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The $\mathbb{W}$ arrior football team added another successful chapter to the tradition that has been built by 30 -year head coach 1'rank Girardi this season by going 8-1 and finishing second in the Middle Atlantic Conference. Despite losing just one game and recording the program's $2^{7 \text { th }}$ consecutive winning campaign, Lycoming was overlooked for the NCAA playoffs by the national selection committee. While the decision was disappointing and frustrating for the players, coaches, and fans, the team can still be proud of their accomplishments this season and the legacy they both lived up to and continued to build.

Co-captains Tim Deasey, of Norwood, Pa., and Ryan Rupprecht, of Southampton, Pa., were two of the major reasons for the W'arriors' success. Deasey, named the MLAC Offensive Player of the Year, became Lycoming's most prolific running back of all time finishing his career holding or sharing 13 school records. Most prominent among those records are his singe-game rushing mark of 253 yards, his single-season rushing mark of 1,247 yards, and his career rushing mark of 2,868 yards. Rupprecht was named the MLAC Defensive Player of the Year for leading a Warrior defense that began the year with only three returning starters and ended the year as the top defense in the conference. Rupprecht led Lycoming with 78 tackles, six sacks, and 23 tackles-for-a-loss.

In addition to Deasey and Rupprecht, the Warriors had seven other players named conference all-stars for their performance on the field. Tom Zulkowski, of Frackville, Pa., was named a $1^{\text {st }}$-team tight end for leading Lycoming in receptions with 40 catches for 500 yards and four touchdowns. Josh Albeck, of Allentown, Pa., was named a $1^{\text {sts}}$-team offensive lineman for leading a $W$ 'arrior unit that featured three sophomores and pased the way for 178.4 yards of rushing per game. Jake Davis, of Nazareth, Pa., broke up 14 passes, including a pair of interceptions to earn $1^{\text {st}}$-team defensive back honors.

Kyle Bingaman, of Lykens, Pa., was named a $2^{\text {nd }}$-team wide receiver after leading Lycoming in receiving yards with 578 yards on 39 catches. Matt Mendola, of Dunmore, Pa., was named a $2^{\text {nd }}$-team offensive lineman for his performance at the center of the Warriors' front five. Matt Henrich, of Huntingdon, Pa., was named a $2^{\text {ndd }}$-team defensive back. Henrich recorded six interceptions for Lycoming and broke up a total of 13 passes. Ricky Lannetti, of Philadelphia, Pa., rounds out the list of $\mathbb{W}$ arriors honored as a $2^{\text {nd }}$-team kick returner. Lannetti averaged 20.4 yards per kickoff return and 10.8 yards per punt return, including two returns for touchdowns.

The senior mid-fielder earned $2^{\text {nd }}$-team honors after leading Lycoming in scoring last season with six goals and seven assists. Within the conference, Malishchak ranked third in assists-per-game and ninth in goals-per-game.


With a roster of 21 players that featured 16 freshmen and sophomores, LJycoming's men's soccer team suffered from inexperience at times during the 2001 season. Playing an extremely strong schedule, the Warriors finished the season at 6-11-1. The team graduates only four seniors from this year's squad, so head coach Scott Kennel is very optimistic about his team's future.

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The Warrior women's soccer team took major strides forward in 2001, improving to 7-9-1 just one year after a $3-$ 14 season. Lycoming battled back from a slow start to win five of their final eight matches. Despite the graduation of four seniors, the future looks bright for the Warriors with the majority of the team returning for a run at the conference playoffs in 2002.

Lycoming will, however, miss the offensive talents of senior Donna Mongiello, of North Salem, N.Y. Mongietlo led the Warriors in scoring with 14 goals and six assists this season. She also tallied the game-winning goal in three of the team's seven victories. Mongiello also broke several school records during the 2001 season, setting new marks for goals and points in a both a single-season and a career. For her efforts on the field, Mongiello was recognized as a $1^{\text {st }}$-team MAC Freedom Conference all-star.

The W'arriors did extremely well in head-to-head competition going 4-0 on the season with wins over Wilkes (twice), Scranton, and Misericordia. They also improved their performance in tournaments, including a $12^{\text {th }}$ place finish at the MAC championships just a year after placing $14^{\text {th }}$.

