In its third year as a unique opportunity at Lycoming, the MAY TERM will again provide students with a challenging array of fifty-five specially designed courses for the four-week term. As io the two previous very succeasful MAY TERMS, many noo-traditional courses have been designed and have such diverse topics as coostruction of Appalachian folk stringed iostrumeots, black music, coaching of atbletics, film, folklore, hypnosis, jewelry, Shamanism, Sylvia Plath, aod woodworking.

Newly desigoed courses to be offered bave sucb titles as "Accountiog for Non-profit Organizatioos", "Food Service",
"Physiological and Psychological Aspects of Color", "Effective Communication", and "The Russo-German War, 1941-45". Other new offeringa ioclude "Electronies for the Amateur Audiophiles"
"Philosophical Issues io Literature", "Christianity and African Culture", "Ao Introduction to Discrete Probability", "Basic Research Methods in Psychology Researcb Instrumentation", and "Holy Sitea and Religious Topics".

Back by popular demand for the third MAY TERM are "Accounting Opinions of the APB-FASB", "Managing the Small Busioess", "Field Ornithology", "Modern Archeological Research", "History of Utopias io America", "Speleology", and "Urban Confrontation".

The third "Cultural Tour of the U. S. S. R. will again enable students to experience Russian culture in visits to Leningrad, Moscow, Novgorod, Kiev, Lvov, aod Budapest, as well as Deomark, Fioland, and West Germany.

The tri-cultural community of Northcectral New Mexico will be home for the third time for aoother "Field Experience in Sociology-Anthropology" group as they combine cultural anthropological and sociological field metbods to learn how to analyze a community in deptb.

Several new forelgn culture courses are available. "A Spanisb Inquisition, 1974" will visit Madrid, Salamanca, Granada, and Sitgea. "An Examioation of the Changing Cultural Patterns of Contemporary France" will include Paris, Tours, Geneve, Chamonix-Greooble Nice, Biarritz, and Marsellle In its itinerary. ## HISTORY 61 - History of Utopias in Ametica.

MATHEMATICS 7 - Mathematics for Elementary
Teachers.
A study of content, objectives, matenals, and methoda of instruction. Topics include a developmeot of the real mimber system and its various subsystems, nondecimal arithmetic, geometry, probability, and algorithms for the four basic operationi. MATHEMATICS 63 - An introduction to Discrete Probability.

## PHILOSOPHY 10 - Introduction to Philosophical Problems.

An inquiry, carried on mainly by discussions and short papers, into a few selected philosophical problems. The problems vary with the instructor; typical examples are What is a scientific explanation? Are standards of conduct relative? Is talk about God meaningful? Readings in Philosophical classics and contemporary books and articles.

POLITICAL SCIENCE 62 - The Washington Minimester A Course in Practical Politics.

Provides students with an opportunity to observe the workings of our national government at first band. ## PSYCHOLOCY 10 - Introductory.

An introduction to the empirical stady of human and other aolmal behavior. Areas considered may include leaming, personality, social, physiological, sensory, cognition and developmental.

PSYCHOLOGY 30 - Social Psychology.
An examination of behaviot in social contexts including motivation, preception, group processes and leaderhip, attitudes, and methods of reseanch. Prereqquisite Pychology 10 .

PSYCHOLOGY 60 - Basic Methods in Research Instrumentation.

A "bow to" course in relay cincuitry specifically designed for programming schedules of reinforcement using Grayson-Stadler mechanical programming equipment. Students will construct simple relay components, learn basic electrical skills, and design at least one working program using the equipment they have constructed.

