Montgomery County Community College held two information sessions for former students of the Plymouth Meeting Campus of the Computer Learning Center. The purpose of the sessions was to present some of the options available to these students in continuing to pursue their education. The sessions were designed to generate a free flow of information, both from

College personnel to the students and from the students to College personnel. The nature of the recent events and the needs of these students demand more than merely routine offerings by MCCC, so the College hoped to gain more insight into the specific needs of the students to aid in determining exactly what assistance the College will be able to offer. After a brief introduction, students met individually or in small cohorts with College staff to discuss their needs.

sequences of courses, both credit and non-credit, which can provide these students with the skills necessary to obtain the computer certifications for which they have been preparing.


