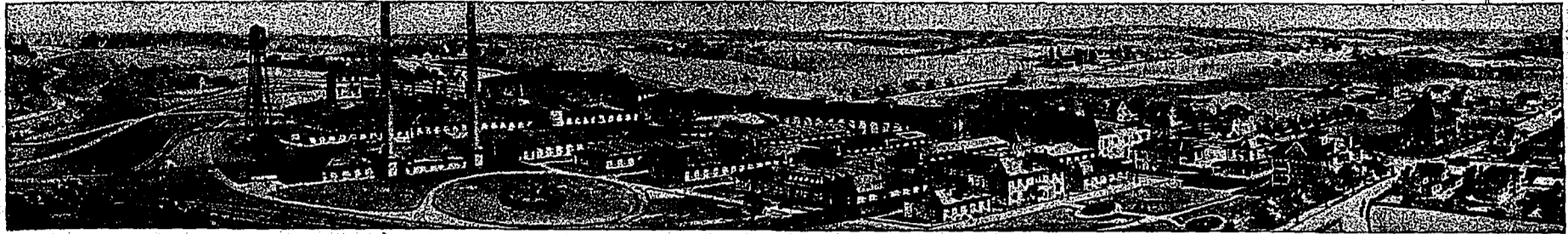

This will be the third number of the course. The attraction will be Hendrickson and Rosani, magicians, jugglers, and illusionists.

Deer in Hershey Park Poisoned

The Second Peafowl Has Also Been Shot— Found Dead Last Week

ON the first day of the new year when Frantz Zinner, the keeper of the animals in Hershey Park, was on his morning rounds, feeding the animals, he was surprised when only eleven of the fifteen deer in the enclosure came to feed. On investigation he found the others lying over a bank sick, one was seriously so. Immediately Mr. Zinner phoned for Dr. Fox, of Hummelstown, who came, and began treating the deer. All efforts to save the one were in vain and it died about ten o'clock in the morning. A post mortem examination revealed the fact that the deer had been poisoned. Two of the other three that had gotten hold of the poison have since gotten well, but the third is not expected to live.

The exact nature of the poison given the animals has not been determined. The deer that have been affected have suffered greatly, for the one that died

had broken its back while suffering from the agony after the poison had taken effect.

It has not been found out who has done the poisoning, but certain parties are under suspicion.

This is not the first thing of the kind that has occurred. Last week the second of the peafowls was found dead by Mr. Zinner. It had been shot with a 22 caliber bullet while it was sitting on a bench in the orchard. Its mate was also shot some time ago.
