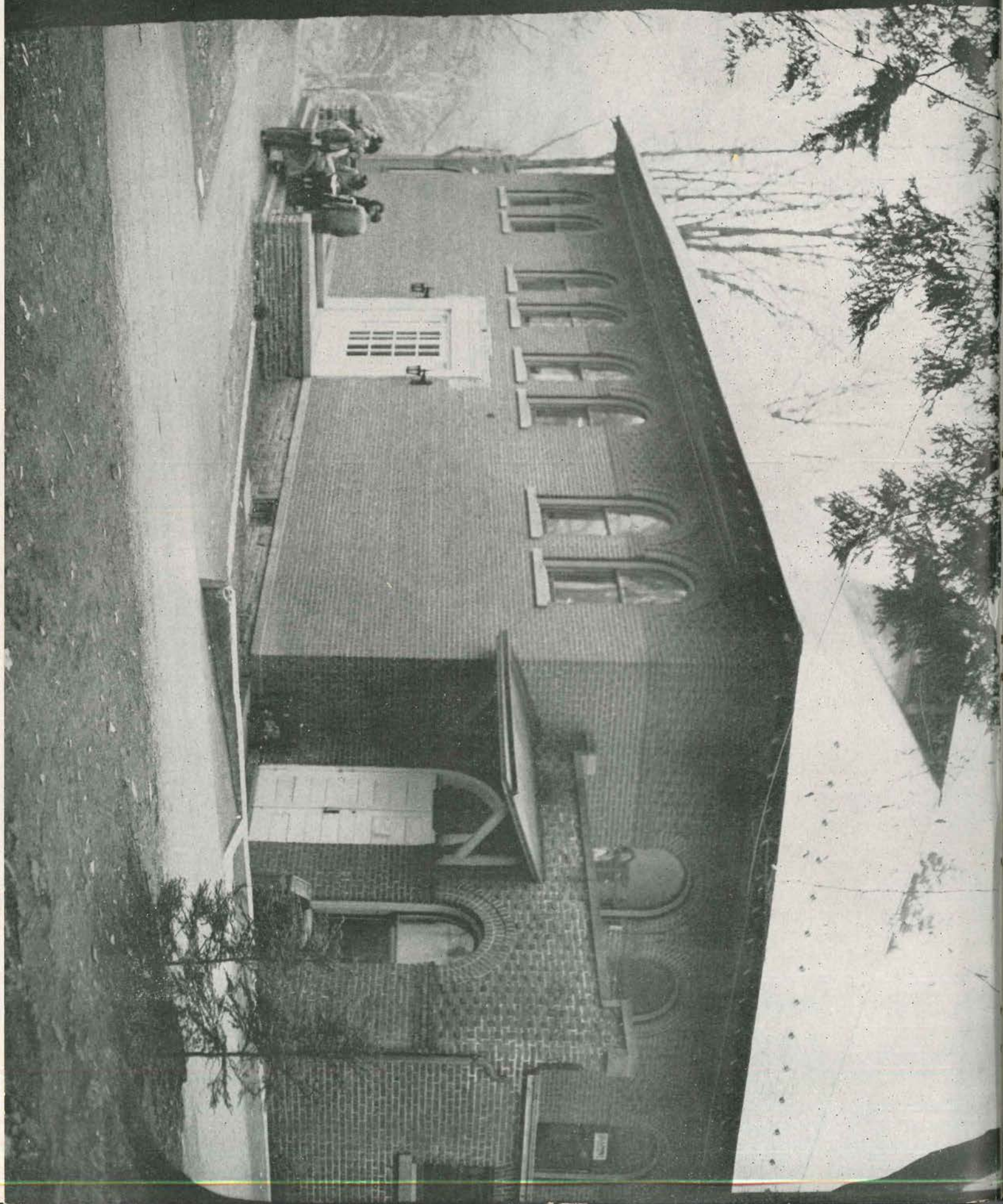

EDITORIAL BOARD

The Keystonian, Keystone's bi-weekly newspaper, was edited by Frank