April 24, 1957

Dear Alumni

The current academic year has been marked by significant achievements in several areas of the College life.

Before the Fall term was underway the tone of the year was set by a check from the Ford Foundation for \$75,000 the first payment on the Foundation Grant to improve faculty salaries. As a result, substantial salary increases have been written into the contracts for next year. We are proud to mark this advance.

The Survey Team from the University Senate of The Methodist Church was here in November. Their report charts the course of the college for the next decade. It is forthright and prophetic. We will move forward into a very creative future.

FACULTY NEWS

Thomas G Barnes, Assistant Professor of History, will be in England from June through September undertaking research in printed and manuscript sources for an edition of legal records which the Somerset Record Society (England) will publish in 1958. He will also begin research for a contemplated three volume history of the Court of Star Chamber. His doctoral thesis in English local government, now being readied for publication, will be presented to the publishers during the summer.

Roger E. Cogswell, Assistant Professor of French, will make a trip to Canada to gather material for a study of the impact of American slogans on the French language in the province of Quebec.

Beginning in September, **Dr. John G. Linn** will join with the faculty. Dr. Linn comes from the faculty of Cornell University and will assume his duties as Associate Professor of English at Lycoming. He holds the degree Bachelor of Arts from Hamilton College, and a Master of Arts degree from Columbia University. In 1951 he received his degree Doctor of Philosophy from Cornell University.

He has served as a member of the faculty of International College, American University of Beirut, Lebanon; Roberts College, Istanbul, Turkey; and since 1946 at Cornell University.

Phil G. Gillette, Associate Professor of German and Spanish, will spend seven weeks in Mexico City, where he will attend the National University, earning additional graduate credit. Mrs. Gillette and daughter Carol expect to accompany Professor Gillette.

Logan A. Richmond, Instructor in Business Administration, will be in New York this summer to continue work toward his Master's Degree at New York University.

Michael M. Wargo has been elected to the faculty as an Assistant Professor of History. Mr. Wargo has been teaching for the past five years at the Williamsport Technical Institute. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree and a Master of Arts degree from Bucknell University. His Doctor of Philosophy studies are being taken at Western Reserve University.

A former instructor at Chamberlin-Hunt

Academy in Port Gibson, Mississippi, and Glenville State College, Glenville, West Virginia, Jerry W. Hodges joined the faculty in February as an Instructor in English. Mr. Hodges holds his Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees from George Peabody College. He also attended the University of Ottawa in 1956 where he took additional graduate work.

Mory Landon Russell, Assistant Professor of Organ, Piano, will complete a History of Music in Williamsport for the James V. Brown Library. This writing will also be work toward her Master of Arts degree from Pennsylvania State University.

The **Psychology Department**, during the Fall Semester, plans to study the relative effectiveness of small class instruction as compared to the group lecture method of instruction.

John W. Chandler, Assistant Professor of Art, will attend the first summer session at Boston University and after that will attend a Seminar in American Culture at Cooperstown, New York.

Taylor E. Miller, Academic Dean, and **W. Arthur Faus**, Assistant Professor of Philosophy, have been asked permission to have their names listed in the forthcoming issue of the Directory of American Scholars.

Elizabeth H. King, Instructor in Secretarial Science, will be taking work towards her Master of Arts degree at Pennsylvania State University.

NOTED ALUMNUS DIES

James B. Corson, '16, Latrobe industrialist, died at the Latrobe Hospital on April 16, 1957. Mr. Corson was president of the Pearce Woolen Mills. He was a director of the Woolrich Woolen Mills, and of the Charlton Water Company at Avis; president of the Latrobe Municipal Authority; a director of the National Wool Manufacturers' Assn.; a past president of the Latrobe Rotary Club and of its Community Chest.

An active churchman, he was president of the Board of Trustees of the Latrobe Methodist Church. He also served on the World Service and Finance Commission of the Pittsburgh Methodist Conference.

NEW DIRECTORS ELECTED

On March 12, 1957, the Preacher's Aid Society of the Central Pennsylvania Conference of The Methodist Church approved the nominations of, and thereby elected, three new

members to the Lycoming College Board of Directors. The three new Directors are: The Reverend Sheridan W. Bell, D.D., Mr. Horace S. Heim, and Miss Eva L. Keller.

Dr. Bell is the minister of Grace Methodist Church, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. Prior to his pastorate at Grace Church, he served five years as minister of the Williams Street Methodist Church, Delaware, Ohio, which is the college church for Ohia Wesleyan University.

Before going to the Williams Street Methodist Church, Dr. Bell served as Chaplain in the United States Navy. From 1937 until 1943, he was minister of a Methodist Church in Columbus, Ohio.

Following his graduation from Ohio Wesleyan University in '30, he served for two years as a member of the Membership Department of the Huntingdon Avenue Branch of the Boston Y.M.C.A.

The Reverend Bell did graduate work at the University of West Virginia where he received his Master of Arts degree in 1934. In 1937 he completed his theological work at Yale Divinity School where he received his Bachelor of Divinity degree. In 1954 he was honored by Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pennsylvania with the honorary degree Doctor of Divinity.

