#### Bus Service.

Abandonment of the Norristown, Roxborough and Chest-nut Hill trolley line has brought better transportation service to the residents along the old line. Motor bus service has taken the place of the trolleys and plans are now in the mak-ing for extending the bus service to districts now without public transportation facilities.

The Philadelphia Rural Transit Company, a subsidiary of the P. R. T. is now giving service between Barren Hill and Philadelphia. This leaves the section from Barren Hill to Butler pike—a section which is rapidly growing—without public transportation facilities. The Auch Bus Lines, a local concern, is providing service pending approval of a certifi-

concern, is providing service pending approval of a certifi-cate from the Public Service Commission. It is also planned to extend the service to Norristown and to Ambler. Norristown business men have been quick to see the ad-vantages of the new lines to enlarge the radius of the Nor-ristown shopping area. The new lines will bring both Nor-ristown and this borough in easy access to the entire new

In contrast with the support given to the plans of Mr. Auch by Norristown business organizations, nothing has been done here when the whole new territory to be served is a logical field for local merchants. It would be well for the Business Men's Association to ascertain the plans of Mr. Business and the proposed routes and endeavor to have the Barren Hill route with a terminus in this borough.

Business will not come here without effort. The buyers will use the easiest and most convenient methods to do their shopping.

shopping. There is now bus routes operating to Gulph Mills, Ivy Rock and Spring Mill. Were the Spring Mill route extended to Barren Hill, a new trading area would be available to local merchants. To secure it, the merchants must cooper-ate with the transportation interests and give all aid possible with the transportation interests and give all aid possible for the development and extension of the lines.

#### The Committee System

School Boards that have followed the modern practice of abolishing committees and having the superintendent of schools authorized to manage school affairs and business as instructed by the board have found the system far more satisfactory and the business of the district is done quicker and more economically than under the old committee system. The new plan has had a good trial in this borough. It has resulted in practically eliminating politics from the school board and all the business of the district is brought before the entire board for decision

before the entire board for decision. Under the Act of May 18, 1911, known as the school Code, school directors were classified and the number of school directors reduced. The method of electing directors was changed so that directors are chosen by the popular vote of the entire district. The wisdom of this change is questioned as in few districts the monority party has represen-tation. The small board does not eliminate politics. There is more play for politics in the small board than under the old system of a larger board with ward representation. Experience has proved the board usually divides into two groups, with one group with a bare majority dominating. The com-

with one group with a bare majority dominating. The com-mittee system makes the domination complete. With the modern system of the board passing upon every matter each question is decided upon its merits as there is no committee action to defend. The superintendent or supervising principal is given full managerial powers in the conduct of the schools, a position for which he is tech-nically equipmed

A new administration is now in charge of West Consho-hocken's school affairs. It would be found to the advantage of the board, the taxpayers and the schools were the old committee system abolished and the new method adopted which has been so successfully operated in this district.
