## Local High School Student Victim Of Typhoid Epidemic Patient At Osteo. Hospital

### Fern Fahnestock Stricken Two Weeks Ago; Reported Out Of Danger

That a Lititz High School Junior is one of the victims of the typhoid fever outbreak traced to a Thanksgiving day wedding reception at a farm on Lititz R. D. 1, was disclosed here this week. The patient is Miss Fern Fahnestock, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. A. G. Fahnestock, of Kissel Hill. Miss Fahnestock was admitted to the Lancaster Osteopathic Hospital two weeks ago but the fact that she was a victim of the typhoid outbreak was not made public.

In a serious condition after being admitted to the hospital, Miss Fahnestock had a turn for the better over the past week-end. Her condition was declared to be out of danger at the hospital this week.

Both Rev. Fahnestock and his daughter attended the wedding reception Thanksgiving day which resulted in the typhoid fever outbreak among the attendants which to-date has resulted in a total of 25 cases, not counting that of Miss Fahnestock.

She did not complain of feeling ill until some time later when she suddenly developed what she thought was a cold. She was taken to the office of Dr. I. Siegel, this borough, by her father.

Dr. Siegel realized that the girl was suffering from more than a cold and ordered her returned to her home. When he examined her again at her home he ordered her removal to the Lancaster Osteopathic Hospital.

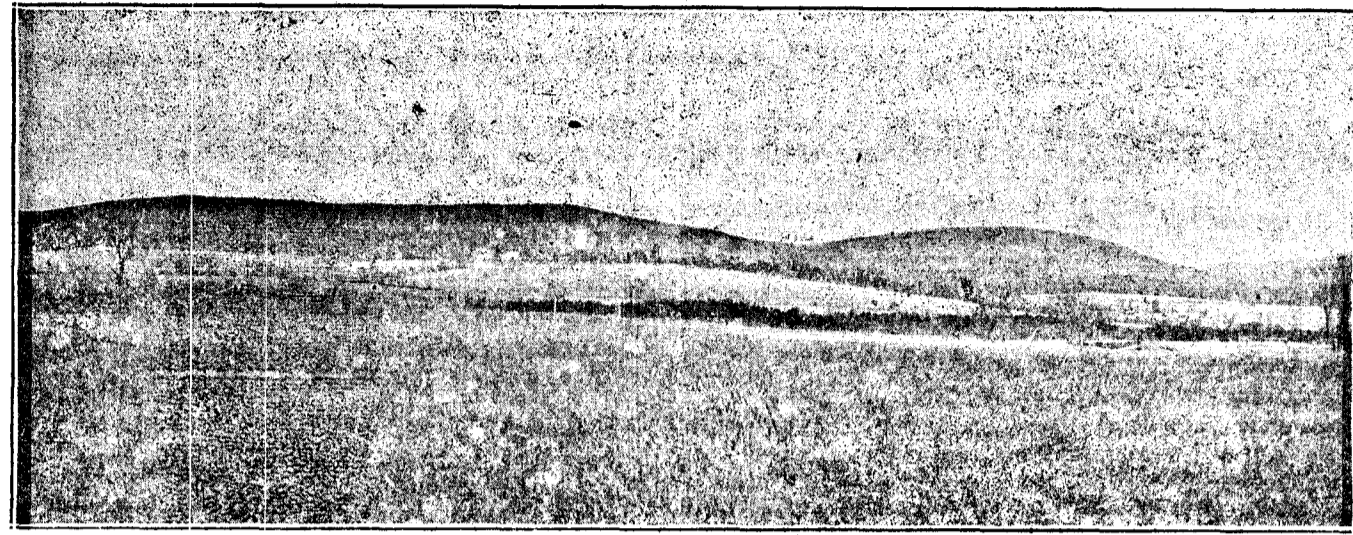

## History And Romance Of Cannon Hill In The Furnace Hills

Cannon Hill and the rounded hill immediately north of Bricker-ville, against the northern base of which the Cannon Hill Hostel stands, got its picturesque name from a small cannon which was placed near its top by Henry William Stiegel (1729-1785), famous glassmaker and iron-master of colonial days. This gun fired from a tower by a watchman, male the Furnace Hills resound as its heavy voice saluted Stiegel, approaching his mansion at the southwest base of the hill in his coach and four with outriders. This display was part of the baronial pomp of Stiegel's meteoric career which soon led the peasantry of the region to call him Baron Stiegel. This title spread over the colonies and still lives.