Horace S. Heim, Vice President and General Manager of Lycoming Silica Sand Company. Montoursville, Pa., was born February 10, 1903, in Eldred Township, Lycoming County, the son of Joseph A. and Clara Stabler Heim, whose ancestors were among the early settlers of Lycoming County.

Following his graduation from Montoursville High School, Mr. Heim went to work for

> Lycoming Silica Sand Company, of which Company he became Superintendent and, later, Vice President and General Manager. He is also on the Board of Directors of the Affiliated Companies.

> Long actively interested in the field of education, Mr. Heim has been a member of the Board of Directors of the Montoursville School District for the past ten years and is now serving as its President. He is also a member of the Lycoming County Board of School Directors.

Fraternally, Mr. Heim served as Worshipful Master of Eureka Lodge No. 335 F. & A. M. of Montoursville in 1935 and is a member of Baldwin II Commandery and Williamsport Scottish Rite Consistory.

Mr. Heim is a past president of the Montoursville Rotary Club, a member of the Board of Directors of the First National Bank of Montoursville, and a Trustee of the Montoursville Cemetery Company.

A member of Montoursville Methodist Church, he has held official positions in that church since 1930, and is currently President of the Board of Trustees.

Miss Eva Lister Keller, '13, will serve on the College Board of Directors as the Alumni representative. Miss Keller has served on the Alumni Association Board of

Directors and Executive Committee for the past fifteen years. She is a Past President and is currently serving as Recording Secretary.

ORIGINAL MUSICAL

The Lycoming College Players will present an original comedy on May 16th and 17th. SUMMER 'N GREASEPAINT was written by Otto L. Sonder, Jr., Assistant Professor of Sociology in collaboration with two students, Wallace Pelton, '57 and Richard Reimhold, '58. The music has been composed by Dr. Russell Graves, Assistant Professor of Speech, together with Jack Eyer, '59, Frederick Horn, '58, and Marjorie Kramer, '57. Jackie Lou Snyder, '58 assisted the music writers with arrangements.

The plot revolves around a group of college students and their dramatics professor who take an old barn for the summer to operate it as a summer theatre. After difficulty with the farmer who owns the barn, the group has financial difficulties when their wealthy backer learns that he cannot put up the operating funds for the summer. They also lose their opening play.

Plans are made to publish the book and music after the first presentation on the campus.

DR. YOON RECEIVES GRANT



Dr. Chai H. Yoon, Assistant Professor of Biology, has been granted \$1,850 by the National Muscular Dystrophy Research Foundation to assist in his research project to erase the shadow of muscular dystrophy.

Dr. Yoon will use the grant in his study of a condition known as "quivering" in the house mouse. His intrest is in discovering the pathological causes of the condition. Using a mouse colony of 200, the scientist is attempting to trace how heredity affects the "quivering" sympton.

Dr Yoon, formerly a member of the faculty at Ohio State University, joined the faculty at Lycoming last September. He served as research assistant in the department of zoology and etomology at Alma College in Michigan, where he took his undergraduate work. He received his doctorate from Ohio State University where he also taught genetics and anatomy. It was while he was at Ohio State that Dr. Yoon noted that a particular mouse in the colony exhibited symptons similar to muscular dystrophy.

Dr. Yoon, a native of Korea and former Korean Army captain, is married and the father of a 16-month-old daughter.

Coach David Busey Appointed Director of Athletics

David G. Busev. head football coach, has been appointed as Director of Athletics effective lune 1, 1957. As Director of Athletics, Coach Busey will have overall responsibility for the intercollegiate athletic pragram at the College. He will continue to discharge the re-

responsibilities of football coach.

A 23-year veteran of the coaching profession, Busey joined the staff at Lycoming College in 1954 when football was resumed after a discontinuance of four years. Last year the team had a 5 win and 3 loss season, highlighted by the defeat of Juniata thus ending their 25-game winning streak.

Cooch Busey retains his rank of Commander in the United States Naval Reserve and is the commanding officer of the Williamsport Reserve Unit. During World War II and immediately thereafter he served on the coaching staff at the United States Naval Academy, as Executive and Administrative Officer of the Ship Repair Facility on Guam, and as chief recreation officer, ComSubPac.

He began his coaching career in 1933 at Urbana High School in Illinois while an undergraduate at the University of Illinois. Two years later, he became director of physical education for that city's school system. Later he served as assistant coach at the University of Illinois, his Alma Mater.

Coach Busey is married and the father of three sons—David, Robert, and Donald. He holds the rank of Associate Prafessor of Physical Education on the Lycoming faculty.

CAGERS END 8 - 15 SEASON

Albert Wilson, the only member of the squad who will be lost by graduation, again paced the "Warriors" through their gruelling 23 game schedule. His overage of 16.4 points per game, while under his last year's average of 19.5 points, was sufficient to make him the team's high scorer. Wilson's all-around ability has earned him honorable mention among Methodist Colleges in Fred Russell's selections. appearing in the March issue of TOCETHER.

