Courted Wife Beside Her Dying Husband

John Melkovitz and Annie Charni, both foreigners, who have been in this country about one year, were married at the parsonage of St Mary's Catholic Church by the rector, the Rev. Father Huygen.

The groom stated that they were sweethearts in the old country, while the woman's first husband was still alive. He said the husband had consumption and his wish was that he might look upon the courtship of his wife to the man who was to keep the family after his death. The pair would meet in the bedroom of the sick husband and spend many hours together discussing future arrangements. The husband told his wife he was satisfied to die, since he knew that his wife and babies would be well treated.

The future husband stood at the dying husband's bedside and bid him farewell. He promised he would keep the family together and give them a home as long as he lived.

Halifax Dogs Are Quarantined

The mad dog scare which has been going about the town for the past ten days, was brought to a climax when word was received from the State Department ordering Burgess Chubb to have all dogs of the borough quarantined for a period of 100 days. The scare is the result of a dog belonging to George W. Bowman going mad and biting Alfred Bowman and Ernest Koppenheffer. It also bit a number of dogs before being shot. The two young men, upon learning that the dog had the rabies, went to a Pasteur institute at Baltimore, where they are receiving treatment.

To Fight Curfew Law

The right of a borough to enforce a curfew ordinance is to be tested in the Appellate Courts. Counsel for John Baker, of Steelton, have decided to take an appeal from the decision of the Dauphin County Courts sustaining the borough authorities in enforcing a curfew regulation. They take the position that boroughs have no right to make such regulations. It is said to be the first time the question has been carried to the higher courts, and the result will be awaited with interest throughout the State.
