Sunday morning at 9 o'clock a memorial service was held in the school Chapel for the girls of the school and friends. Bishop Hamilton presided and conducted the liturgy, the Rev. Byron K. Horne. pastor of the Moravian Church, read a memoir, and the Rev. W. N. Schwarze, of Bethlehem, delivered brief talk.
