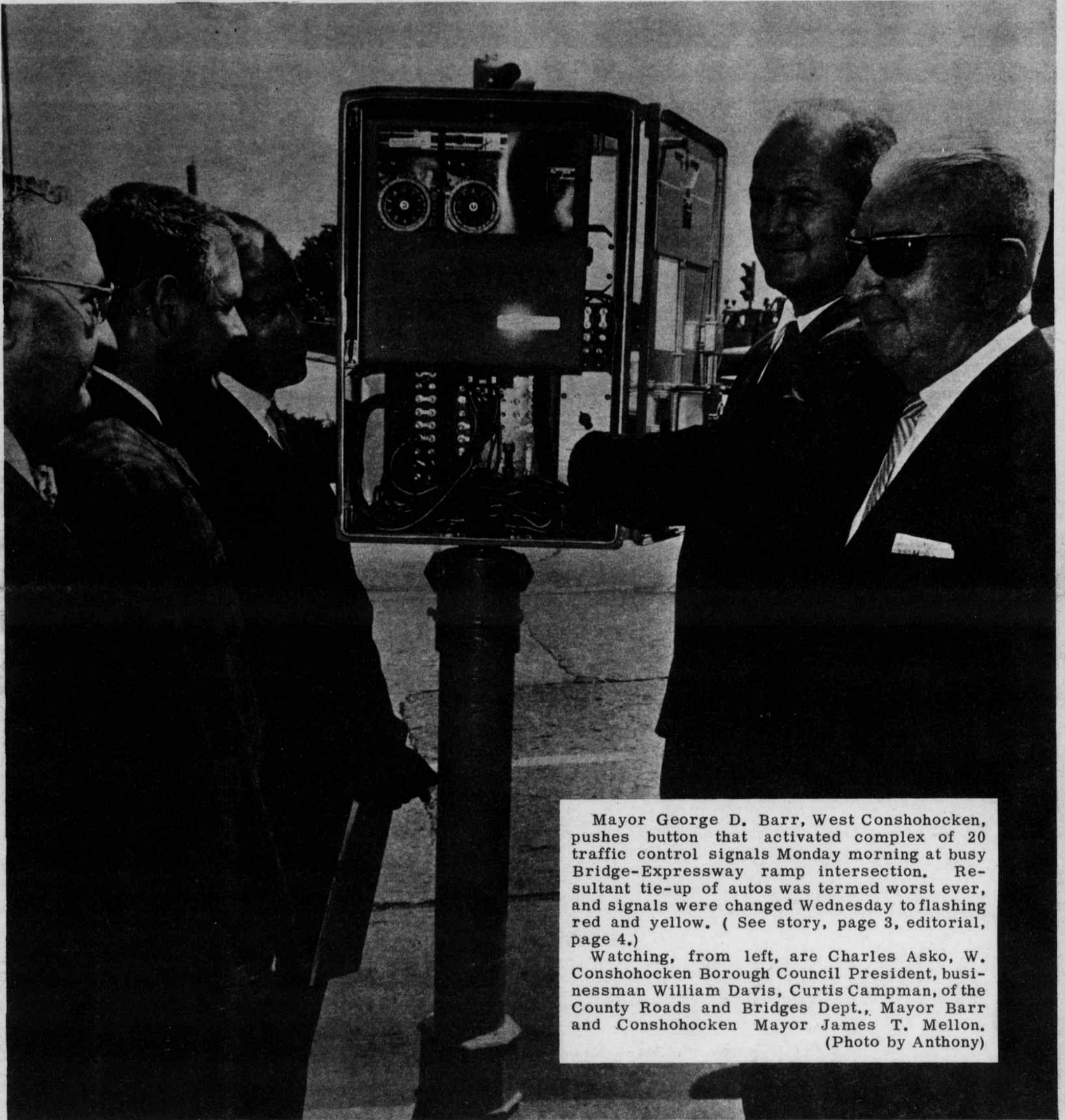

## Mayor Pushes the Panic Button

## Lee Rubber Picketed In Company's First Strike

Two hundred sixty production and maintenance employees struck and immediately picketed the Lee Rubber and Tire Co. plant on Tuesday.

Company demands, which apparently gave the union no choice but to strike, were:

1. Hourly and piece work rates cut 20 percent.
2. Seniority eliminated on seven key production line jobs.

3. Company refusal to continue day-to-day basis, in effect since the old contract expired on June 20.

4. Discontinuance of supplemental employment fund, established by the company in 1955 to ease workers through periods of layoff. (Some 600 employees laid off during the last two years had received benefits from this fund.)

