**MRS. FANNIE MOYER DIED AT HER HOME IN DERRY CHURCH YESTERDAY NOON**

After being confined to her bed since sustaining a stroke of heart trouble three and a half months ago, Mrs. Fannie Moyer, died at her home in Derry Church yesterday, at 12.30 in the afternoon. After recovering from the first effect of the stroke in February hopes for her recovery were entertained, but since a second stroke a few weeks later she has been being very low.

Mrs. Moyer passed her sixty-fifth birthday in January. She has lived in her late home for many years. Her husband, M. B. Moyer, died twenty-three years ago.

The funeral service will be held at the house on Monday at 2 o'clock followed by a brief service at the church.
