
THE THEME

THE SCHOOL BOARD



On March 29, 1938, we held a Junior B class meeting at which the class colors were announced—blue and silver—and as Junior A's a meeting was held November 8, 1938.


Our social life has to its credit one bright event—a Junior A Dance to which the Junior B class attended as guests.

THE FOOTBALL SEASON

The Ne-Ca-Hi "Red Hurricane" marched through to another of its perennially fine seasons this fall with a record of eight victories and two defeats. Technically, in WPIAL records this would be seven wins and three losses, since the Butler game was awarded by a 1-0 count to Butler. This was due to a misinterpretation of WPIAL rules by the New Castle officials.

The Youngstown East "fracas" and the Monesson "set-to" were by far the most thrilling games of the home season. In the Youngstown East affair New Castle built up an 8-0 lead early in the second half only to find a fighting Ohio eleven coming back with seven startling points, and a promise of more, had the game not ended quickly. In the Monessen engagement New Castle contracted a 9-0 deficit in the first half due to some faulty play, but delivered the "goods" in the second half with the two needed touchdowns.

Little should be said concerning the Massillon engagement, except that no high school team, or many college teams, could have opposed the inspired Tiger eleven that night.

In Sharon it was a battle of slush and unending punts, both teams waiting for the break, which finally fell to New Castle in the form of a safety. The feature of the game was the low temperature and blinding snow, and not the play of the gridders.

In the other contests the "Canes" showed the usual fighting spirit which dominated their play, losing only to Warren. The Warren setback was just "one of those things"—the boys simply couldn't put it over.

The "Red Hurricane," 1938 edition, played to approximately 70,000 fans during the entire season. Outstanding among the regular players were: Roussos, Roberts, Lauro and Gender.

This season marks Head Coach Philip Bridenbaugh's fifteenth year at Ne-Ca-Hi. He has yet to coach an unsuccessful eleven.




LAURO SCORING IN YOUNGSTOWN GAME


THE UNEMPLOYMENT PROBLEM
