This past winter, Lycoming College was added to the list of Colleges of Distinction, higher education institutions characterized by "...engaged students, great teaching, vibrant community and successful outcomes." Lycoming is one of sixteen Pennsylvania institutions to make the list. Such external recognition again signals what the College community has known for some time — that Lycoming offers a quality liberal arts education to talented, committed students who are taught by full-time, highly credentialed and experienced faculty.

Lycoming students are engaged in their education. Small classes enable students to receive personalized attention. Each year, students across majors present their academic projects in a wide variety of forums: from the Senior Art Exhibition to students sharing their teacher education portfolios; from colloquia series in which students report their research to senior music recitals. Lycoming also provides a number of unique offcampus experiences to complement their class curricula. As an example, eight Lycoming College students spent their summer working on projects to improve seven area watersheds. The students are interns with Lycoming College's Clean Water Institute. In May, seven Lycoming College students interested in international business took a month-long, intensive European business trip.

First, they spent three weeks in the heart of London where they reviewed financial, marketing and management issues through visits to London's financial district. Deutsche Bank. CNBC/Europe and Dow Jones/ Europe. After a weekend trip to Paris, they traveled for an additional week to Krakow, Poland, where they studied aspects of an emerging economy. Similar unusual experiences are to be found in the resumes of Lycoming's newest alumni. Many members of the Class of 2005 were accepted to competitive graduate programs, including those in such areas as business administration, immunology, student affairs administration, materials science and engineering, theology and medical school.

The success of our students while they are here and after graduation is impacted greatly by their working with

our talented faculty. Lycoming faculty have always been known as dedicated teachers. Lycoming College recently honored 39 of our faculty members for professional accomplishments in their fields during the year. Among them, they authored 5 books and 48 articles or poems, participated in 27 off-campus artistic presentations, presented 15 papers at professional conferences, and received a total of 12 grants and awards. Of particular note, Dr. David Witwer, Associate Professor of History and the Chair of the History Department, was awarded a year-long full fellowship from the National Endowment for the Humanities. In addition to that prestigions fellowship, Dr. Witwer also received a Research Fellowship from the Gilder Lehman Institute of American History. This second fellowship will support Dr. Witwer's research at Columbia University's Rare Book and Manuscript Library.

The Summer Issue of the Lycoming Magazine introduced the Mary Lindsay Welch Honors Hall, an historic 1880's building on Fourth Street, just to the south of Skeath Hall. Originally built as a social hall by some of the leading families of Williamsport, the facility has been redesigned to include a state-of-the-art music recital/lecture hall and the offices of our United Campus Ministry, community service, and The Scholars Program. It also contains a lovely, intimate chapel which contains an original stained glass window from the chapel in Old Main.

This year two faculty members retired, each after thirty-five years of service to Lycoming. Dr. David Rife, Professor Emeritus of English, taught legions of students the joys, pleasures, mysteries and intricacies of literature. His love of his field has always been evident to those he has taught and to those with whom he has worked. His growing interest in recent years in the field of Jazz Literature has led him to become a bibliographical authority in that area. Dr. David Franz, Professor Emeritus of Chemistry, integrated the goal of student/faculty research into his classes, into his department and into the very unique design and structure of the Heim Building. The combination of the three has opened educational opportunities for the students he taught and for generations of students to come. Well-known for his chemistry lab rendition of The 1812 Overture, he is even more remembered as a devoted teacher, mentor and colleague.

Dr. John A. Radspinner, Sr., Professor Emeritus of Chemistry, passed away April 18, 2005, at his home. He joined the Lycoming College faculty in 1957 and retired in 1987. The Radspinner Scholarship was established by Dr. Daniel E. Hill '61 and other former students'". .. to honor and recognize this beloved member's thirty years of service to Lycoming College and its students." Dr. Frances Skeath, Professor Emeritus of Mathematics, passed away on April 28, 2005. Dr. Skeath's teaching career spanned 43 years, 32 of which she devoted to Lycoming College. Gifts were made in her memory to the J. Milton Skeath Endowed Scholarship Fund so that students can study at Lycoming.

As the cost of delivering Lycoming's quality liberal arts education continues to grow, the Annual Fund takes on greater and greater importance. As a supporter of our 2004-05 Annual Fund, you have played a vital part in helping Lycoming students receive an excellent educational experience.

Thank you for your generosity this year. With your support, Lycoming College will continue to provide brighter futures for our students today and for many years to come.



