## HERSHEY AGAIN WINS FROM NEW CUMBERLAND

Saturday's Game a Close and Interesting One. Hershey Playing Superior Ball

Hershey's great ball team journeyed to New Cumberland on Saturday last and before a crowd of widely excited fans numbering a thousand, handed the home players their first defeat of the season on their own grounds. It was one of the finest exhibitions of the great national pastime that has been given in this section for many moons, and the writer has not witnessed better ball in all its departments, even on the grounds of

One lonely hit was made from the deceptive delivery of Matthews in the first eight innings, and New Cumberland would never had a look in had he not momentarily lost the location of the plate in the last half of the ninth. With two on the bases and one out, things for a moment looked discouraging for Hershey, but Matty soon rallied and the big stickers were again at his mercy, and the best they could do was to get one run over.

Every man on the Hershey team played brilliantly, and but for an excusable fumble by Saylor in the ninth their team play was perfect. Snake Potteiger made a wonderful stop of a hard grounder that made the fans sit up and take notice, and it came at a critical part of the game when to have missed it would have meant two runs for New Cumberland, and possibly the game. Miller opened up the batteries in the very first inning with a hot single over second, and took second on Shaub's infield out. Pink Saylor drove another almost over the same spot and Miller scored. Again in the ninth, Shaub hit a grounder between first and second, and scored on Saylor's long two-bagger, to left centre.

New Cumberland's only score came in the ninth, Stonsifer got a life on Saylor's fumble, and took second on Embich's short hit to right. Strickler batting for Watterman, hit safely to right scoring Stonsifer and putting Embich on second. Murphy tapped to Shaub, advancing Embich to third,

Snell got into a hole trying to "squeeze" Embich over with the run to tie, and finally succumbed to a fast drop, with Ashenfelter up, a hit meant a tie, but Matty was equal to the emergency, and fielded the batter's weak tap along the first base line to Shaub's waiting mit, and the game was over and Hershey once more the victor.

It is a great pity that Our Home Team does not receive better encouragement at home than they do, for Hershey can boast of as good a team as there is for miles around, and they should be well patronized. With such a team and with a playing field, and every comfort and convenience for spectators, such as there is none better in the State, the big concrete stand should be packed as well as the bleachers, every time the team plays at home.