Cimino. The paper, a four page publication, covered campus news and personalities. 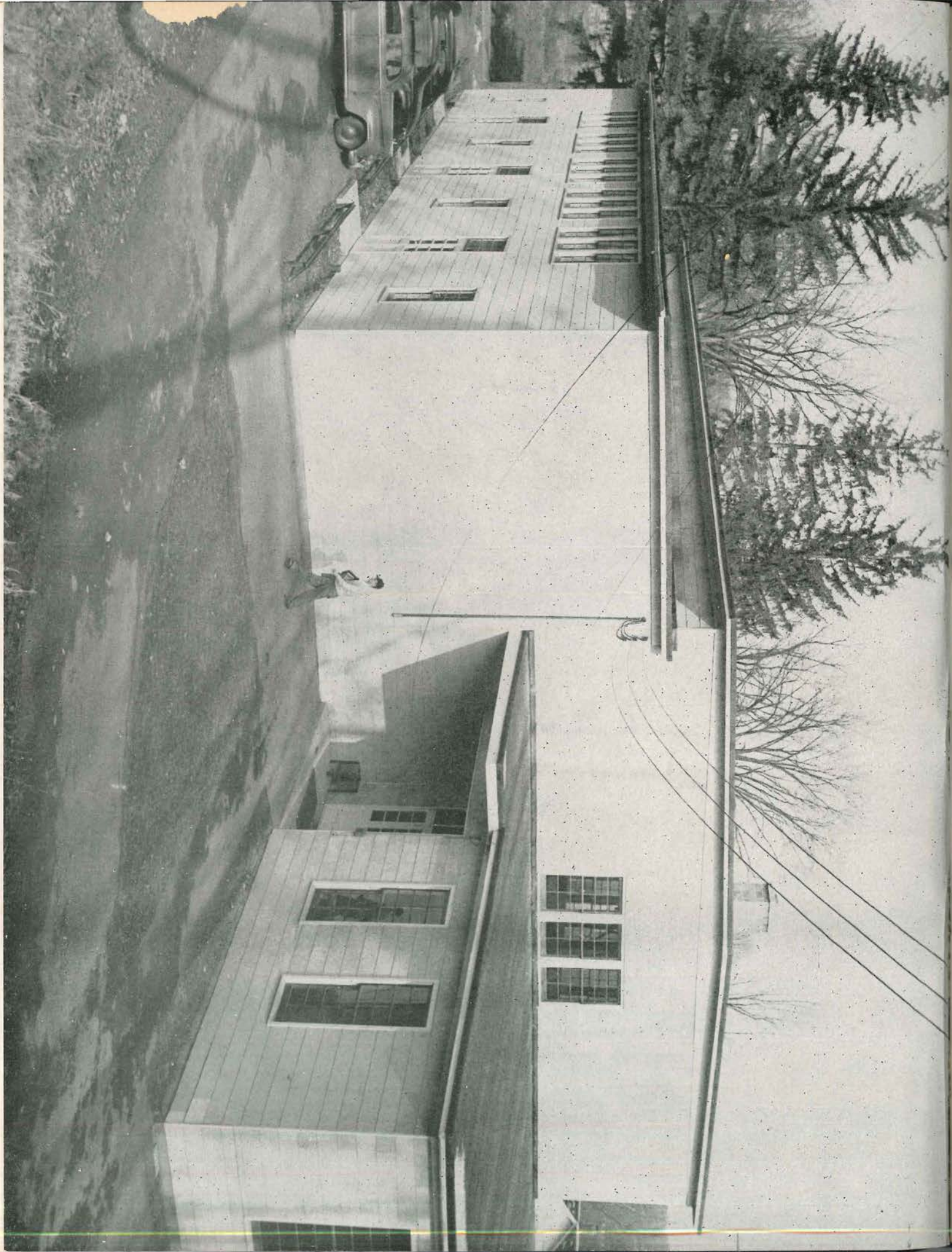