The local name of Cannon Hill in the Pennsylvania German of the region is Stiek Barrich—Stueck meaning piece of artillery; Barrich, (Berg) hill or mountain. The general range of red sandstone formation is the Furnace Hills, named for the iron furnaces—Elizabeth, Cornwall, Colebrook, and Mount Hope—of the region.

Baron Stiegel, whose artistic glassware highly valued today, has eminently perpetuated his memory, had three mansions—one still standing at Elizabeth Furnace against Cannon Hill; one near his glass-works at Manheim, Lancaster County; another in nearby Schaefferstown, Lebanon County. As his coach approached anyone of these he was welcomed either by cannon salute or, as at Manheim, by a brass band playing from his house-top. But such baronial pomp was to rise, burst in brilliance and fall like a rocket. By 1775 Stiegel landed in a debtor's prison. Thereafter he humbly served others; first (1775-78) as furnace foreman for Robert Coleman, who acquired his Elizabeth Furnace and extensive land holdings, about 1775; toward the end, teaching a few children of the neighborhood musto and languages.

Elizabeth Furnace, as well as the township of the northern Lancaster County of that name, was named for Elizabeth Hooper whose father had erected the furnace about 1750. Elizabeth was married to Stiegel in 1752. The furnace no longer stands on its original site, which is immediately southeast of the mansion. The Elizabeth Furnace Mansion and its surrounding buildings are the architectural features of the region today. The smaller eastern part of the mansion was built by Stiegel, its greater structure by Robert Coleman. This property, including about 4000 acres of mountain woodland, including Cannon Hill, has been in the Coleman family ever since 1775, now (1948) one hundred and seventy-three years.

Around the Southern base of Cannon Hill runs the historic Hessian Ditch. This was dug, during the Revolution, by Hessian prisoners of war. The Colemans still have the papers of agreement

between Adjutant General Hand and Robert Coleman by which these eighty Hessians were taken over by the latter as laborers. Coleman paid Continental Congress thirty-two to forty-five Shillings a month for each prisoner, the amount to be paid in iron. They were lodged in the long one-and-a-half story building adjoining the Elizabeth Mansion. Weaver, who saw considerable service and who was seriously wounded during the Battle of the Bulge, now is confined to the Mount Alto Veterans' Hospital, at Washington, D. C. Word that Weaver is a patient in the hospital was received several weeks ago by Burgess Victor Wagner who in turn passed this information on to members of the Lititz Fire Company as well week as to many of Weaver's friends here. Efforts were being made among his friends here this week to have the sending of cards or letters to the local veteran continued as long as possible. His address is Ward 2, Room 229, Mt. Alto Hospital, Washington, D. C. Weaver underwent an operation recently. He served during the war in England, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He was badly wounded while laying an oil line over the Seine at the height of the Battle of the Bulge. He is recipient of five medals from the government.

## Expect Another Boost In Borough Tax Rate As Budget Study Starts

That the Lititz Borough tax rate will be boosted for the second consecutive year appeared imminent today as members of borough council launched their annual financial study preparatory to drawing up the annual budget.

While the hope had been expressed that a tax boost would not be necessary, more recent developments have shown the work of the borough sewer authority to be advanced to the stage where this body will be in need of funds in the very near future.

Should it be decided to make the preliminary sewerage survey during the coming year, borough authorities declared, it is hoped that the first of this work can be financed directly by the borough from current taxes.

Borough council and members of the Borough Authority in all probability will meet at a joint session during the next week or ten days in order that this situation can be completely reviewed before the budget is finally drawn up.

Meeting briefly Monday evening, members of the new council re-elected Harry R. Way, president. Other officers named are Thomas S'effy, vice president; Paul A. Mueller, solicitor; E. E. Habecker, secretary; Walter Miller, water superintendent; and Addison Harding, street superintendent.

Burgess Victor Wagner administered the oath of office to Frank Ford, who is beginning his first term; and to Christ Nissley and Mr. S'effy, both of whom were re-elected at the polls last November.

At the request of the state council voted to release the Reynolds Construction Company, builders of the East Petersburg Road approach inasmuch as the work has been completed satisfactorily.

