APIARY NOTES

There is no denying the fact that stimulative feeding in the spring increases the amount of brood reared and makes the colony rich in bees for the clover flow that comes later on.

In setting the colonies outdoors jar them as little as possible. As soon as they are placed upon their summer stands give them some added protection in the form of building paper wrapped about the hives, as this will save a world of trouble.

A profitable industry is being developed on many of the government irrigation projects in the introduction of honey. The quality of this honey is superior. The flavor is exceptionally fine and the color clear and sparkling. Alfalfa is the chief source from which the bees secure their supply.

In all your operations with bees you must use gentleness. All quick, sudden jars and motions irritate them. Work slowly and carefully and you have nothing to fear. If they sting you and it swells your flesh your system will become accustomed to the poison and soon it will not annoy you any more than the prick of a pin, and it is an excellent preventive of rheumatism.