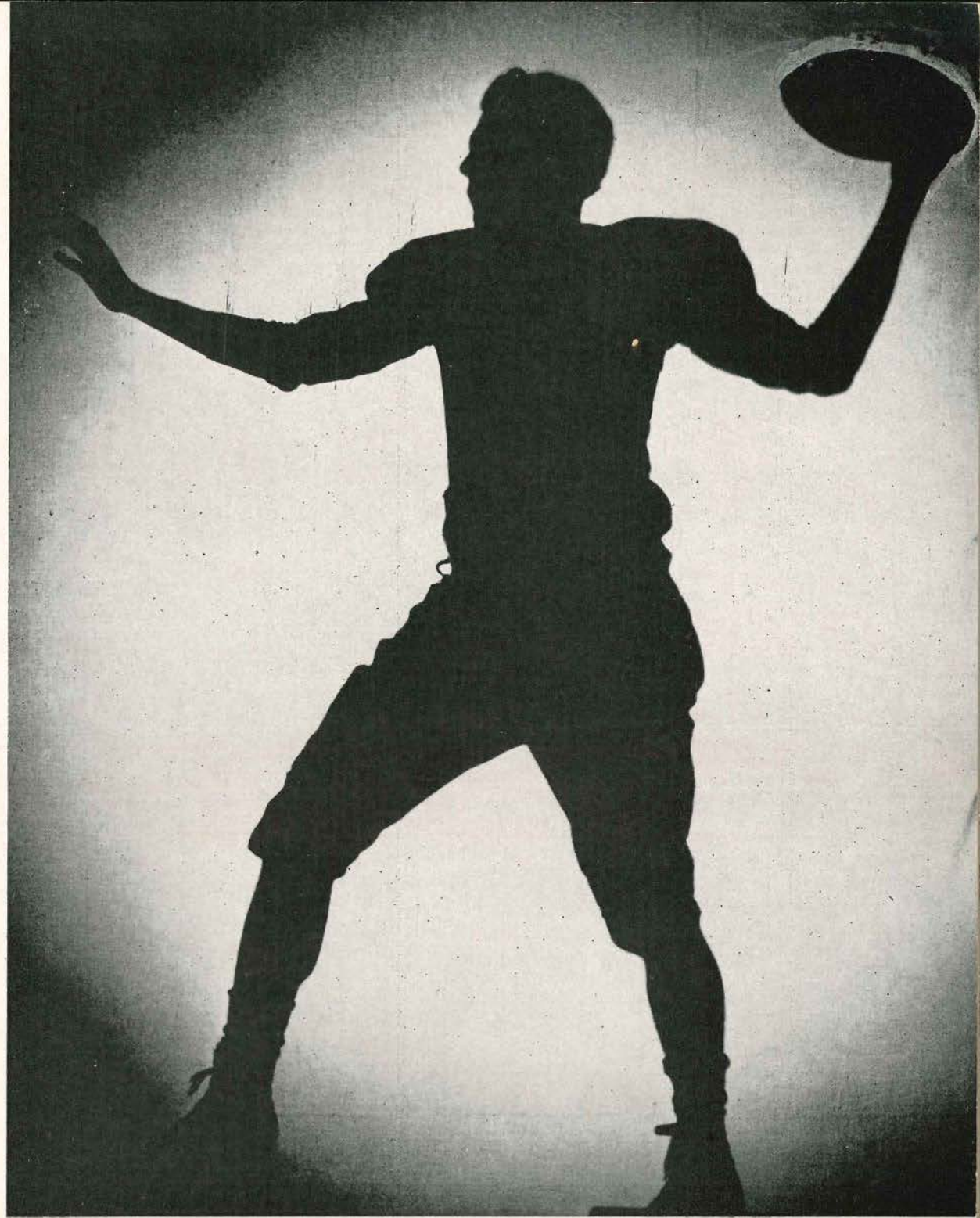

Again this year the Little Giant football squad had a rough time winning games, as they had on their schedule teams which were out of their class. The squad, although falling behind in most of the games, never gave up. The boys always showed good sportsmanship and were a team to be proud of.

Thirty-four men responded to a call issued by Coach John Franklin on August 30 for football practice sessions. Much preparation time was spent by the men in learning plays and getting into condition the first week. By the time the first game rolled around, Franklin had the boys ready for their arch rivals, Wyoming Seminary.

The first game was well played, but it proved fatal to the Little Giants as they went down to defeat 6-0. Seminary got the only score of the game in the first period. The Giants had plenty of drive, but it wasn't enough to get over the goal line. The remainder of the game was a punting battle.

On October 1, the Orange and Blue squad hopped a bus and traveled to Lock Haven to meet the State Teachers College Jayvees. Lock Haven displayed plenty of punch and lots of reserve strength as they bowled over the Keystoneians. When the final whistle had sounded, the teachers had a 28 point lead, and they won 34-6. The only Keystone touchdown of the game was made on a pass from Charlie Beal to Lionel Stanton.

Following the short vacation, the Giants took another beating at the hands of the University of Scranton Frosh on October 23. The Frosh team outweighed and outplayed the Keystone squad to defeat them 25-7. It was a hard game, and several of the team members were injured.

Homecoming Day was a very sad day for the alumni. After coming back to visit their Alma Mater, they wanted very much to see the team win. The opponents were the Stroudsburg State Teachers College Jayvees and the final score was 46-0. Enough said.

