ASACC gears up for Washington

The American Student Association of Community Colleges (ASACC) held its annual National Leadership Conference in New Orleans, LA, over the summer. In attendance for MCCC were the two Student Government Association presidents from Central and West campuses, Matt Detwiler and Jim Beller, respectively. Also in attendance was Bridget Panza, assistant director of Student Affairs, West Campus.

Keyed to the needs and skills of both students and advisors, the conference centered on enhancing student leadership in three rolls:

1. Consumer voice of the campus.

2. Responsible partner in institutional advocacy.

3.Ombudsman-problem solver on behalf of students unjustly served by the campus.

The purpose that drove this activity-like every other ASACC activity-was leadership and education for students. To enhance organizational, networking, interpersonal, teambuilding, advocacy and citizenship skills.

During the conference, the ASACC student board also met to help shape the position of ASACC during the Washington D.C. conference, which will be held in March. Issues that will be placed on ASACC's top priority list are:

1. Increasing the Pell Grant.

2. Increasing the amount/wage of the Student Work Study Pro-

3. Increasing childcare programs. (The current funding falls \$5 million short of the program's promise.)

Any member of MCCC's student body who receives a Pell Grant or Work Study should fell free to Matt Detwiler at Central Campus or Jim Beller at West Campus. Both Detwiler and Beller are conducting research on the financial aid that students a MCCC receive. The collected material will be compiled and used to show local, state and national leaders how effective the money spent on education is in the community and how it improves individuals' lives as a

In March, this data will be shared with the U.S. Congress through personal discussions with Pennsylvania's representatives. The more information available to share with Congress, the stronger the case can be made to increase funding to these pro-

Also, the issue of childcare is a major concern. By letting Detwiler and Beller know how the loss of childcare facilities at MCCC will affect your college career, the information can be used to show Congress that funds should, and must be, increased.

As students, we have chosen to attend a community college to better ourselves. However, it's the students that make the college better as a whole. Help us help the students of not only MCCC, but students across the nation as well so that our nation can be the best that it can be.
