To Add Three Teachers To School Staff

Board Okays Plan For Accident Insurance Set-Up

Looking ahead to the 1954-1955 school term, the Derry Township Board of School Directors have authorized Superintendent of Schools Raymond H. Koch to employ an a d d i t i o n a l elementary school teacher, an additional industrial arts teacher and an additional academic teacher.

The added positions on the faculty were made necessary by the continued rise in enrollment in the schools.

The school directors, at their regular December meeting, also gave official approval for application for insurance policies to protect both pupils and school employees in case of accident from the time they leave home until they return home after classes.

The policies authorized by The policies authorized by the board permit the school to offer the accident policies to parents at a cost of \$1.25 per year. The World Insurance Company of Omaha, Ne braska, was selected to provide the policies, which are expected to be available sometime in January.