The Giants tasted another defeat when they made a road trip to Morrisville, N. Y. With victory in their eyes, the Keystone squad played hard, but lost, 19-7. Now the men really looked forward to the next game, and they were out for a victory to end the season.

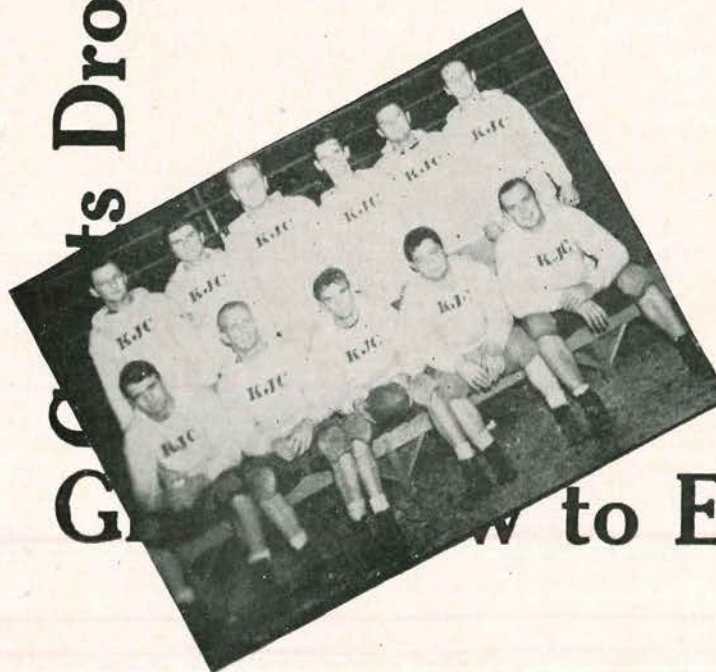

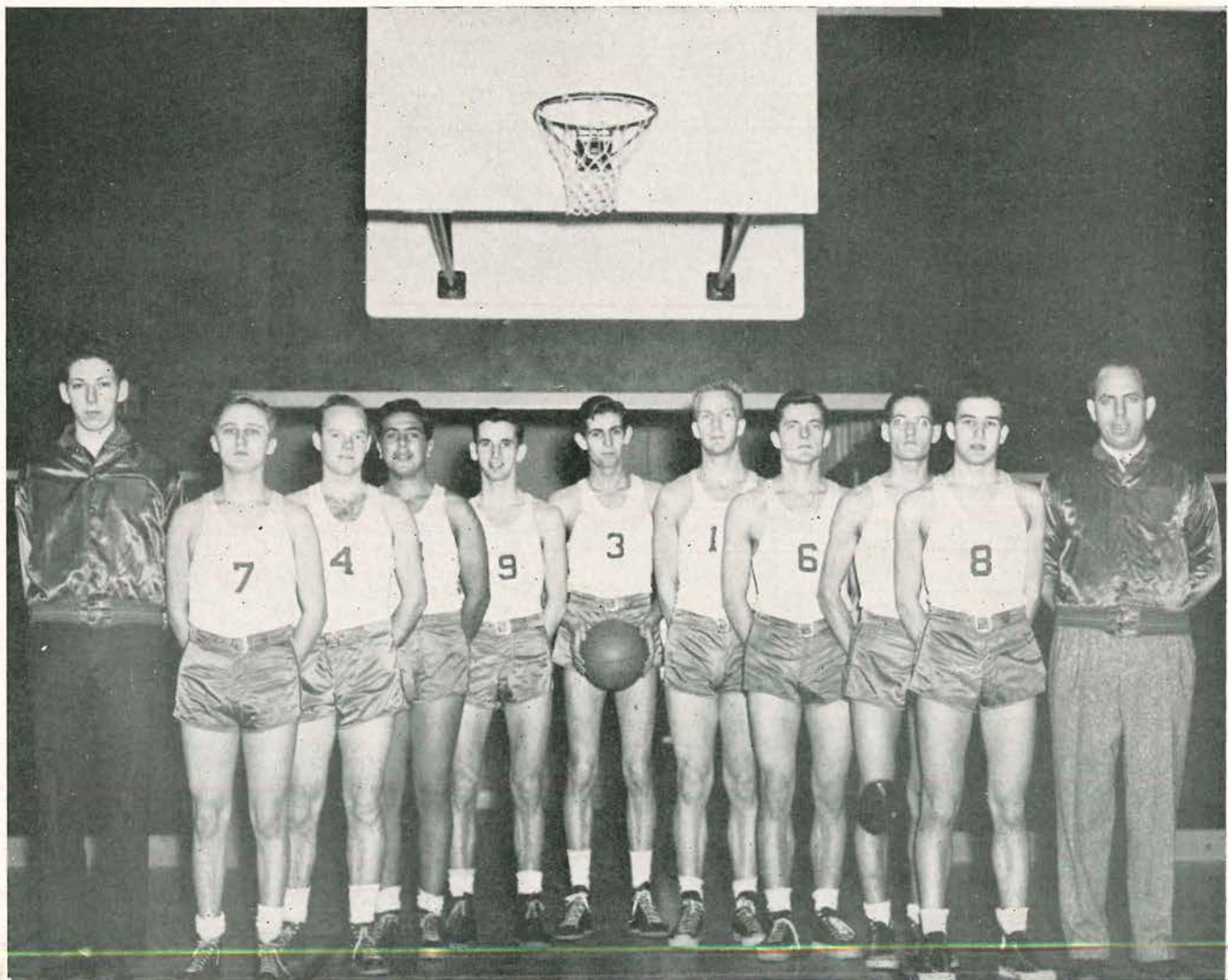

Keystone's cage machine, which was taken over by Coach John Franklin this year, did not have a very impressive season. However, although their record was seven wins and twelve losses, the team gave the home fans a real treat as far as close games go, setting a record for the number of overtime games in one season here at Keystone.

The season started out as usual this year with the opening game against the Alumni five, whom the Giants bowled over 76-36. Then they took to the road, the first game being with Triple Cities College of Endicott, N. Y., where they got their first defeat in the young season. York Junior College, the Pennsylvania Junior College Athletic Association champion for the 1948-49 season, was next on the schedule and proved fatal to the Orange and Blue men as they took the worst defeat of the campaign, 91-40.

After the York defeat, Keystone traveled to Pottsville and won a 55-54 overtime victory over the Schuylkill Undergraduate Center of Penn State. Two more defeats followed this victory, both on the road, at the hands of Swarthmore and Hazleton Undergraduate Center. Kings College Jayvees were beaten as the first game was played before the home crowd, 53-38.





As the end of the season came into sight, the Giants were determined to win more games if it killed them to do so. (It almost killed them). They set another record by playing two overtime games in four nights. At Kingston the Giants dropped a one-point decision to the Kings College Jayvees in an overtime period, 67-66. The next game was played at home against the York team, which smeared the Giants in their first meeting. At the end of regulation time, the score was all knotted. In the first overtime period, both teams played very cautiously, and at the end the score was still tied. Sooooo, into the second extra period we go. It was very nerve racking, as both clubs played as long with the ball as they could, thinking that one basket would probably win the game. It didn't, however, for at the end of this second extra period, the score was still tied. (This is too much.) Both teams were really tired in the third overtime, but York had enough energy left to outscore the Giants in this period, 8-2. The final score was 75-69.

The last three games on the schedule resulted in two more defeats and one victory for the Keystone squad.

Next year only one letterman returns, and Coach Franklin will have to build a completely new team for next season around Captain Bruce Vogt. Bob Reynolds was 1948-49 captain of the Little Giants and also high scorer.

