Sunday Sept. 5.—It was not until I set foot aboard the American flag ship, the S. S. United States on Friday, that I had fully realized the outcome of a mere whim

was at last a reality. As this luxury liner left its berth at New York City on its 80th voyage, it was carrying 20 mately voyagers who waved goodbyes on deck until the ship made a complete turn and set out on the clear blue sea.

It was early Spring when I had announced I was going to Italy. Knowing that I had made this very statement many times before, my family was not the least bit alarmed, and regarded the statement rather as a passing fancy. And for a time, I must confess, I may have done likewise.

Then then it was just a pipe-dream to visit the country and my grandfather, Giacinto Zinni, now 90, at Roccascalegna in Chiati.

Later when I announced my plans to some friends, Biddy Della Masbetti, a classmate throughout high school, thought the idea appealing, and at once we began to plan.

I had for a time conceived of traveling in the form of fairy tales. All of the way to Europe—and I was not a linguist!

But then again, as the heroine always does, I would set out empty-handed and cities would fall to you. Go unarmed, I concluded. Learn from people. At this point I had fully succeeded in convincing myself that foreknowledge of an expedition would be too confining.

Phrases of courtesy, per haps, would be the wisest choice to learn. And so began our Italian lessons. "Buon Giorno," "per favore," "molto bene," was the very beginning.

It was hard work and careful budgeting which enabled us to get passage on tourist class aboard this fabulous liner that set the world's record of speed when it made its maiden voyage over two years ago.

We quietly set about preparing and suddenly everyone gave in. "They must be serious—at last," they said. Then came a flurry of parties which virtually hit us like a ton of bricks.

They were swimming. However, neither of us succumbed to the tumultuous outbursts. We have managed the huge stack of addresses, some gifts—and oddly enough found a space for our own cubbing in our luggage.

It was not a "briefing" only of the language now. We had to be able to converse with all these people we were venturing off to visit as "amateurs."

The biggest surprise of my life came when the entire staff of Weekly Review newspapers had gathered some 50 strong at the time they seemed to come 5,000 miles from every direction at a "Bon Voyage" party at Mount Joy, the home of Frances and Harold McCuen, treasurer and publisher respectively.

It actually felt like a real celebrity when Dick Bauer did a take-off of "This Is Your Life," cleverly written by our managing editor, Jim O'Brien. The things they didn't

dig up" about me! It was loads of fun and I shall never forget it. Parties and dinners came in every direction. Diddy, who is a nurse at Montgomery Hospital, was guest of honor at a delightful family picnic the very next Sunday. In order to effect a saving for taxpayers. He said he told Glace there was a suspicion among a number of persons living in the township that the supervisors were trying to stall the report. The executive denied unhesitatingly that such was the case, Robertson said. Glace said he saw portions of the report and copies of topographical maps and learned the cost of installing the sewerage system would be about \$6 a foot, excluding the cost of connecting to the system and the annual rental fee.

Robertson is active in the Deerfoot Civic Association, of which Harold H. Brown is president and Mrs. Adolph Dubin, secretary.

Dr. Franklin H. Reeder, of Whitmarsh Green, district medical director of the State Department of Health, Norristown office, said the department generally favors installation of a sewerage system and a sewage disposal plant. "The danger is prevalent," he said, "that deep cesspools will contaminate private water supplies, and that disease originating in one area may easily spread to another where sanitary facilities are provided."

Dr. Reeder's assistant, Ernest Pennapacker, State sanitarian in charge of nine counties, spoke on faulty cesspools he had inspected in the community. "The township has a bad record," he said.

He explained the record is bad because the soil will not absorb sewage, often after a cesspool has been dug 20 feet or more.

Dr. Reeder said he found that field tiles are impractical because leaching soil is very deep, and sometimes cannot be reached at all. Cesspools are no longer satisfactory permanently," he said, adding, "They will have to be pumped out at frequent intervals, and this is another cost factor to be considered in deciding for or against a central disposal plant."

Dr. Reeder was introduced by Hugh J. McCartney, of Marble Hill. Mrs. James Hennessy, of Country Acres, said on a recent visit she found a highly unsatisfactory condition in every toilet in the public school. The reason, she said, is that parents are compelled to flush the toilets at home as seldom as possible, and the children, impressed with the instruction, carry it into the school. She said a sewerage system should be installed in the area.

U. S. Editors in Bermuda Meet Hurricane Hunters Relax as Mandrake Acts

THINKING OF YOU. Probably by the time you get this, all thought of hurricanes will be over. But today, there's been nothing else of interest in the news broadcasts and in the newspapers. "Hurricane Edna..." brings to mind so vividly the information we got our National Editorial Association had with the Hurricane Hunters at Kindley Air Force base in Bermuda on June 19. It was our only day when rain fell briefly in Bermuda.

We had top-flight men of the Hurricane Hunters describe the actual work involved in testing the ferocity of the savage winds that cause untold amount of death and destruction. Of course, all the description was by charts and graphs, on paper and on the blackboards in their "ready room" at Kindley Field.

Then they showed us an official Air Force film depicting the losses in property damage in the wake of hurricane force. Made us all shiver, tho the day was close, due to the damp weather, and all fans were turned down... because much of the filming was done during an actual "blow", as they called it.

The Hurricane Hunters welcomed us through their official Kindley Air Force base newspaper, printing a special edition for us. Afterward, we went outdoors, where the rain had ceased, and inspected the marvelous rescue boats of the Air Rescue unit, also based at Kindley.

Col. Stribling, head of the unit there, described the actual work of the Air Rescue corps... from the time they hear the S. O. S. of people in trouble on the waters from a seacraft or a plane to the time when they drop the light-metal craft complete in every live-saving feature.

The colonel told us the boat is specially built to remain "face up" even the dropped from a specially constructed plane, where the boat is held in place by vacuum until released. Fifteen men could live, for a total of nearly 40 days until they successfully reached land, he said.

As to the rest of the island... well, words fail to tell how beautiful it is... the lush tropic-like flowers... the beautiful waters and sands surrounding the islands... and so unemployable... and their method of obtaining drinking water is rather unique, tho.
