

## Firm Moving to Plymouth Twp. To 'See What Trees Are Like'

The Plymouth Township Board of Commissioners announced Monday at a public hearing that they will "take under consideration" an application by C. A. Hausser and Son for a change of zoning on four acres of ground between Township Line Rd. and the Northeastern Extension of the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

The petition calls for a change of zoning from Office Laboratory to Industrial Park zoning. There were no objections from residents in attendance.

Ernest H. Behr, a partner in the firm, which manufactures laboratory equipment and apparatus, told the commissioners that the company plans to move its

entire operation to Plymouth Township after having spent over 40 years in Philadelphia.

"We intend to hire local people in the future," Behr said. "We now have 93 employees and our job fluctuation is very low. But I don't think all our people will come out."

"Our main raw material is glass and we do not use a furnace or manufacture glass. I do not think there will be any problem with noise or air pollution."

One resident expressed concern that the firm might tear down "some of the beautiful trees" in the area.

"Of course we must clear the trees where we intend to build,"

Some 900 persons, including students from Plymouth-Whitemarsh, St. Matthew's and Conshohocken High Schools and St. Mary's School, filed past the casket of Miss Eileen C. Janoski on Monday to pay their last respects to the 16-year old local girl who died Thursday night at Montgomery Hospital as a result of injuries when she was struck by a three-quarter ton truck with a snow plow attached.

Miss Janoski, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Janoski, 456 New Elm St., was injured March 1, as she was walking south on Butler Pike in Harmonville.

She was an eleventh grade student at Plymouth-Whitemarsh High School in the business education course. She was a member of the School's Future Business Leaders of American Club, had sung in the school chorus and was a member of the Rifle Club.

She was a graduate of St. Mary's Grade School.

In addition to her parents she is survived by three sisters, Rita, wife of Paul Ronio, and Joan, wife of Frank Bruno, both of Norris-town, and Phyllis, wife of Frank Reinert, 249 E. Hector St. Mrs. Mary Janoski, Hughes Park, paternal grandmother, also survives.

The funeral was held Tuesday from the Anthony Smolczynski Funeral Home, 219 W. Elm St., with Solemn Requiem Mass in St. Mary's Church. Interment was in St. Benedict's Cemetery.

Whitemarsh Job 'Overburdening'

## New Head of Supervisors Sees Need for Administrative Aide

After only two months as chairman of the Whitemarsh Township Board of Supervisors, Jesse W. Beeghley, Jr., resigned at an executive meeting of the supervisors on Monday night. He will remain as a member of the board.

Beeghley cited an "overburdening workload," caused by his duties as chairman and the demands of his law practice, as the reason for his resignation.

The board elected another new supervisor, Jack W. Kendree, to succeed Beeghley as chairman and the third November electee, Robert E. Smith, to serve as vice chairman.

"In my opinion Jesse Beeghley was the most qualified man on this board for the job," Kendree, the new chairman, said. "But he was forced to resign because of a situation in Whitemarsh that should not exist."

"Supervisors in Whitemarsh



have a much greater work load than they should have for a job that is not full-time.

"The total demands of the job are far out of proportion to allow them due time to take care of their own private businesses."

"And the chairman has historically had much more of a burden than any of the other members."

"In a municipal government the size of Whitemarsh, where government officials are not employed full time, it should be their function to receive and evaluate reports from department heads and to make policies, but they should not have to conduct all the work."

"In the near future we must hire an administrative assistant to the board."

"The job of the administrative assistant would be to coordinate the various work activities of the townships. I feel that this is an absolute necessity."

"But I can't see how we could work it out on our present budget. It is conceivable that we might

## Craley Heads Study of Air Pollution Here

Earle E. Craley, a member of the Plymouth Township Board of Commissioners, was directed Monday night at the Board's regular monthly meeting to appoint a committee to study air pollution.

Craley, who is chief chemist at the Boler Petroleum Co. in Ardmore, is looking for a scientist or research chemist other than himself to help interpret technical publications.

"I expect to appoint some members within the month," he told the Recorder. "There are no restrictions on the size of the committee, however, I am looking for quality, not numbers."

"This group is a big step forward for Plymouth Township. Pennsylvania has already declared air pollution one of its most critical areas for study."

"The Air Pollution act of 1961 has given local governments a major role in determining specifications for the control of air pollution."