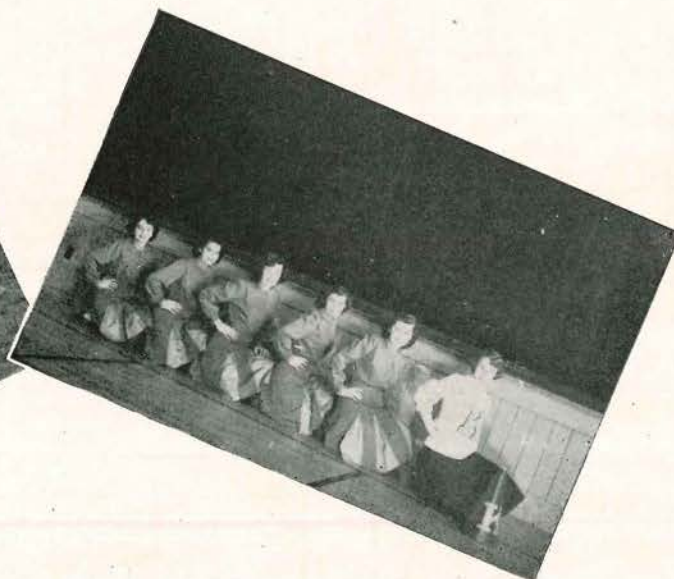

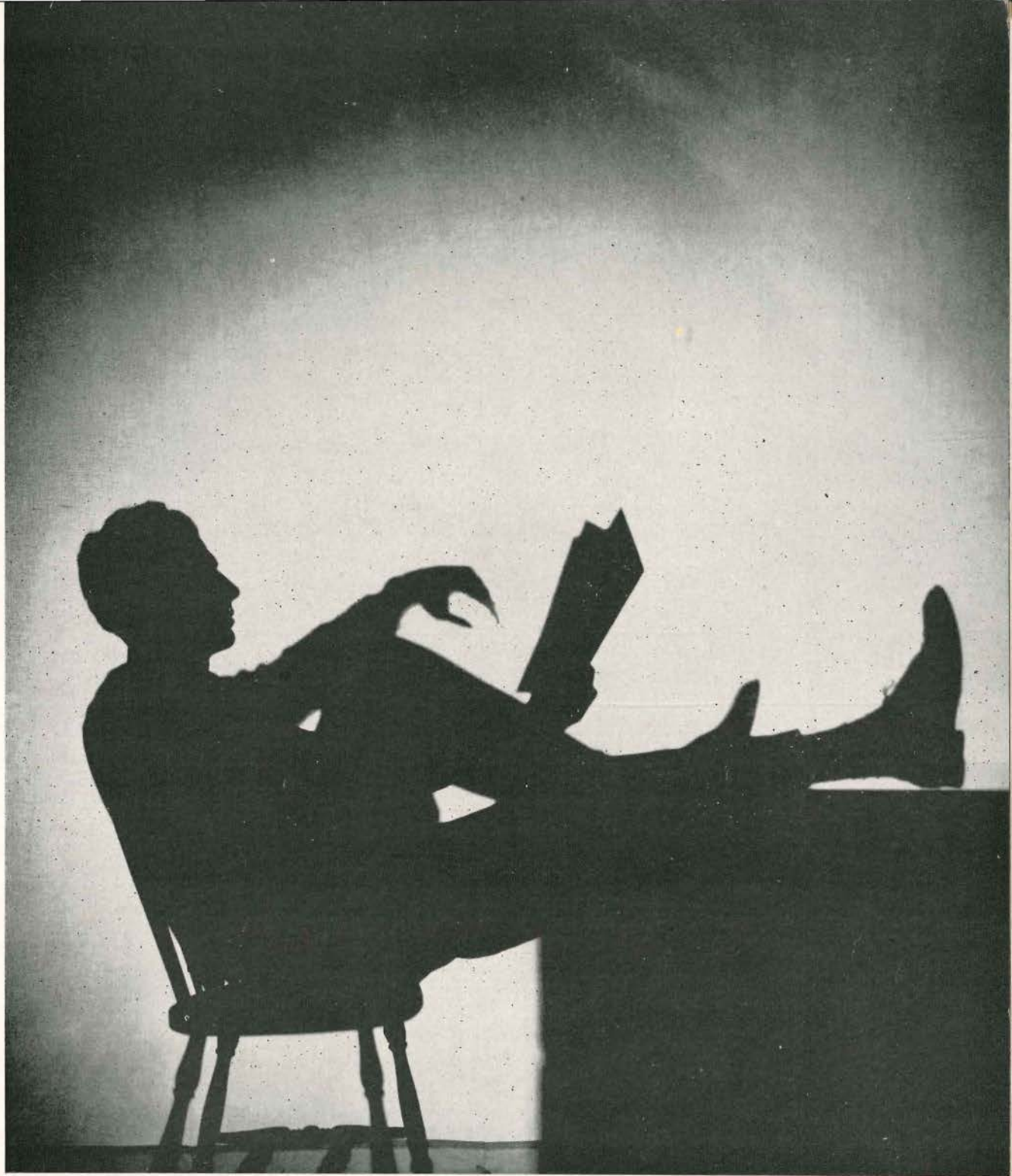

Results are now just history.

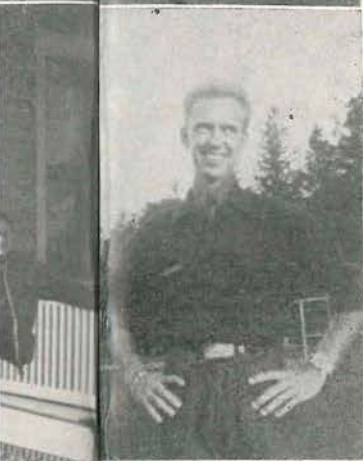
