# Commencement-Baccalaureate Speakers Chosen

Emory Stevens Bucke, S.T.B., D.D., Editor, Minister, and Educator, will be the Commencement speaker at the exercises to be held on the campus on Sunday afternoon, June 1, at 4:00 p.m. He is a native of Williamsport, Pennsylvania where his father was a former Methodist minister. Dr. Bucke is presently the editor of the Zions Herald, The Independent Methodist Weekly as well as instructor of religious journalism, Boston University School of Public Relations. In 1947 he was a member of the Protestant delegation to Yugoslavia and to the Methodist Ecumenical Conference. Dr. Bucke received his A.B. and D.D. from American University and his S.T.B. from Boston University School of Theology. In April of this year he was 1 delegate from the New England Conference to the General Conference of the Methodist Church meetng in San Francisco.

One of the two gifts was an annuity in the amount of \$25,000. It was payable at the death of Mrs. Rich and is to be added to the endowment funds of the college. The income will be devoted to furthering Christian education.

The second gift is the sum of \$15,000 which Mr. Rich has directed shall be applied toward indebtedness on the John W. Long Library.

The large browsing room on the main floor of the new library is henceforth to be known as the Julia Trump Rich Memorial and will be appropriately marked with a bronze plaque.

The Rich family has been identified with the college for four generations and benefactions in excess of a quarter of a million dollars have come from them since the initial endowment fund campaign of 1903.