Residents of six properties on New Elm St., Plymouth Township, protested Monday before the Board of Commissioners that their homes will be made "completely inaccessible" if Conshohocken Rd. is relocated "so that Alan Wood Steel can expand."

"Our homes will be boxed in by the proposed Blue Route on one side, a dead end on the other side and an eight foot high road in front," the residents exclaimed.

"We will have to go to the second floor to see any farther than 30 feet from our property," one complained.

In a letter read at the meeting, residents charged that the value of their property, their health and their welfare would be in "jeopardy" and that neither Alan Wood nor the State Highway Dept. had contacted them about the plans.

"It would have been common courtesy to advise us of construction that directly affects the value of our homes," the letter stated. "But instead we were awakened one morning by construction already in progress."

They added that present construction had resulted in "unbelievable amounts of dirt, dust and mud on, in and around our property."

"We have been kept awake at four in the morning by three drills blasting across from our property," one angry resident exclaimed, "and they explode dynamite two or three times a day."

"The vibrations of buildings and noise caused by heavy equipment and blasting are terrible. It goes on far into the night when people are trying to sleep."

The residents indicate that they thought Alan Wood should buy their properties or the township should give them a tax revision, (reassessment).

Township solicitor A. Benjamin Scirca told the residents that they

## \$1 for a Zoning Map - The Map Is 5 Years Old

It costs a dollar to buy a zoning map of Whitemarsh Township that is five years old. And the Andorra Springs Golf and Tennis Club isn't even listed on it.

The map was originally drawn up in May, 1958. It was revised in May, 1959 to record a change of zoning on Pennsylvania Ave.

"There may be some changes in zoning that are not reflected on the map," Willard E. Hargreaves, township secretary-treasurer, admitted.

"But we are waiting for the comprehensive plan to be adopted before we issue new maps."

Hargreaves explained that the township engineer would have to be called in to bring the zoning changes up to date. And he added that "it would be very expensive."

"Anyway," he said, "there's no sense putting these changes on the map when we will only have to

change it again later this summer when the plan is adopted. We decided this two years ago when the study got under way.

"New streets and subdivisions are kept pretty much up to date on the map, but a lot of amendments do not show."

Why isn't the Andorra Springs Golf and Tennis Club on the map?

"That was a special exception granted in 1962," Hargreaves explained. "The map doesn't list special exceptions."

"We might have a color map once we issue new maps," he added. "We would use colors to indicate different types of zoning. Plymouth Township has one and many other surrounding communities are using them."

"Of course, I can't be sure that the new maps will be in color. It's much more expensive than the kind we have been using."

"I feel certain that whichever team wins tonight's game will end up State champions," coach Kirby told The Recorder.

"Upper Dauphin is a strong offensive team. Every man on their starting lineup specializes in scoring. They scored 93 points against New Oxford on Thursday for the District Three title and each of their starters hit double figures.

"I expect more or less of a defensive battle tonight. Both teams are high scorers and each will try to hold the other down.

"We will have to jump a lot higher than we normally do. All their starters are at least six feet tall. We have only two six-footers, Mike Ethridge, 6'3", and Mike Howell, 6'1".

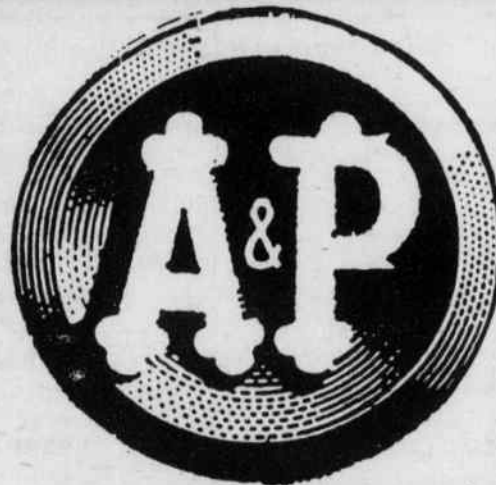

## Roop Predicts Planning Boost For Conshohocken

The "sleeping giant" of Conshohocken will reawaken within the next two to three years. And the major force behind its vigorous new growth will be the work now being done by the Borough Planning Commission.

This is the prediction of Francis Roop, of 201 E. 11th Ave., a member of the Borough Council from 1959 to 1963.