Junior Mike Passilla led the team with an average score of 84.27 per round. He shot a 129 over 27 holes at the conference championship. Sophomore Nick Eger was second on the squad with an 84.77 average, including a team-best 125 at the MAC tournament.

## Men's Tennis

The Lycoming men's tennis team recorded the program's most successful season in nearly two decades in 2002 when they finished with an overall mark of 5-5.

The Warriors were led by senior Scott Moerschbacher and sophomore Bernardo Urdaneta. Moerschbacher was the team's number one singles player, compiling a record of 4-4 during the regular season. Urdaneta played at number two singles for Lycoming recording an impressive mark of $7-2$, including a victory in the first position versus Scranton.

The duo also teamed up to compete as the Warriors' top doubles team. During the regular season, the pair went 6-2 to earn the fourth seed in the conference tournament. Once at the MAC championships, Moerschbacher and Urdaneta won three consecutive matches to advance to the semifinals before falling to the top seeded team from Drew.


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## Women's Tennis

The Lady Wharriors tennis team turned in its $9^{\text {th }}$ consecutive winning season with a sparkling 9-2 record. Under the direction of head coach Deb Holmes, Lycoming lost just one regular season match before falling to eventual conference champion Moravian in the semifinals of the MAC tournament.

The team was led by the junior tandem of Cricket Temple, of Hughesville, Pa., and Meredith Moerschbacher, of Montoursville, Pa . Temple went $7-2$ during the regular season at first singles for the $\mathbb{W}$ arriors, while Moerschbacher was a perfect $10-0$ in the second position. The duo also combined to go 9-1 as Lrcoming's top doubles team. Both athletes were named MAC Freedom Conference $1^{\text {ss }}$-team all-stars for their performance.

Freshman Pamela Zeger, of Potomac, Md., was another highlight of the Warriors' season. Zeger compiled a regularseason singles record of $8-1$, competing at every position except first and second. She also went 9-2 in doubles action, teaming up primarily with Heidi von Schwedler. Zeger's impressive entrance into collegiate tennis was capped when she was named the Rookie of the Year for the Conference.

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When first-year head coach Jerry Hammaker took the reigns of Lycoming's swimming program, his goals were simple - to build the team into a power not just in the Middle Atlantic Conference but also in the nation. Lofty goals to say the least, but after a stellar 2001-2002 season it appears as if Hammaker's troops are well on their way.

Both teams made major statements during the dual-meet season with the women's squad going undefeated at $12-0$ to win the regular-season conference title and the men's team going $8-2$ to share the regular-season conference crown. Their dual-meet success carried over to the conference championship meet where the women finished second in the 11 -team field and the men placed sixth out of eight teams.

Freshman Rebecca Fox led the women's team throughout the season and placed in the top-six in three individual events at the MAC championships, including a second-place finish in the 1,650 free. She also broke three school records during the season, setting new marks in the 500, 1000, and 1,650 freestyles events.

Sophomores Jessica Amadore and Karen Turpin, and junior Andrea Rapach were also major point-scorers for the Warriors during the 2001-2002 campaign. Amadore won a conference title in the 50 freestyle while also placing in the 100 backstroke and 100 freestyle. Turpin placed in three events, as well, with her top finish being a third place in the 200 butterfly. Rapach picked up a second place finish in the 50 freestyle and added places in the 100 backstroke and 100 freestyle. Freshman Karissa Brown turned in a solid rookie campaign, setting a new school record in the 100 backstroke and placing in two events at the conference meet. Overall, Lycoming's women swimmers also set new school records in the 200 - and 400 -free relays and the 400 -medley relay this past season.

The Warrior men lacked the depth that made the women's team a strong competitor at the conference meet, but still performed well. Freshman Josh Hogan turned in three place-winning performances, including a fourth in the 100 backstroke. Sophomore Chris DeZago also placed in three events, highlighted by a fifth in the 1,650 freestyle. Senior Greg Brown also helped to lead Lycoming's men's team, placing in two events.

