

Questions Value of Federal Housing

Pottstown Town Council voted to approve a \$600,000 Federal housing project for their town, and according to the Pottstown Blade, the action was hasty and taken without consideration of the affect upon the taxpayers. A delegation in which were councilmen visited the coun-

ty commissioners and requested no county funds be appro-priated for a survey. Another delegation asked that \$10,000 be appropriated for the survey.

be appropriated for the survey. The county commissioners have had a sad experience with housing projects. They appropriated money for the Authority to organize and function and also made an appro-priation for a survey. The proposed projects failed to ma-terialize and the county is out the money as it will not be paid until an appropriation is obtained from the Federal government. government.

It is claimed many Pottstown residents oppose the hous-ing project as it requires, the 150 proposed houses to be built would be free of taxes for sixty years; small, low rent ten-ant houses would be razed and it is questionable whether the tenants of the present small houses could affaord to pay the rent of the proposed new homes.

Norristown rejected a smilar proposition for a \$600,000 housing project. It is claimed the opposition came from real estate brokers and contractors. When taxpayers became fully acquainted with the exemptions given a Federal hous-ing project, they will not relish paying taxes on property for which they have sacrificed and worked hard to obtain, and workide troots light project of the relist paying taxes of the property of the second second

Federal housing has already cost the county taxpayers several thousand dollars and the commissioners have wisely refused to grant any more money for a project that has not yet gotten beyond the conversational stage and has not the full support of the community it is proposed to benefit (?).
