An excellent dinner was provided, after which Mr. Copenhaver conducted the members of the Board over the numerous farms and thru the buildings. Much interest was manifested in the several dairies where are kept 145 of the finest Holstein cows that can be found anywhere.

In the school room are enrolled seven orphan boys all between the ages of four and seven years. Mr. Copenhaver is to be commended for the manner in which he conducts the school proper, and for the excellent condition of the property generally. Two more boys will be added to the school this week.

"Now, therefore I, William Howard Taft. President of the United States of America, in accordance-with the wise custom of the civil magistrate since the first settlement in this land and with the rule established from the foundation of the government, do , appoint Thursday, November 24, 1910, as a day of national thanksgiving and prayer, enjoining the people upon that day to meet in their churches for the praise of Almighty God and to return heartfelt thanks to Him for all His goodness and ' loving kindness.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done at the city of Washington this fifth day of November, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and ten, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and thirty-fifth.