5. Dropping of Easter Monday as a holiday.

6. Elimination of vacation extensions when death of relatives occurs during regular vacation period.

7. Reevaluation of all work rules and wage rates.

These new terms were handed to officials of Local 227, United Rubber, Cork, Linoleum and Plastic Workers Union, AFL-CIO, at a negotiating session Tuesday by Willard L. Heinrich, Lee's executive vice president.

Shortly afterward, Charles T. Hess, Jr., the local's president, announced that the union's executive board had unanimously approved the strike.

"We had been expecting something like this because the company, in the past few weeks had been slowing down production and using production people as grass cutters and fence painters," Hess said. About 100 office workers are still on the job.

Forty years ago, Lee Rubber had a strike that was settled promptly.

This strike apparently will be of long duration, since Hess said: "We pleaded and pleaded for a continuance of the old contract, the one we've been working under for the past 16 days, but we were turned down flat."

"All we want to do is work," Hess added that the only stock left in the building are the tires produced on Monday.

## Tax Aid Must Be Given to Library Or It Will Close, Mrs. Knowles Says

The Whitemarsh and Plymouth Township supervisors have been asked to place a half-mile tax referendum on the November ballot for the support of the William Jeannes Memorial Library.

Mrs. Mary G. Knowles, librarian, said that the library will close if the referendum is not passed:

"In the last 30 years, we have had only three years of tax support from Plymouth and Whitemarsh Townships.

"This library is the only one in the area, and it needs a certain amount of money to keep operating at its present efficiency.

"The tax would raise about \$21,000."

Presently the library receives support from a permanent endowment fund of \$75,000, which provides an annual income of about \$4,000. An additional \$2,500 yearly is provided by the Friends of the Library organization, book fines, and individual gifts.

From 1960 through 1962, public

appeals for aid resulted in sufficient funds to operate the library at its present level.

Mrs. Mary Chapple, secretary to the Library's Board of Directors, said that recent public gifts have been insufficient:

"The result is that in order to provide the people of the two townships with library service, we must ask for tax aid on a continuing basis.

"Otherwise, the library will be forced to close its doors and there will be no library service in this Plymouth-Whitemarsh community of more than 24,000 persons.

The 15,000 volume library has been operated by the Plymouth Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends since 1933. On October, 1962, the library was incorporated as a free, public, non-

sectarian library and a Board of Directors was chosen.

Dr. J. J. Williaman, retired chemist and vice chairman of the library's board, said the budget is \$21,000 this year and is rising about \$2,000 a year as the library serves more readers.

Librarian Knowles said that if the Township supervisors refuse to put the referendum on the ballot, the Library Board will appeal to the people.

"We will get a formal petition. There would be no problem getting enough names, because so many people use and appreciate this library."

Estimates of the library's replacement value run as high as \$150,000.

It has more than 5,000 registered book borrowers, and circulates over 48,000 books annually.

Dr. Williaman said there was only one other alternative for raising income, and that was to charge for library cards.

"That isn't a free library," he said.

## Surplus Distribution Shows Drop of 20

Montgomery County's Surplus Food Department says 5,814 persons were served during June, a drop of 20 from the May figures.

In a monthly report to County Commissioners Elkins Wetherill, Warren M. Cornell, Jr. and Daniel T. Costello, supervisor Ralph Clayton listed 7,256 persons as being registered with the Department.

Norristown, with 1,889, had the largest number receiving surplus commodities.

Conshohocken had 490; Main Line, 234; Flourtown, 216; Belmont Hills, 32; blind persons, 21.

The report also listed surplus food valued at \$56,693.96 on hand. The inventory is comprised of butter, cheese, milk, lard, flour, meat, rice, beans, oats.

## They're Blinking Red and Yellow

What are they? They are the new complex of traffic lights and directional signals installed at the busy intersection of Matson's Ford Rd. and the approach to the Schuylkill Expressway in West Conshohocken.

There are 20 traffic signals at the busy intersection now, which over years has been an unavoidable bottleneck to motorists during the morning and evening rush hours.

Joseph Bargowski, state bureau of Highways engineer, explained the master control box and said that there may be problems at first.

"We'll have to work out the bugs that usually develop.

"This is a very complicated system, and even trained policemen won't be able to adjust it.

"It will be hard for them to even control the lights with the master button. It works 14 operations simultaneously."

Elkins Wetherill, head of the Montgomery County Board of Commissioners, presented the battery of traffic signals to Mayor Barr.

Also attending the ceremonies was Mayor Mellon of Conshohocken, who said he hoped Conshohocken would benefit from the safety system, and Councilmen Stanley Gleba, Vincent Keho, Joseph Pollack, Billy Williams, George Barnell, and George Miniss.

