of 1936, as treasurer of the Alumni Association. Also on the agenda was planning for the Greater Lycoming Banquet. The date has been set for Saturday, February 21, 1953 for both alumni and students. Don L. Larrabee is chairman of the speakers committee.

The Living Endowment Fund was reported to have 295 contributors.

The concluding business was the decision to join the American Alumni Council. This Council, which dates from 1913 when the Association of Alumni Secretaries was formed has as its aim, the furthering of friendly relations among its members; the interchange of ideas on alumni and educational problems; by the study of practices and policies of organized alumni work; and by the appraisal of alumni achievement.

A total of 549 colleges and universities throughout the U. S. are included in the membership.

AAUP Sponsors Lecture Series

The Lycoming College Chapter of the American Association of University Professors is sponsoring its second series of three public lectures. The first presentation was made by Professor Eric V. Sandin, head of the English department, January 15 on "Mark Twain—Jester or Cynic?"

The remaining two will be given by Dr. J. Milton Skeach, professor of psychology who will review his recent study on social adjustments, and Professor Kiplinger of the chemistry department will give an illustrated lecture on astronomy.

Dr. Marion R. Trabue, dean of the department of education at the Pennsylvania State College will be the guest speaker at the Greater Lycoming Banquet, it was just announced by Don Larrabee, chairman. Dr. Trabue's message will be of particular interest to Lycoming Alumni because of the expected addition of education courses to Lycoming's curriculum.

A member of the Board of Directors of Lycoming College, Dr. Seth W. Russel, assistant dean of the school of liberal arts at the Pennsylvania State College, will be the toastmaster for the evening.

Lycoming to be Represented at U.N. Model Meeting

Four students and a faculty member from Lycoming will participate April 1-3 in the annual Middle Atlantic United Nations General Assembly model meeting at Cornell University.

Dr. Loring B. Priest, professor of history, will accompany the delegates Peaslee Hoskins and Edward Younken, seniors, James Cendoma, junior, all of Williamsport, and Daniel Little, a senior, of Picture Rocks. George Shortess, Williamsport junior, will serve as an alternate.

Each college participating will have a delegate on each of the four committees paralleling those of the U. N.. The committees will be political and security, economic and social, trusteeship, and human rights.

Seven Lettermen on Current Warrior Team - Boast 6-2 Record

Now for the highlights of the games.

Lock Haven State Teachers

The Lycoming Warriors opened the 1952-53 season Wednesday, December 3 on a triumphal note by downing Lock Haven State Teachers 78-73.

Down Wilkes 93-91

The second and final game at home before the Christmas vacation was a thrilling victory over Wilkes 93-91. With seven seconds remaining, Jaime Nevins tapped in a rebound to give Lycoming Warriors its second straight win.

Vince Leta, a junior from Williamsport, set a new school scoring record in the course of the game as he tallied 36 points to surpass the former mark of 33 set by Billy Graff in 1951. Leta notched his points by dunking 13 baskets and 10 of 13 charity tosses.

Go On Road

The next three games the Warriors played were on the road. They won 2 and lost one, their only defeat so far.

Lycoming College won its third straight game with Mansfield State Teachers on the Mansfield floor. The final score was 76-66.

Senior Don Mosher was high scorer with 21 points.

First Defeat

December 13 saw the first defeat of the Warriors as they dropped a close one to fast-breaking Elizabethtown College 63-57.

Two competitors will probably not play a closer game all season.

The game was tied eight times, and Lycoming was right in the

thick of the fight until late in the last quarter when an Elizabethtown substitute entered the fray and scored eight quick points—his total for the night. Vince Leta paced the scorers for the night with 20 points.

Win Again

George Fortner pacing the way with 24 points, the Lycoming Warriors won their fourth game in five starts with a 74-70 win over Juniata in the Memorial Gymnasium in Huntingdon.

1953 Games

Starting off the new year right, the Lycoming Warriors ran roughshod over Juniata's Indians 97-74 on a return engagement on the Hilltop. The lead changed hands seven times and was tied on three occasions before Leta broke a 35-all deadlock late in the second period. Leta's 20 was high for the Warriors although Mosher, Fortner and Hawkins hit in double figures with 18, 15, and 14 respectively.

Lycoming strengthened its bid for a ranking position Saturday, January 10 by walloping Susquehanna University 110-60, setting a new scoring record for itself. The previous high was 102 points scored two years ago in a 102-65 rout of Mansfield State Teachers College.

George Fortner was high with 26 points although each of the five starters scored at least 13 points. Mert Wagner followed Fortner with 19. Then came Jaime Nevins, 16; Vince Leta 14, and Don Mosher, 13.

A three-game winning streak was at an end for the Lycoming Warriors Wednesday, January 14 as they were beaten by Lock Haven Teachers, 69-63. George Fortner was high scorer with 14 points.
