BURGLARIZED

THIEVES ENTER LERCH STORE
EARLY SATURDAY MORNING.
TAKE WEARING AP-
PAREL

A most daring burglary occurred early Saturday morning between 1 and 2 o'clock when the general store of Theodore E. Lerch on Main street, Palmyra, was entered and robbed of approximately \$100 worth of goods.

Entrance was made through the front door notwithstanding the fact that there was a rear door which was even more accessible.

The store is located in the Post Office building on Main street a short distance away from the square and the street at this point is well lighted by several electric and gas arc lights, making the front of the building almost as light as day.

Early in the morning shortly after 1 o'clock Mrs. John Sholl, who lives directly across the street from the Lerch store, was awakened by a noise in the street. Mrs. Sholl arose and peering out of her front window saw several men, she is not positive as to the number, carrying articles from the Lerch store to a team standing in the street.

Realizing that something was wrong Mrs. Sholl opened the window and gave the alarm. Her cries were heard by J. A. Shriver, a real estate agent, and in the meantime the thieves hurriedly made their departure leaving behind them a gain sack, bearing the name of a well known miller in the northern part of the county.

Mr. Shriver notified Constable Amos H. Horst and this officer started an investigation shortly after 3 o'clock. No other clue was found which may aid in the identification of the thieves than the grain sack. The goods taken consisted mostly of wearing apparel, such as men's trousers, coats, hats, shirts, shoes, etc.

Later in the morning it was found that a farmer by the name of Sattazahn, living on the pike between Annville and Palmyra, had lost a horse and team late Friday evening. Shortly after 2 o'clock Saturday morning the horse was returned to the stable and the vehicle was found on the pike a short distance from the farm house.

It is thought that there are three implicated in the crime, two strangers and one local man although the identity of those implicated remains unknown.