"Most people can't see it yet," Roop said, "but the Planning Commission is going to change the whole outlook for Conshohocken."

"Conshohocken will be back on its feet, and growing more than ever before, within the next two to three years."

Roop explained that many residents have reservations about the work of the Planning Commission. They know it has existed for almost six years, yet they haven't seen any concrete results.

like this. For the last 35 years it was a town in which everyone took an interest. It has only been lately that people have taken a hopeless attitude.

"But there is nothing to keep us back from becoming our former self. All Conshohocken needs is a reawakening of its people and a return of their old desire to participate in the community."

"Business in Conshohocken presents one of the worst pictures today. Only a handful of merchants have remodeled their businesses. Most have done nothing to draw in the public."

"These people have given up completely. They do not advertise through local newspaper advertisements, one of the greatest assets a businessman can have."

"If they would campaign with newspaper advertisements business would immediately start



But the fruits of its labor will crystalize in the very near future, according to Roop. Sooner than most people might imagine.

"The Planning Commission is working on two main projects," he said, "urban renewal of the lower part of town and zoning."

"The urban renewal won't cost the people of Conshohocken too much because the Federal, State and County governments are prepared to share approximately 92 percent of the cost."

"Zoning will be one of the greatest things that ever happened to Conshohocken. The borough has never had a zoning code before."

"In the past anyone could build wherever they wanted. Factories could move into residential areas and nobody could do anything about it. Residents could never be sure of property values from one day to another because of this."

"Zoning will protect residential areas and give a better business outlook to the commercial areas."

"The problem with Conshohocken today is that too many people sit back and don't take an interest in their community. They are lax and want to leave everything up to the next guy."

"Conshohocken wasn't always

to pick up and move in the other direction.

"They will never get anywhere by sitting back and crying. The businessmen of Conshohocken have got to offer the people something before they can bring them into their stores. They've got to start vigorous, progressive campaigns if they are to get Conshohocken back on its feet."

"I am confident that this will happen. It will happen because the Planning Commission is going to show the people of Conshohocken what can be accomplished."

"Conshohocken has too much going for it."

"The location of our town is one of the best. We are in the heart of the Delaware County community and at the meeting point of the major expressways and turnpikes. Our businesses are only five minutes away from any of these arteries."

"The people of Conshohocken have been too vigorous and productive in the past not to awaken from their present apathy."

"I am certain that the work of the Planning Commission will provide the confidence and momentum Conshohocken needs to return to its former self."

could not claim any damages from the State.

"Plymouth Township has no power to make Alan Wood buy your properties. Conshohocken Road is a State highway and we have no jurisdiction."

"But we can and should control the problems of dirt and noise. I will instruct our engineer to check into the situation."

After the meeting, Arthur Bruno, of 635 Old Elm St., commented on the relocation of Conshohocken Rd.

"Alan Wood says that they want to replace a sharp turn on Conshohocken Rd. with a more gradual turn. But they could have done it on a much more direct angle. The curve they propose is especially suitable for the expansion of their mills."

"What I object to most is the complete disregard for the financial and personal well-being of small property owners."

"They should buy our properties instead of leaving us sandwiched in between a wall and a road with no access to the rest of the township."

"It is interesting that the Blue Route seems to have been changed since Alan Wood began its expansion program. Now it only touches the edge of their property."

"The change in the location of the Blue Route was perfect for their expansion program. So was the plan to relocate Conshohocken Rd."

