Varied phases of printer's work are taught in the print shop of McCaskey. This is one of the newer courses in the Industrial Arts Department. Commercial training at McCaskey High School provides three major choices for following a business career. Those pupils interested in becoming stenographers and secretaries concentrate on shorthand and typewriting.

Bookkeeping and typewriting interest the students who wish to make a career in the field of office records and accounting.

The third field consists of pupils who are interested mainly in general office work. They learn typewriting, the operation of office machines, and filing. Many pupils pursue a varied combination of these subjects.

In addition to these three concentrated fields, the pupils taking business work may find jobs as typists, receptionists, operators on the dictaphone, vari-typer, and mimeograph machines, payroll and file clerks, and similar related business office positions.
