LIVING ENDOWMENT

A living endowment plan for Lycoming College is being discussed, with the Alumni Council working out the details of the proposed plan.

The establishment of a living endowment plan will have several objectives. In the first place, its purpose will be to keep the alumni well informed about the activities of the college. Secondly, the suggested plan is designed so as to encourage the alumni to represent the college in their respective communities. Thirdly, it is hoped that the living endowment plan will induce each member of the alumni to make an annual contribution proportionate to the ability and inclination of each.

The publicity office is working directly with this program, with a special publicity emphasis on alumni activities. Also, Donald G. Remley, now representing the college in the field, is contacting alumni in their own communities with respect to this plan. Kenneth E. Himes, college treasurer, will assume responsibility for setting up clerical procedure and supervising the administration of the program. Dr. John W. Long, college president, is in charge of general supervision of the entire broad program.

The proposed plan will be offered to the alumni in June for adoption. Personal information forms will be distributed to alumni this summer.

Summer School

Lycoming College will offer another varied summer schedule during the vacation months, according to Academic Dean William S. Hoffman.

Approximately twenty-five courses are included in the planning for the summer sessions. Dates for these classes are, June 18 to July 26, first session, and July 27 to August 30, second session.

A trial questionnaire concerning summer school was issued to the members of the student body recently. Those interested in the program indicated the courses which they were desirous of taking during the summer program. From this response, Dean Hoffman drew up the revised schedule.

One Hundred Twenty-nine to Graduate

One hundred twenty-nine students will be graduated at the 103rd annual commencement exercises to be held June 3, according to an announcement from the office of President Dr. John W. Long.

Included in this figure are 107 students who will be awarded four-year degrees and 22 who will be granted two-year diplomas for the completion of terminal courses.

The graduation exercises will embrace all students who have

completed their work since graduation last year, including those whose undergraduate work was completed in summer school, those who ended their studies with the first semester of this academic year.

Reunion classes this year are: 1901, 1906, 1911, 1916, 1921, 1926, 1931, 1936, 1941, 1946, and 1950. The college is now working on a plan whereby it can accommodate returning alumni. It is hoped that every reunion class will be strongly represented.

Homecoming in October and the Greater Lycoming Banquet, February 23, brought together many Alumni, both from Williamsport and elsewhere. The response to the annual dues notices sent out by the Alumni Association brought nearly \$700 in dues and Life Memberships.

Progresses

Lycoming is making every effort in the college promotional field. Donald G. Remley, assistant professor of mathematics and physics, has been released from his classroom duties by Dr. Long in order to represent the college in the field.

Mr. Remley is contacting various high school principals throughout the state, interviewing prospective students, and renewing alumni interest in the four-year college.

Musically, the a cappella choir and singers, both under the direction of Walter G. McIver, associate professor of voice, have spent their busiest season, singing in nearby high schools as well as presenting concerts for churches and other organizations. Whenever the choir or singers appear in a high school, a member of one of the vocal groups gives a brief picture of Lycoming College to the audience.

The establishment of a placement bureau at the college is another step in Lycoming's rapid advance. Russell Brownlee, college alumnus, was named by President Long to head the placement bureau.

Lycoming College is the twenty-eighth oldest institution of higher learning in the United States.

Three outstanding events on three consecutive week-ends, beginning with Saturday, April 28, are included in the Spring schedule of the college, the most active in recent years.

FASHION SHOW

The Faculty Wives will present a fashion show April 28. The show will be given in cooperation with L. L. Stearns and Sons, local department store. Co-chairmen for the program are Mrs. Donald G. Remley and Mrs. Oliver E. Harris. According to Mrs. Michael Wargo, who is in charge of publicity for the Faculty Wives, a complete variety of summer fashions will be shown.

The program will be divided into three sections, the actual show, a tea, and a musicale. Mrs. John P. Graham is handling the details for the fashion show with Mrs. Don L. Larrabee in charge of the tea and Mrs. Walter G. McIver directing the musicale.

SPRING MUSICAL

The following Friday and Saturday nights, the Junior and Senior classes will sponsor the third annual Spring musical.

Six songs from this musical have been published by Broadcast Music, Inc., New York, and are now on sale.

