A softball league was established between the playgrounds and after a number of close competitions the championship place was won by the Hector Street Eagles. All the playgrounds were equipped for volleyball and a new combination tennis and basketball court was built on the Sutcliffe park playground. Plans are being made to extend the sports program to include a number of other activities for the next playground season.

The new playground opened on West Third avenue with Miss Gertrude DeMarco as the instructor established an excellent play center for the children of that area. The playground, already well-equipped for its initial season, will be scheduled for more pieces of apparatus for next summer.

On the Hector street playground tentative plans for improvement include an outdoor basketball court which will be available for use even after the playground season closes. Miss Bette Ferrier was the instructor for this playground.

The Third avenue school grounds, attended by a group of children who reported regularly each day during the season, retains its place as one of the most popular playgrounds of the community.

The instructor for this playground during the past season was Miss Eleanor Gray.

Sutcliffe park opened this season with a number of improvements

for the benefit of the children. Outstanding among these improvements was the new combination tennis and basketball court. A new drinking fountain was installed and the wading pool was available for part of the summer. A small storage building was built on this playground to house the playground equipment. Mrs. Norman A. Rice and Miss Shirley Meier directed the summer program on this playground.

Mary Wood park, under the leadership of Miss Blanche Palacio, operated a recreational program for the younger boys and girls. The Mary Wood park, with its pleasant surroundings, attracted the largest attendance for the season.

Records indicate that the "coming and going" attendance of the various play centers to be as follows:

Hector street 125 children
West Third avenue ... 75 children
Third avenue school ... 75 children

"These 'coming and going' figures indicate the estimate of the number of children who came to the playground at some time during the day."

It is felt that Conshohocken with its five playgrounds has a system which well serves the community. At least one more playground is needed in order that each section of the town have a supervised play area without the children going too far beyond their immediate neighborhood. An additional playground is needed in the northeastern part of the town

either as a part of the Community Field or in its vicinity.

"The greatest need in the youth recreational program is a swimming pool suitable for all ages. It is hoped that in the near future some local agency will meet this need so that the boys and girls can enjoy this sport without going out of town and without the expense now connected with it."

The playgrounds during the summer offered a varied program each day which included free play, handcraft, sports, singing, dancing, and special events. Hot dog parties, watermelon parties, birthday parties, trips to Montgomery park and the Philadelphia "Zoo", Mardi Gras day, baby contests, pet shows, doll shows, movie party, Red Cross story period, and hikes were some of the activities on the special event schedule.

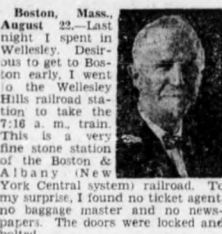

Fuel Use Tax Effective Sept. 1

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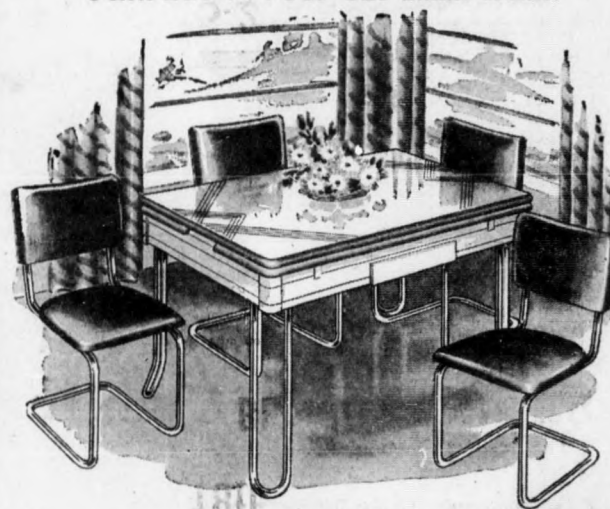
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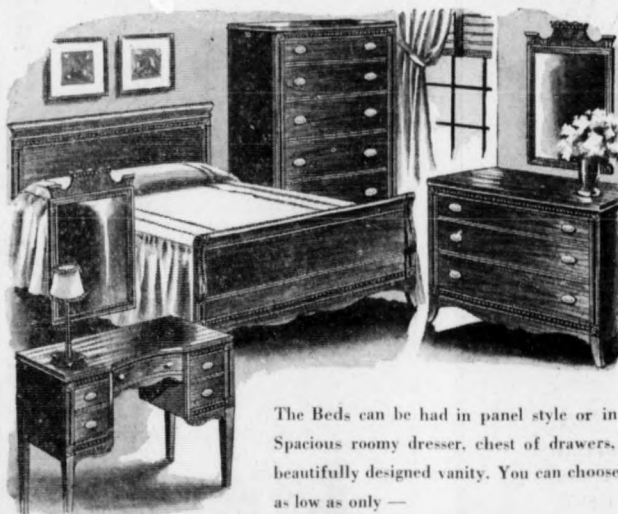
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