The 2001-2002 version of the Lycoming College men's basketball team used an exciting style of explosive offense and versatile defense to turn in a memorable and historic season. The $\mathbb{W}$ arriors won the program's first-ever Freedom Conference title, qualified for and won a game in the NCAA playoffs, and provided numerous highlights en route to an overall record of $20-8$ - just the second time in the history of the program that a team has won 20 games in a single campaign. The team also claimed three conference all-stars, including the league's most valuable player, and the Coach-of-the-Year in sec-ond-year head coach Terry Conrad.

The season opened full of possibility with eight wins in their first nine games. The middle of the schedule provided more tallies in the loss column but also built the foundation for the confidence that would carry the team late in the year. Losses to nationally recognized programs Catholic and Marymount during a span of four games in six days made the team realize they could play with anyone. That newfound confidence led Lycoming to six wins in their final seren regular-season contests. The Warriors then went on to defeat Scranton at home and King's on the road to claim the Freedom Conference championship. The squad then added the program's third NCAA tournament victory with a $78-59$ win over Gettysburg before falling to Randolph-Macon, 62-79, in the second round.

Lycoming was led by junior Tommy W'esner, senior Chris Napier, and sophomore Matt Stackhouse. W'esner was the squad's most explosive player on the offensive end as evidenced by his conference-high 17.4 points-per-game average. Wesner was honored as a first-team all-star and the MVP of the conference for his performance.

Napier was the team's second-leading scorer with 15.4 markers per contest and second-leading rebounder with 6.6 boards per game. Napier was named a first-team all-star for the second consecutive season and ends his career as a Warrior with 1,468 points - fourth best in school history.

Stackhouse came into his own as a collegiate athlete this season and provided Lycoming with an inside threat that balanced the Warriors' outside sharp shooters. For the season, he averaged 13.7 points and a team-high 8.6 rebounds per game. But
 perhaps more impressive, over the final five weeks of the season, including the conference and NCAA playoffs, Stackhouse led the team with 18.7 points and 9.5 rebounds per game. His breakout season earned him second-team all-star honors from the conference.

Ljcoming also received significant contributions from several role players, including seniors Jason Black, Nick Tagliaferri, Rob Johnson, and Thomas Renner. Black was an often-overlooked scoring threat from the outside. He led the team with 27 points in the conference championship win over King's College. Tagliaferri, Johnson, and Renner helped the team form an identity through their leadership and experience.

# Wresting 



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Despite a starting line-up that featured no seniors and five freshmen, head coach Roger Crebs led the Warrior westling program to its fifth 20 -win season with a dual-match mark of 21-4 for the 2001-2002 season. lycoming also sent three grapplers to the NCAA Division IIl National Tournament and welcomed home its $37^{\text {th }}$ All-American.

With questions surrounding the team's youth and lack of experience, the W'artiors opened the season ranked $20^{\text {th }}$ in the nation. Solid performances early in the schedule and dual-match victories over other tanked teams quickly moved Lycoming up the polls to a high of $6^{\text {th }}$ heading into the NW゙CA/Cliff Keen National Duals. The Warriors closed the year with a thirdplace finish at the Middle Atlantic Conference championships where they crowned three individual champions.

Sophomore transfer Mike W'aldron was the team's most consistent performer recording a mark of $38-3$ by season's end. His perfect record versus conference opponents during the regular season earned him the top seed at 133 pounds for the conference tournament. Waldron took full advantage winning an MAC title in his first attempt and earning a trip to the National Tournament. At the NCAI Championships, W'aldron went 4-2 to earn All-American status as a fourth-place finisher. All four of his victories came by pins with a total time of just $5: 26$. Waldron recorded 22 pins for the season.

Also winning conference championships were junior Jon Neve at 197 pounds and freshman Andy Squires at 141 pounds. Neve went 15-7 for the season with eight pins. He went 2-2 at the national tournament with his losses coming against the top two seeds at $19^{-}$. Squires tallied a 22-10 record in his rookie season. He also went 2-2 at the NCAA championships.

