Reidenbaugh Store Opens Saturday

Roy S. Reidenbaugh will open his new and modern electrical service store at 9 S. Broad Street, Saturday.

Although the ultra-modern front that has been put on the building, which for decades housed the clothing business of Walter H. Buch, has given some idea of the extensive remodeling Mr. Reidenbaugh has undertaken, only a visit to the store will show what a transformation has taken place.

The business was established in 1931, born of the depression. 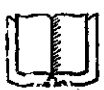

Mrs. F. W. Stengel Dies at Linden Hall

Buried Amid Evergreens of Campus of the School She Loved and Served So Well

Services for Mrs. Elizabeth High Stengel, wife of Dr. F. W. Stengel, principal of Linden Hall, who died Thursday morning at 10:30 at the school, were conducted Saturday afternoon at 2:30 at the school with Bishop J. Taylor Hamilton, Bethlehem, officiating.

Mrs. Stengel was buried amid the evergreens in the southeastern end of the campus of the school she loved and served so well.

Sunday morning at 9 o'clock a memorial service was held in the school Chapel for the girls of the school and friends. Bishop Hamilton presided and conducted the liturgy, the Rev. Byron K. Horne, pastor of the Moravian Church, read a memoir, and the Rev. W. N. Schwarze, of Bethlehem, delivered a brief talk.

Her death came two weeks after she suffered a relapse, and although she rallied several times, she grew worse on Thursday and died the following morning. The family were at her bedside during the night.

She had been ill for about a year and a half and last Easter was taken to the hospital for treatment.

A Lititz-bound trolley car and an automobile driven by Eli Heck,

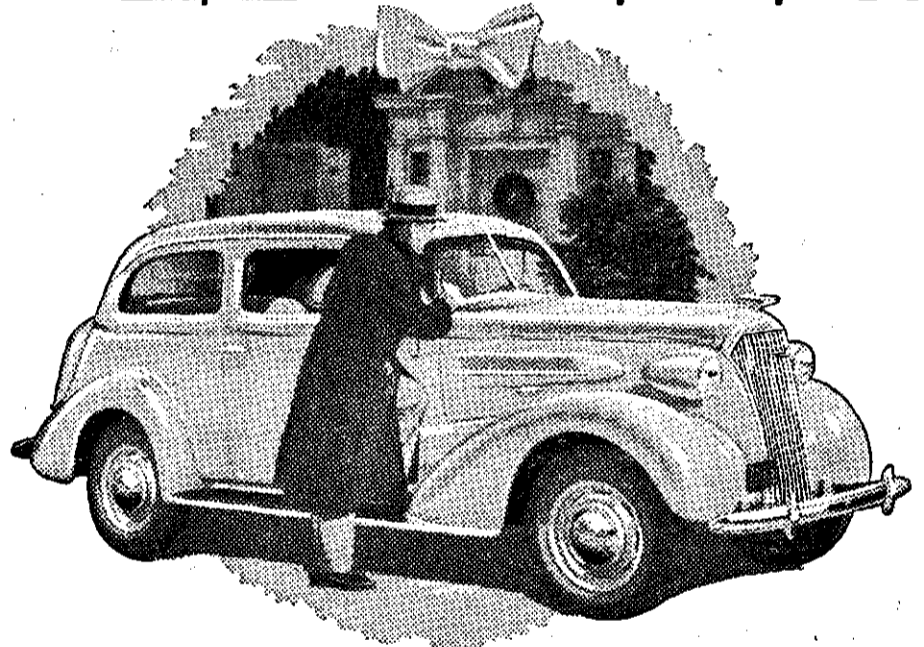
