School Directors For Derry Township to Be Chosen. Much Interest Aroused Among Voters.

ON Saturday, September 30, 1911, between the hours of two and eight p. m., the voters of Derry township will select, by nomination, five of its citizens to serve as school directors, for terms of two, four and six years. The dominant party, the Republican, has named as its men to stand for its nomination, Albert W. Snavelly, for the six year term; Harry M. Witman, of Swatara Station, and Christian M. Meckley, of the first precinct, of Derry, for the four year

term and Albert B. Shenk, of Vian, and Daniel M. Hershey, of Hershey, for the two year term.

In selecting these candidates the party leaders were scrupulously careful to choose men of honesty and well known ability, men whose private lives were above reproach and whose business ability was well known to the voters of the township. It is to be hoped that the voters will discriminate not on account of party affiliation or geographical location, but with due consideration will cast their ballots for the men who stand for character and honesty of business purpose, for the best interest of the school, the general welfare and intellectual uplift of the community.—VOTER.
