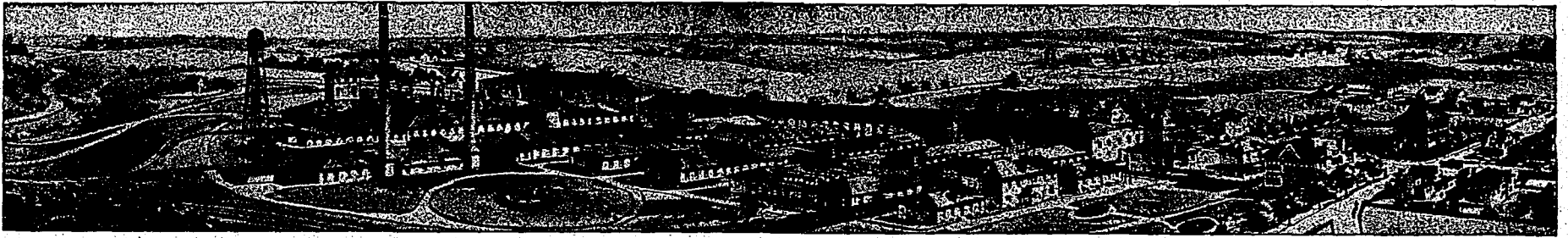

MICHAEL YINGST BURIED TUESDAY

DIED FRIDAY OF RHEUMATISM
OF THE HEART. AGE
61 YEARS

Michael Yingst died at his home in Hershey Friday afternoon at the age of sixty-one years. He had been confined to his bed only four days previous to his death. Death was due to rheumatism of the heart.

Mr. Yingst had lived in Hershey for the last eighteen years. His wife died on December 5, 1909. He lived with the youngest of his three daughters who survive him. The daughters are Mrs. W. J. Stoner, of Penbrook, Mrs. A. K. Kettering, of Annville, and Margie, at home. One daughter, Mrs. Emma Weltmer, died September 2, 1904.

The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon. Rev. E. A. Sharp assisted by Rev. O. G. Romig conducted the services. Interment was made at the Hummelstown cemetery. The pall bearers were John Heckert, Amos Hershey, Samuel Garman, John Funk, Robert Patrick and Jacob Habacker.

DEATH OF MRS. J. A. MCDONALD

PASSED AWAY EARLY MONDAY
MORNING AT HER HOME ON
CHOCOLATE AVENUE

Mrs. J. A. McDonald, wife of Rev. J. A. McDonald, pastor of Derry Presbyterian Church, died at her home on Chocolate avenue early Monday morning after an illness of a few days. The immediate cause of her death was kidney trouble.

At the time of her death Rev. McDonald was away from home. He had left Saturday after being assured that his wife was only suffering from a light attack such as she had experienced several times during the winter. Neighbors had arranged to spend the nights with her and give such attention as would be necessary. Dr. E.

R. Schaffer, the attending physician, called early Sunday evening and noted nothing alarming about her condition. She spent the night easily until about three o'clock in the morning when she quietly passed away. Her husband did not know of her death until he arrived in Hershey at 8.30 Monday morning.

The deceased was 45 years of age. She was born at Albany, New York. Her maiden name was Martha Merchant. Besides her husband one brother, Charles B. Merchant, and one sister, Mrs. Sarah Hayes, both of New York City, survive. Two brothers who served through the Civil war are dead.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday evening by Rev. E. M. Mulock, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, of Paxtang. Wednesday morning accompanied by the husband and brother the body was taken to Albany, New York, for burial.

FORMER RESIDENT DIES AT STEELTON

POSTMASTER H. F. HERSHEY
DIED FRIDAY OF PARALYTIC
STROKE

Henry F. Hershey, postmaster at Steelton, and a brother of Dr. M. L. Hershey, of Hershey, died at his home last Friday from the effects of a paralytic stroke that he sustained several weeks ago. During the time of his sickness he was conscious and semi-conscious only a few times.

The funeral services were conducted at his home on Tuesday afternoon by the Rev. C. Benj. Segelken, of the Presbyterian Church, in which Mr. Hershey was a trustee. Interment was made in the Paxtang cemetery.

Mr. Hershey was born in Derry Church, in 1846. For the last twenty-five years he has lived in Steelton where he has served in the capacity of tax collector, member of the borough council, and for the last eight years as postmaster. His term expires next May.
