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College Writers Conference Hosts Michael Cunningham

"Writers are murderers," author Michael Cunningham said on Friday, November 14, in his keynote address for the annual Montgomery County Community College Writers' Conference. He was talking about the critical editing writers need to do when they write, even at the expense of their characters. Cunningham has written four novels, including The Hours, which won the Pulitzer Prize in 1999 and was later adapted for film. He has also written one nonfiction book and his work has been printed in numerous notable publications, including The New Yorker and The Paris Review. He spoke for almost an hour on the writing process, his works, and his experiences as an author, including the beginning of his love of Virginia Wolfe, which became his inspiration for The Hours. At fifteen, Cunningham tried to impress a girl only to be asked, "Have you ever thought of being less stupid?" The next day, he picked up Virginia Wolfe's Mrs. Dalloway at the library and fell in love with a book for the first time.

Cunningham's speech was only the beginning of the conference's events. Saturday brought a host of lectures and

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

workshops for aspiring writers. A panel of agents and editors opened the day's events, giving their perspectives on the writing industry, as well as answering questions from the audience. Pre-registered conferees also had an opportunity to give a five minute pitch of their book ideas to one of the agents who had been on the panel. Later sessions offered workshops in the art of writing fiction, poetry, scriptwriting, and even comics and graphic novels. Tutorials on the business of writing also ran throughout the day, on topics including literary law and crafting book proposals.