Steven Johnson, Health System CEO Gives Convocation Address

Steven P. Johnson, president and CEO of the Susquehanna Health System, welcomed the Class of 2009 as the featured speaker at the College's New Student

Originally from Bernardsville, N.J., Johnson majored in criminal justice at Lycoming College, a decision that may have begun with a required course in Social Anthropology that

Johnson ownersees the 300-bed regional medical center and health system that serves 15 counties with three campuses in Lycoming County, over 3,000 employees, 200 physicians, and a 139-bed Skilled Nursing Unit.

For the past 7 years, SHS has been recognized as one of the "100 most wired hospitals" of the nation's 5,000 medical facilities.

Johnson also serves on the Board of Visitors of the Institute for Management Studies at Lycoming College. In 2003 he was named Person of the Year by the Lycoming County Brotherhood and in 2005, he was named one of the 100 business leaders in North Central Pennsylvania.

Lycoming College Freshmen Set a Geographical Record.

The Class of 2009 brings to Lycoming College more out-of-state students than ever before. For the first time, out-of-state students account for 38 % of Lycoming freshmen; a number that was only 17% as recently as 1998. This year's 368 freshmen come from 18 different states with hometowns ranging from Honolulu, Hawaii, and San Diego, California, to Chicago, Illinois; Memphis, Tennessee; New Orleans, Louisiana; and Austin, Texas.

James D. Spencer, dean of admissions and financial aid, credits the more national composition of the freshman class to Lycoming's growing reputation. "But these are also internet kids who find Lycoming College and are drawn to the Williamsport area or one of the College's courses of study."

While biology, business, English, and psychology remain popular majors with incoming freshmen, Lycoming's creative writing program has attracted many out-of-state students. Lycoming's fastest growing major is its archaeology program. Spencer points out that Lycoming is one of the few colleges its size to have its own archaeology dig site in Cyprus.

Just 8% of the Class of 2009 is comprised of commuter students. Some 40% of Lycoming's new students expect to compete in varsity athletics; 38% plan to continue long-term involvement with volunteer community services; 27% will participate in one or more of the musical ensembles; and 12% plan to participate in theatre.

Lycoming Students Work on Local Watersheds

"I'm having a great time. I got to canoe most every day on the Susquehanna River; I spend a lot of time outdoors; and there's lots of variety which keeps it interesting." Laura Lockard sums up her summer internship at Lycoming College, where she was one of eight students working on projects to improve the area's watershed.

The students are part of Lycoming College's Clean Water Institute, directed by Dr. Mel Zimmerman, professor of biology, who founded The Clean Water Institute in 1999. It is unique among small colleges.

The students worked on seven different watershed projects- in and around the West Branch of the Susquehanna River, Laura Lockard '05, Ephrata, Pa., conducted a water quality study of the West Branch from Lock Haven to Sunbury, Christy Bowersox '06. New Columbia, Pa., studied erosion. Tyler Machamer '08, Williamsport, Pa., assessed the dry hydrants of Lycoming, Sullivan, Tioga, Bradford, Wyoming, and Susquehanna Counties. Brandon Ford '06, Montoursville, Pa., collected data on two acid mine seeps. Amy Curry '05, Fallen Timber, Pa., completed the final plan of the Pine Creek River Conservation Plan. Lower down on the Susquehanna River watershed Brad Musser '06, Mifflinburg, Pa., and Katie Swanson '07, Eldred, Pa., worked on physical stream assessment of the tributaries of Buffalo. Creek. And, Allison Raymond '07, Edison, N.J., developed a website and stream restoration database.

Funding

Funding for the interns comes from a variety of sources including individual watershed associations. But a significant amount has come from the Growing Green Project, a state initiative through the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection. Since 1999, the CWI has received over \$200,000 in grants of its own.

In Great Company





Postcard From India - Paul Fochtman Making a Difference

It's a long way from the KDR lounge at Lycoming to the American School in Bombay, and the path has been a winding one for Paul Fochtman (business).

and held two positions in sales. While the money was good, I really found no value in what I was doing" writes Paul. "Not that sales doesn't have a great deal of value, it just didn't work for me. When I left Lycoming, I was well educated, vet I lacked the vision or passion for what I wanted to contribute to the world."

While waiting to start a job in pharmaceutical sales, Fochtman decided to visit his mother who was then Dean of the College of Nursing in Guam.
