This newspaper was first to disclose that the A & P Supermarket and Woolworth's, among others, were going to move from Conshohocken to the Plymouth Square Shopping Center at Harmonville.

The report concerning Woolworth's was denied categorically up hill and down dale, but we stuck to our guns because we knew the source of our information was reliable.

Unfortunately, some of the leading men in the Chamber of Commerce were bitter in their denunciation of our 91-year-old newspaper, insisting they knew, positively, that two of the town's biggest places of business were going to stay put, we simply didn't know what we were talking about.

At present, the Chamber of Commerce is being reorganized. Its former president, who was most violent in hitting at local business, is a has-been and this is good for the borough generally. To the new president, William Davis and his staff, we pledge our full support for a greater Conshohocken. But the task is a tough one due to the lack of foresight in recognizing the trend away from the hometown to neighboring shopping centers that provide ample parking facilities. This trend began at least 10 years ago. We surely have a lot of lost time to make up, but the chances are that we will make progress. Co-operation of every business and professional man earning a livelihood in Conshohocken is essential.

The Way, the Truth And the Light . . .

We are thankful that space in newspapers has been made available to the writer for presentation of his views as a layman on faith, hope and charity for 20 years.

Even before we began writing as we were led by the Holy Spirit we had ample opportunity to observe that miracles are daily occurrences, and that anybody taking up the cross and following Him could expect to be chopped down by enemies if he were at all effective in advancing the Kingdom of God and His righteousness.

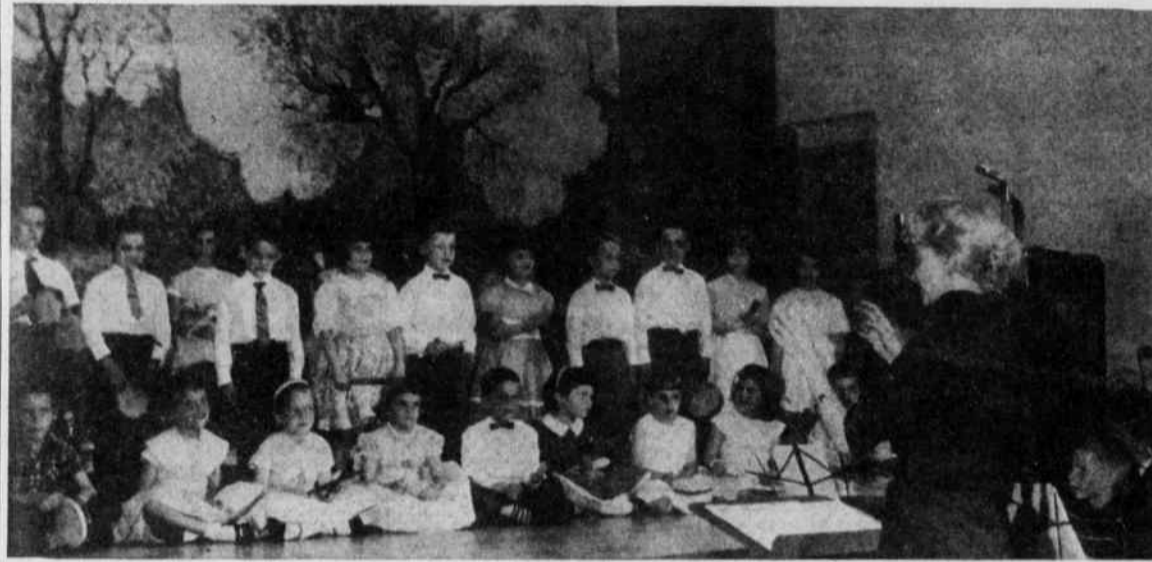
