

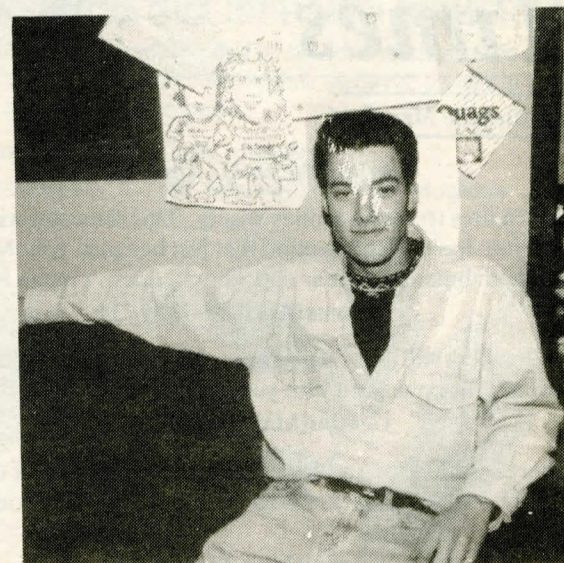
Do you believe that the presidential candidates ever intend to keep their campaign promises?

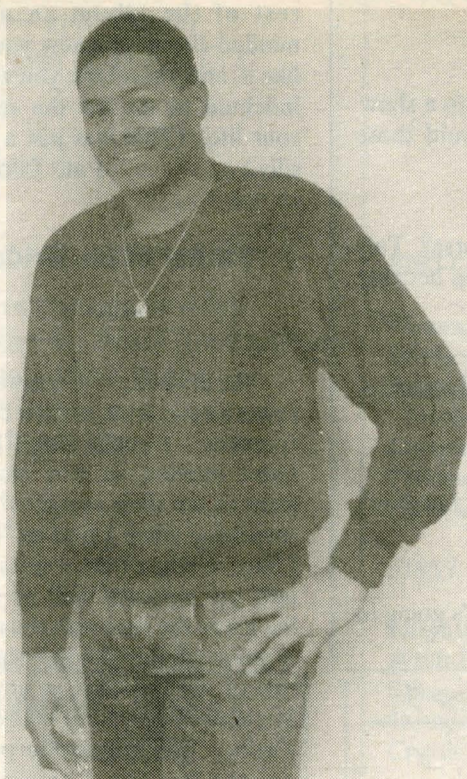