The musical is done this year as a flashback, which the title, "The Good Old Days," might indicate. 22 songs are included in the score by Dick Wolf. Once again Nancy Hall, '52, of South Williamsport, is accompanist for the show.

Those who saw either "Student Life" or "Sidney Goes to College" will remember Dick Frederick, '51, of Shamokin, who is cast in the lead role.

As usual, the receipts which the senior class realizes from the production will be used for procuring the class gift for the college.

MAY DAY

May Day, the traditional pageant which highlights every year, will be observed Saturday, May 12. Mrs. Donald Felix, director of women's physical education, is once again directing the May Day program.

Marilyn Simmons, Syracuse, N. Y., was elected queen of the May Day, to preside over the activities, which will be climaxed by the winding of the May pole.

FACULTY NOTES

Roger Cogswell, instructor in French, has been asked to write an article on Parisian pronunciation for the French Review, official journal of the American Association of Teachers of French. Professor Pierre Delattre, University of Pennsylvania, a world-wide authority in phonetics and associate editor of the French Review, made the request. The article will be written and published in French.

Dr. Herbert E. Ketcham, associate professor of foreign languages, made preliminary arrangements with the Library of Congress, Washington, D. C., to lend several early editions of the Greek Bible to the college library when

he visited the nation's capital over the Easter recess.

Oliver E. Harris, director of guidance, is credited in a new textbook, "Comments and Cases on Human Relations," published by Harper and Brothers, New York, for two case histories described in the text. Mr. Harris prepared the material for the two entries.

Dr. Archie R. Ayers, former academic dean of Lycoming, was named to the presidency of the Detroit Institute of Technology recently. Dr. Ayers left Lycoming a year ago for the position of dean at Kansas Wesleyan. He will head a new administrative set-up at DIT.

Lycos Card Active Spring Sports Program

Lycoming will participate in two intercollegiate sports this Spring, according to Director of Athletics, Robert F. Smith. The two sports are baseball and tennis.

Baseball

Lycoming will play nine baseball games this Spring. G. Lee Baer, also director of men's physical education and intramurals, will again pilot the Warriors. In their first season after beginning baseball again, the Lycos met with only fair success last season, but with a year's experience behind them, the prospects are somewhat brighter.

Baer is busily rebuilding the Blue and Gold for the April 25 opener against Lock Haven State Teachers College. Gone from the inner defense of last year are Musheno, Drescher, and Fazzari, leaving only letterman Don Moshier around whom to put together another inner cordon. Roger Ludlum, last year's leading hitter, will see most outfield action. Coach Baer must find a good right-hand hitting outfielder to go along with the left-handed stickwork of Ludlum.

Behind the bat, Baer is well fortified, with Dave Jones, last year's first string receiver,

Baer is counting on several promising newcomers to bolster the Lyco mound corps which boasts two returning lettermen in righty John Cruickshank and port-sider Stan MacFarland.

Basketball Round-Up

The Lycoming Warrior's most successful season in history is now a matter of record. Bob Smith's cagers wrapped up the 1950-51 season with a tremendous tally of 16 wins and a mere three defeats.

By hitting for 79.7 points per game, the Lycos finished fifth among the 350 member schools of the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball. The Blue and Gold also ranked high among the nation's small colleges in shooting percentage and foul conversions.

The male members of the faculty and administration sponsored an informal dinner for Bob Smith's cagers, April 3. Don L. Larrabee, attorney-at-law and instructor in business law, suggested the dinner. Oliver E. Harris served as toastmaster and Dr. John W. Long, college president, asked the invocation.

Proposed Change in By-Laws

Two proposed changes in the by-laws of the alumni constitution will be offered to the vote of the alumni, Saturday, June 2, 1951. They are:

Proposed Change in By-Laws Article 2 Section (i)

Shall be amended as follows:

The nominating committee consisting of 5 members of the board shall present the names of one or more candidates for the various offices of the Association and in addition shall present the names of 10 nominees selected with regard to college class and place of residence from which number 5 shall be elected to membership on the board for a term of 3 years, and the incoming Senior class shall select one representative for a term of one year and report the name of the nominee to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee.

A motion was unanimously carried as follows:

"By-laws to be amended to provide for the establishment of an Alumni Loyalty Fund and to provide for the appointment of class agents to promote said 'Alumni Loyalty Fund.'"