Three other Wharriors also recorded individual 20-win seasons. Freshman T.J. Hunsberger was $21-15$ at 125 pounds in his inaugural season; freshman Corey Mowery went 27-9 at 149 pounds as a rookie; and junior Jeff Tierney was 25-12 at 184 pounds.

As a team, Lycoming finished $17^{\text {th }}$ in the nation at the NCAA National Tournament.


## Softball



With only two seniors and a pitching staff with only nine games of collegiate experience, 2002 could easily have been considered a rebuilding year for the Lycoming softball program. Head coach Christen Ditzler, however, molded the young team into a competitive unit that finished third in the regular season in the Middle Atlantic Freedom Conference and qualified for the post-season for the seventh time in nine years. They ended the season with a record of 17-17, laying the foundation for winning campaigns in the years ahead.

Freshman pitcher Amanda Gery was a huge part of the Warriors' success appearing in 22 games to compile a record of 128. In 137 innings pitched, she allowed just 26 earned runs for an ERA of just 1.33 while striking out 86 batters. For her performance in her first collegiate season, Gery was named a first-team conference all-star and the rookie-of-the-year for the league.

Offensively, Lycoming was led by a pair of conference all-stars. Senior Adrienne Wydra provided the speed at the top of the Warrior lineup. Wydra led the team with 34 hits and a batting average of 304 . She also swiped a team-high 10 bases during the season. Freshman Amy Curry added the power in the heart of Lycoming's order. Curry's 30 hits and .303 batting average were both second on the squad while her 23 runs-batted-in and four homeruns led the team.


## Women's Lacross



The loss of a talented senior class from a year ago and the scheduling of stronger competition led to fewer wins for the women's lacrosse team, but it did not slow the progression of the orerall program. The Warriors finished $7-8$ overall in 2002 but went $4-4$ in the MLAC to set a new mark for conference victories. Lycoming will look for new leadership of the women's lacrosse program in 2003 as head coach Katherine Roberts has resigned to continue her education.

In 2002, the Warriors were led by two-time conference allstar Lauren Erangelist. A sophomore, Evangelist led the squad in nearly every statistical category, including goals with 32 and assists with nine. She also was responsible for the majority of the team's face-offs.

Adding hope to the future of the program is a very talented group of athletes in the class of 2005. Erica Likens was the team's second leading scorer in her first collegiate season with 31 goals and seven assists. Ashley Rowe contributed at both ends of the field with 23 goals, four assists, and 64 groundballs. Beth Weixel was third on the squad with 22 goals and seven assists, despite never having played lacrosse prior to the season. Colleen Clarke provides long-term stability in the cage for Lycoming. In her tookie campaign, Clarke recorded a 9.07 goals-against-average while making 167 saves.


## Men's Lacrosse



Many question marks surrounded the Warrior lacrosse program entering the 2002 season. The loss of a talented senior class and the team's first and only head coach had fans wondering if the level of success previously achieved could even be maintained, let alone surpassed. Lycoming, however, quieted all skeptics by going 12-5 and returning to the MAC Championship game under the direction of first-year head coach Shawn Rosa.

After opening the season with a mediocre 5-4, the Warriors reeled off seven consecutive victories to secure their fourth consecutive winning season and a return trip to the conference title game. Lycoming came up just shy of Widener University, falling 9-8 to finish as runner-up.

The 2002 Warrior attack was led by a pair of conference all-stars in sophomores Sang Duong and Dan Wilcox. Duong led the team with a total of 71 points on the year, scoring 29 goals while assisting on 42 others. Wilcox was the squad's leading goal scorer with 43 tallies. He also recorded 12 assists.

In the midfield, senior Buddy Temple was named a conference all-star for the second consecutive year. Temple was Lycoming's third-leading scorer with 27 goals and 14 assists. Sophomore Frank Loughran played more of a defensive role as a long-stick middie, but was also honored as a conference all-star.

Nichael Mack, also a sophomore, anchored the Warriors' defense to earn his first conference all-star honor. Mack typically guarded the opponent's top offensive threat. He also picked up 43 groundballs on the season.

With the loss of only six seniors to graduation, the future continues to look bright for the Lycoming men's lacrosse program as they search for their first conference championship.