Curtis Campman, county director of roads and bridges, said he was very happy with the system.

President of Council Charles Asko answered him, saying:

"This system had better prevent accidents, because we haven't had any yet here, and we don't want any."

## Transportation Bill In Senate

The introduction of legislation in the State Senate on Tuesday to create a Metropolitan Transportation Authority in Southeastern Pennsylvania brought favorable reaction today from County Commissioner Elkins Wetherill.

"I was very pleased to learn that the Act was introduced," he said.

"The County Commissioners," continued Wetherill, "are grateful to Senator (Henry) Probert and the other senators from the suburban counties for their support of the measure."

As drawn up, the Authority would consist of two members each from Philadelphia, Bucks, Montgomery, Chester and Delaware counties and one to be appointed by the Governor.

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# EDITORIALS

## Traffic Problem Not Solved Yet

If you have driven off the Schuylkill Expressway at West Conshohocken at the evening rush hour you probably got caught in one or maybe two traffic snarls.

That was because there was a lack of adequate traffic control at the intersection of Matson's Ford Rd., and the bridge leading to Conshohocken.

For years there was only a stop sign. Left turns were nigh impossible at rush hours. Right turns were a take-a-chance affair, with traffic seemingly going in every direction at once!

It was hoped that all would be changed, because on Monday 20 traffic signals were placed in operation.

They are a help to traffic coming off the expressway, but

not to traffic from Conshohocken!

The way it all works out, there should be a backlog of automobiles from the ramp at the expressway, across the bridge clear up Fayette St. to Ninth Avenue!!

Curtis Campan, director of highways for Montgomery County, says that 25,000 cars a day pass through this intersection with 18,000 of them funneling across the bridge.

It seemed, on Monday and Tuesday anyway, that all those 18,000 were lined up on Fayette St.

Let's hope that the problem has not merely had a change of direction, and the engineers can set the lights to give Conshohocken traffic at least an even break!

## Pollution Challenge Must Be Faced

Foot-dragging is alien to Americans. As a nation, we have long taken pride in our ability to recognize a problem and overcome it.

This characteristic grew from a land blessed with a multitude of natural resources and a people imbued with a spirit that compelled them to strive mightily to carve a series of accomplishments out of a hostile land.

Such was our national heritage! Today, however, that heritage is being challenged. And in the front ranks -- spearheading the threat -- is water pollution. As it spreads, it threatens our health, robs us of much of our natural beauty, and serves to damage our national prestige.

As pollution infects rivers, lakes and streams, many of us sit complacently by, seemingly reluctant to halt the poisonous flow.

The thought that an estimated 4,244 new sewage treatment plants are needed in the United

States, or that 1,046 plants need modernizing, doesn't seem to carry a message of urgency to our citizens. We know that as population continues to grow, our existing water supply will be limited and that available water will have to be used and reused in many areas.

We can no longer afford the luxury of inaction, warns the National Water Institute.

Safe disposal of human and industrial wastes is vital to the health and welfare of our community.

What is needed is apparent: A long-range plan incorporating the efforts of all members of our community who, noting deficiencies in treatment plants or sewerage facilities, act to remedy the situation.

Only in this manner can we do justice to our heritage. Only by such action can we avoid passing the buck to tomorrow's generation.

His duties are many and varied. For example, he handles all correspondence for Borough Council--to whom he is directly responsible--is in charge of financial