## PSYCHOLOGY 64 - Hypnosis.

Research in an altered state of consciousness. An indepth survey of current hypnotic phenomena involving study of the history and theory of hypnosis and demonstrations of various standard hypnotic experiences including age-regression, amnesia, post-hy pnotic suggestion, physical and sesory effects. Discussion win

RELIGION 66 - Holy Sites and Religious Topics.
A study of selected topics in classical Egyptian religion, Graeco-Roman religion, Judism, Islam, and Christianity. Selected topics include: The meaning of the Covenant in Judaism; The content of the Dead Sea Scrolls; The Cult of Amun; Graeco-Roman mystery religions; Istam. Stide-augmented lectures. Credre also vailable in History and the interdisciplinary major, Near East Culture and Archeology
Guerra. Time: Arranged

RELIGION 67 - Christianity and African Culture.
In its Protestant and Catholic views, Christianity has very different ways of looking at man, sex, community, nature, God, and the afterlife than do the traditional religions of the Sub-Sahara Africa. This course compares African religious beliefs with those of Christianity. Students will not only learn about fascinating African life-styles, but also gain new insights into their own beliefs.

SOCIOLOGY 60 - Sociology Field Experience.
A field experience in the analysis of a tri-cultural community (Anglo-Spanist-American Indian) of Espanola, New Mexico. Students spend week-days sightseeing in adjacent areas. Permission of instructor required.
McCrary. Cost: $\$ 400$.

SOCIOLOGY 61 - Urban Confrontation.
Program of course is to observe the criminal justice ystem. Two weeks of classroom preparation. One week in New York City. One week evaluation. An examination of a variety of issues raised by individuals and groups with in the Women's Movement, Strauser and Weitz. Time: Arranged. Cost: $\$ 125$.

SOCIOLOGY 66 - Shamanism and the Teachings of Dor Juan.

A shaman is a term used by anthropologists to denote man or woman who is in direct contact with the spirit man or woman who is in direct cootact with the spm worid. The course examines the cutural manilest
tions of shamanism in several societies as well as various theoretical perspectives. Emphasis is given to recent investigations of the anthropologist Carolos Castaneda under the direction of the Yaqui shaman Don luan. The course focoses on the question of what can be learoed from the shamanic experience.

## SPECIAL 60 - An Introduction to Futurism.

A study of past civilizations and why they died. A review of present day Western civilization and its future. Course covers the following areas: The history and traditions of some of the great civilizations from the point of view of understinding their internal disintegration and afornat deaths. The use of Toyabee's The Study of Historyar for investigating the rise, decline, and rall of civilure tions. The use
of our culture.

SPECLAL 61 - Theatre and Music in London.
The course brings the student into direct contact with aspects of the current theatre and music scene in London. The core of the course is attendance at and evaluation of pertormances of at least six plays, two operas, tive baties to visit and to hear from practitioners in the arts: a lecture in theatre, a lecture-demonstration in music, a visit to a theatre academy, and a music academy. A trip to Stratford-on-Avon is optional but encouraged. Students have opportunities to visit places of historic interest. A general appreciation of the medium along with an introduction to life in Great Britain is part of the course.

SPECIAL 62 - Modern Archeological Research.
Fundamentals of modern research techniques. Focuses mainly on an Indian site in the Williamsport area. In addition to field work, there are class sessions to analyze Lutz. Time: Arranged. Cost: $\$ 15$.

SPECLAL 63 - Introduction to Coaching of Athletics.
Designed for the student who intends to become involved in the coaching of athletics. Introduces the student to problems, responsibilities, techniques, and and coaching basketball and football. Frerequisite: Prior approval of Chairman of the Physical Education Department.

SPECLAL 65 - Living Off the Land.

## ACCOUNTING 10 - Elementary Accouming Theory.

An introductory course in recording, classifying ammarizing, and interpreting the basic business ansaction. Problems on accounts and preparation of fonancial statements are these problems.

ACCOUNTING 30 - Cost and Budgetary Accounting Theory.

Methods of accounting for material, labor and factory ove thead expenses consumed in manufacturing using job order, process and standard costing. Application of cost accounting and budgeting theory to decision making in whe areas of make or buy, expansion of production and sales, and accounting for control are dealt with.
