## SAY PEACHES WILL BE FAILURE; WHEAT POOR

STATE EXPERTS CONFIRM FOR MER PREDICTIONS OF DIS-COURAGING CROP OUTLOOK

The predicted total failure of the Pennsylvania peach crop for 1912, as announced several weeks ago by the state economic zoologist, H. A. Surface, is confirmed by the deputy secretary of agriculture, A. L. Martin. After a tour of th state, Martin adds the discouraging news that the wheat crop this year will be no more than 70 per cent of normal, even if it reaches that high.

Abormal weather conditions, which started last September and which have continued ever since, coupled with the Hessian fly, an arch-nuisance to the wheat grower, are assigned by Martin as the causes for the prospective deficiency in this year's crop.

"I am no pessimist," said Martin. "I would like to say that Pennsylvania will harvest excellent wheat and peach crops this year, but it is not true. The peach crop has been almost totally ruined, and the wheat crop will be very poor."

Martin's estimate of a 70 per cent wheat crop embraces central and western Pennsylvania. He is not so certain about the southeast.

plains, made it difficult to use harrow and drill on the soil. Hessian fly was particularly bad in 1911, and therefore, many planters postponed their seeding until late. Then came the early cold snaps, which prevented germination. The last few weeks, explains the deputy secretary, have had much thawing by day and freezing by night, and these weather conditions have not been beneficial. On top of this have come many high winds, which have added to the general unfavorable conditions.