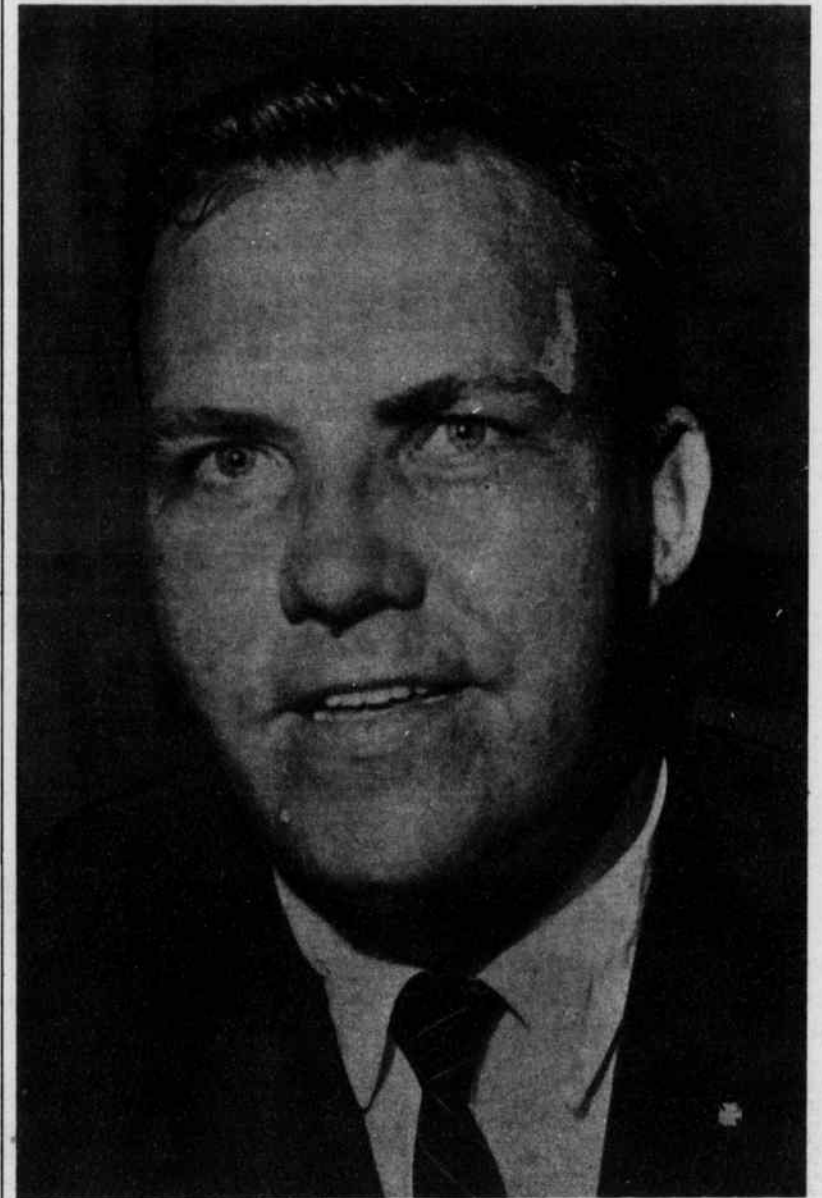
records, keeps Council meetings' minutes, keeps all Borough records and ordinances up to date and serves as personnel manager for the Borough.

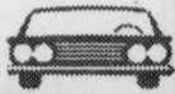

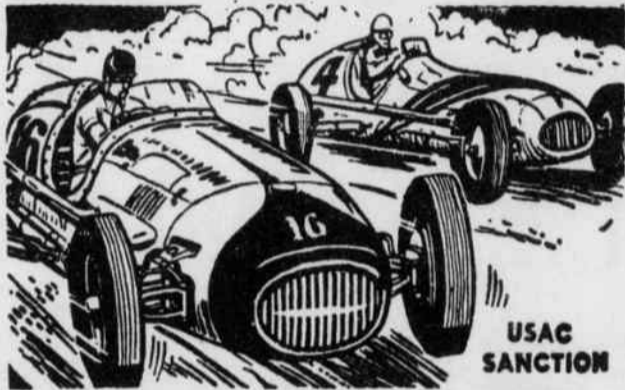

"Or who hath been His Counselor?"—Isaiah 40:13-44

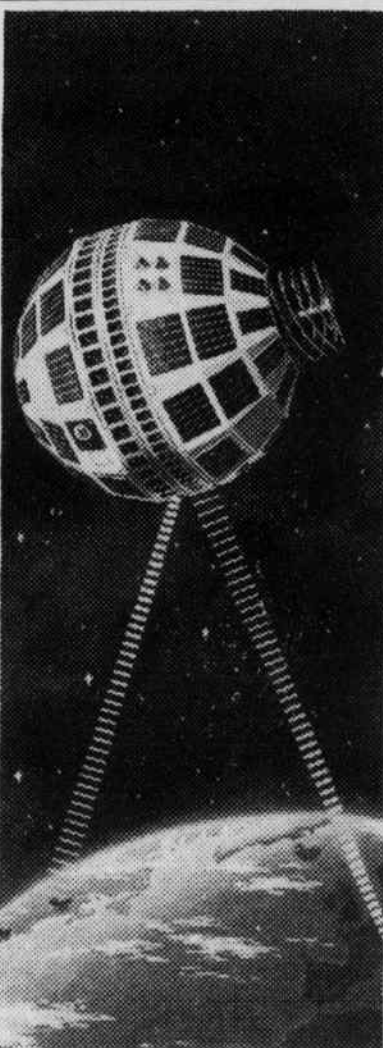

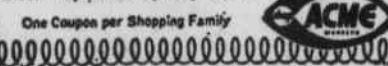