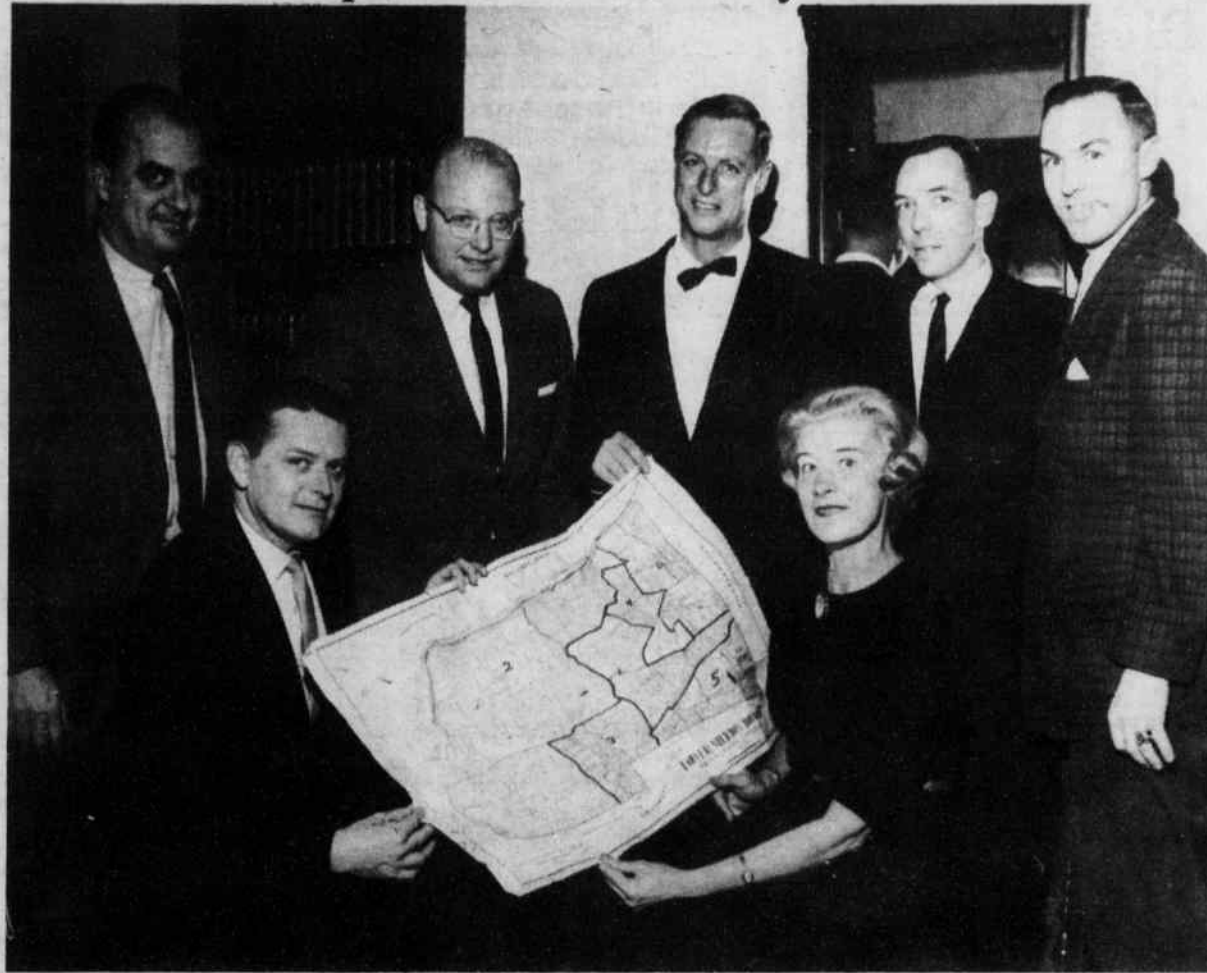

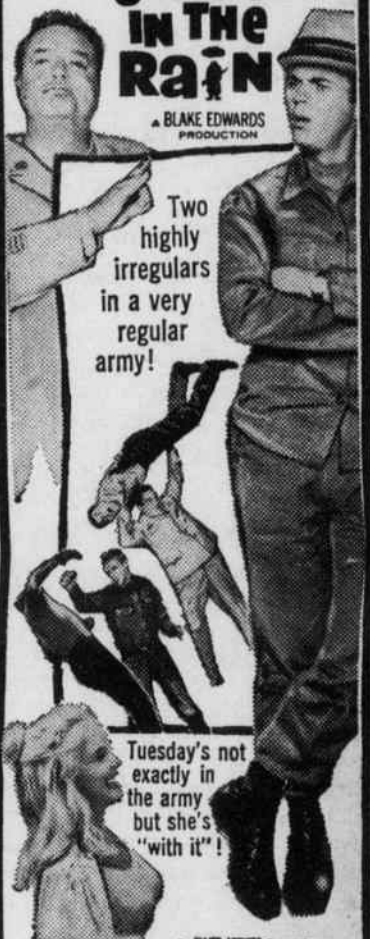