When asked to comment on the season this year, Coach Lawther said, "It is very evident that we were 'outshot'. The statistics show that our opponents scored on approximately 45% of their field goal attempts, and we scored on approximately 37%. This made the difference. I might add, that a 45% average over a 23-game schedule is an exceptionally good overage for Lyco's opponents."

In the free-throw cotegory, Cliff Smith led the "Warriors" with 45 points out of a possible 55 for an average of approximately 82%. Ron Kitt, center, dropped in 71 baskets out of 157 attempts for the high team average of 45%.

Since AI Wilson is the only senior on the squad, Coach Lawther will have an experienced nucleus around which to build next year's team. Such cagers as Smith, Kitt, Jim Jackson, Bob Clunk, Ron Hughes, and Frank Sullivan should pace the "Warriors" to a successful season.

GRAPPLERS WIN 2 LOSE 4

Coach Budd Whitehill's grapplers, handicapped by inexperience, ended wrestling's first season at Lycoming with 2 wins and 4 losses. The Coach and the team are to be congratu-

lated for such a fine showing in a sport that created a great deal of interest among the student body and gives every indication of becoming one of the College's most popular intercollegiate activities.

The team turned in victories over Elizabethtown College and Albright College, and dropped matches to Gettysburg College, Bucknell University, Bloomsburg State Teachers College, and Wilkes College.

'57 FOOTBALL SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

The Director of Athletics announced the 1957 football schedule at a recent meeting of the Athletic Committee. The schedule remains the same except that Albright College replaces Lebanon Valley College. It is anticipated that all of the home games will be played on the College Field and that there will be no night games.

ATHLETIC DEPT. ADDS COACH

Budd F. Whitehill, who coached the Lycoming wrestling team this year, has been added to the coaching staff of the Athletic Department. In this capacity he will assume leadership in the coaching of wrestling and baseball. Mr. Whitehill will also serve as head of the Intramural Athletic and Recreational program, and as Assistant football coach.

A graduate of Lock Haven State Teachers College, Mr. Whitehill has been teaching and coaching at the Hughesville High School.

here," opens a fifteen game schedule against Dickinson College on Wednesday, April 10. The first game scheduled with Bloomsburg State Teachers College was rained out and will be played as a doubleheader on Saturday, May 11th.

Coach Busey announced as a tentative lineup the following men: Freshman Fred Agnello from Indiana, Pa. will be the starting pitcher. Wayne Bohn, Yeagertown, Pa., or Jim Hart, Williamsport, Pa, will be his battery mate. Dick Kaluza, Montoursville, Pa., Barry Yerger, Mechanicsburg, Pa., Brian Jones, Mission, Kansas, and Mel Moskowkitz, Bronx, N. Y. will probably hold down the infield spots while Jim Sughrue, Montoursville, Pa., Charles Bonadio, Lock Haven, Pa., and Bill Smith, West Hazelton, Pa., will be in the outfield

ALUMNI BANQUET SPEAKER

Mrs. Samuel Hutchison, chairman of the Annual Alumni Day Committee, announced that Maxwell E. Hannum, Education Director, Eastern Division, National Association of Manufacturers, will be the speaker at the Alumni Banquet on June 1, 1957.
Mr. Hannum was barn in Ohio and re-

ceived his public school education in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He served with the A E F during World War I, 1917-1919. From 1919 until 1929 he worked as a reporter, feature writer, and assistant city editor for the Pittsburgh **Press**. During this time, he attended the University of Pittsburgh College of Economics and received his degree in 1922.

From 1928 - 1930 he owned his own publicity and advertising agency. In 1930 he assumed the position of Director of Publicity and Manager of the Bureau of News and Publications at the Carnegie Institute of Technology. From 1933 to 1945 he volunteered supplementary duty as head basketball coach.

In 1946 he left Carnegie Institute and went to Franklin & Marshall College, Lancaster, Pennsylvania, where he served as Assistant to the President and Director of Public Relations. While at Franklin & Marshall he was elected President of the American College Public Relations Association, 1948-1949.

Mr. Hannum assumed his present position with the National Association of Manufacturers in October, 1954.

The Alumni Banquet, at which Mr. Hannum will speak, will be held in the College Dining Room at 6:00 P. M.

The activities on June 1st will begin with registratian at the College from 9:30 A. M. until 12:00 noon. During the morning period there will be several small concerts by the Lycoming College Band, under the direction of Mr William Maxson, Instructor in Music. There will also be several guided tours of the College Campus in order that the Alumni may see the newest additions to Lycoming's physical plant.

Luncheon at 12:30 P. M. will be held picnic style on the tennis courts adjacent to the College Dining room. Tables will be designated for the reunion classes. It is hoped that all members of the reunion classes will make every effort to be present and to have lunch together. The Annual Meeting of the Alumni Association will be held immediately following the luncheon. At this meeting the officers and directors for the coming year will be elected.
