Historical Society Anniversary

Plans are being laid by the Dauphin County Historical Society for its forty-third anniversary to be held June 13. At the meeting of the society last week several valuable donations were made to the organization.

Indians Licensed to Marry

Two Indians, William J. Owl and Maria Wright, Cherokee Indians, were issued a license to marry at the Dauphin county courthouse Monday morning. Both are heads of a reservation school in North Carolina. Their courtship began at the Carlisle Indian school some years ago. They will spend their honeymoon in New Jersey.

Children Collect 10,000 Cocoons

Upward of 10,000 cocoons of the bagworm have been collected this spring by school children, of Harrisburg, in a contest inaugurated by the Civic Club, the prizes being children's books on birds. Harry Conner collected 4386 and Ruth Burgess 3086. No others approached these two, but some other good scores were made.

Nurses Receive Diplomas

Miss Margaret Fathergill, of Canada, and Miss Alice Artz, of Lebanon were graduated at the Nurses School of the Good Samaritan Hospital, Lebanon, on Friday evening and were presented with their diplomas. A program was carried out and a number of friends and members of the hospital staff attended.

Boy Killed In Runaway

On Thursday afternoon, John Michael, the twelve year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Michael, of Lebanon, was killed by having his brains dashed out against rocks in a runaway. The boy had taken a horse out to graze and sitting down while the horse grazed put the tie strap around his neck. The horse became frightened and ran dragging the boy after it for a half mile. The boy was dead when the horse was stopped.

Steel Plant Has Record Month

The rail mill department of the Pennsylvania Steel Company, of Lebanon, had its biggest output for three years during the month of April. During May the department expects to pass the 40,000 ton mark. At present they are working on a 2,000 ton order for the Lehigh Valley railroad.

New Bell Phone Building

The Bell Telephone Company has let a contract for the erection of a new building at Eighth and Chestnut streets in Lebanon. The new building will cost \$19,622 and must be completed by September 30 under penalty of \$25 forfeiture by the contractor for every day he is late. The contract is let to F. W. Van Loon, of Philadelphia. John T. Windrin, of Philadelphia, is the architect.

Canoe Capsizes During Fast Race

At the social of the Rescue Hose Company of Middletown there was a canoe race and a two-mile running race. The canoe race was won by Frank Bryan and Charles Brubaker and the two-mile race was won by Herman Judy. A straw hat was given to each of the winners. In the canoe race Messrs. Wesley and Daniel Treichler were rounding the bend at the junction of the Swatara creek and the Susquehanna river when they were caught in a swell of a steamboat and their canoe capsized. After struggling about in the water for about five minutes they were rescued by Mr. Parsons with his motorboat. The canoe was then righted and towed to shore.
