FOUR YEAR OLD CHILD BURNED

TAKEN HOME TO ANNVILLE
WHERE SHE DIED WEDNES-
DAY MORNING

The sudden and sad death of little Barbara June Kettering occurred at her home in Annville, as the result of being severely burned while in Hershey Tuesday afternoon. She was a granddaughter of Michael Yingst who was buried Tuesday afternoon from his home in Hershey.

While the parents of the girl were at the cemetery she was being cared for by those who had remained at the bereaved home. The child wandered upstairs and, it is thought, found some matches and, in some way, ignited them and accidentally set fire to her dress. Smelling smoke the women

who were in the house went to the hallway which leads upstairs and found the child in flames. Mrs. Wayne Habaker was the first to reach her and in trying to extinguish the flames was badly burned about the arms. The clothes were almost completely burned from the child's body before the flames could be extinguished.

Dr. M. L. Hershey was called to relieve the intense pain with the child was suffering. Later Dr. A. L. Hauer, the family physician, was called from Annville. He with Dr. Hershey dressed the burns. Later in the afternoon the child was taken to her home in Annville by A. S. Kreider who came for her in his large touring car. She died at the home from the effects of the burns a short time before seven o'clock Wednesday morning. She would have been four years of age next June.
