L. & C. LINE DEEDS LAND TO LEBANON

City Now to Have Street a 56 Foot Boulevard

At a meeting between the sub-committee of the councilmanic Highway body of the city of Lebanon, and the representatives of the Lebanon and Campbelltown Street Railroad Company, at Twelfth street and Campbelltown Road, on Tuesday afternoon, plans were formulated which may result in the acquisition by the city of a street 56 feet wide, along the Campbelltown Road from Twelfth to Sixteenth streets.

The representatives of the Hershey line proposed to deed the railway right of way from Twelfth street to the city line, a property which cost them \$500, to the city and in return the railway company is to receive the same franchise rights which apply to the line in Lebanon. This is a big concession.

Messrs. P. S. Kreiser and Jerre Greiner, of the Twelfth Street Heights, have signified their willingness to deed an additional twenty-five feet south of the railway to the city, thus putting the railway tracks in the center of the broadest street in the city, outside of Market Square.

The meeting was attended by City Clerk Sharp, City Engineer Crowell, City Solicitor Graeff, Committeemen Krause, Gerberich and Gates, M. S. Hershey, John Snyder, Esq., of Lancaster, N. H. Herr, engineer of the railway, the manager of the Hershey Improvement Company, J. B. Leit-hiser, and others.

Should the present plans be accepted by councils the Campbelltown Road from Twelfth street to the city limits will have a width of eighty feet, which of course includes two twelve-foot sidewalks.

The Hershey railway company will ask the city for a street grade without any expense to the city. The

tracks have already been completed as far as Twelfth street.

The subcommittee of the Highway body will report back to the Highway committee in the near future and the matter will then be brought before the next meeting of councils. As it will take some time to complete the present plans it is not expected that the Highway committee will be ready to present a recommendation to councils this week.