## Local Woman Injured When Hit By Auto

### Mrs. Walter Keath In East Stroudsburg Hospital With Fracture

Struck by an automobile during a blinding snow storm, Mrs. Walter Keath, formerly of this borough, is confined to the East Stroudsburg General Hospital recovering from serious injuries, it was learned here this week.

While her condition was reported as critical at the time of the accident, it was reported at the hospital today that Mrs. Keath is now on the road to recovery.

At the time of the accident, Mrs. Keath was walking across the street at Delaware Water Gap within a half block of her home. The car which struck her passed over her with the result that Mrs. Keath became wedged beneath the machine.

Firemen finally were summoned to extricate her from beneath the car. At the East Stroudsburg hospital it was found that she was suffering from a fracture of the pelvic bone and had sustained numerous bruises and contusions of the face, arms and body.

Mr. and Mrs. Keath lived here for many years, moving to Delaware Water Gap several years ago.

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## Editorially

### Better Fire Alarms

Now that the Telephone Company no longer will give out information regarding fires, it seems about time we figured out some system of signals with the present fire siren.

We don't criticize the telephone company for we suppose they still are short of help and that the flood of calls after the fire siren blows is enough to clog up the works. But at the same time, this does work an added hardship upon the volunteer anxious to get to the scene of the blaze as quickly as he can.

Without being given any signal he must drive in to the center of the borough, stop at the firehouse and find out where the fire is, then turn around and start for the fire.

This could be eliminated if we even had as few as five or six signals on the siren. Signals, for example, for the north end, the south end, the east end, out-of-town west of the borough, north or east of the borough.

Other communities have worked out such systems although in one or two instances they have gotten the signals so complicated that they are practically useless. Keep them as few as possible and as simple as possible and they ought to be an improvement over the present system.

### Health Reports

Public health is about as important as any public function and we feel borough council is not out-of-step in insisting that periodic health reports be submitted to them. How else can the public rest assured that they and their families are receiving the protection desired?

Matters of this kind are never hampered by publicity. In fact we have seen situations where the fear of epidemics was almost as bad as the epidemic itself.

The functions of our health officer and the board of health should, in fact, be given the widest of publicity in order that the public can acquaint itself with the work of this group. In that manner the public can more easily report to health authorities instances of menaces to the public health.

And if you think there are not threats to public health being tolerated in Lititz, you had better begin looking around at the smelly outhouses, the filthy chicken coops and the piles of garbage with their accompaniment of germ-bearing rats.

One member of the board of health tells us that the cause of public health here is hampered by the fact that the borough ordinances are to a great extent old and obsolete. If that is the case let the Board of Health members come forward and petition council to re-vamp the health laws.

We'll bet our bottom dollar that any such petition they may see fit to present the borough fathers will be acted upon - and pronto. Public health is just one subject not to be taken lightly.

**What We Know of God**  
Lesson for January 11, 1948

THE Scripture for Sunday's lesson is Isaiah 40:28-31, Matthew 6:9, John 14:8-14, and Acts 17:22-31, with Psalm 33 as the devotional reading.



**Dr. Newton**  
"Hast thou not known? Hast thou not heard, that the everlasting God, the Lord, the Creator of the ends of the earth, fainteth not, neither is weary? There is no searching of his understanding. He giveth power to the faint, and to them that have no might he increaseth strength. . . . They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint."  
That is the passage from Isaiah. What a promise! In this hour when men are bending beneath the burden of a war-weary world, how it gives lift to one's soul to contemplate the words of this great and blessed promise.

**God Our Maker**  
"HE GIVES to all men life and breath and everything." Acts 17:25. One of our daily prayers should be to thank God that he has set us open eyes to the beauty of another dawn. We must not take it for granted. It is the goodness and mercy of God that permits us to open our eyes, to breathe, to have food, to think. He gives us life and breath and everything.

He causes the sun to shine and the tides to ebb and flow. He causes the rain to fall and the winds to bear their blessings. He holds the earth in his course. God is the maker of every good thing.

**And He Is Our Father**  
NOT only is God the Creator and Sustainer of the physical universe; but he is also our Father. He knows us each by name. He cares for the sparrows, simply because they are sparrows. He cares for us because we are his children, made in his image, capable of fellowship with him. The end of man, as the Catechism clearly teaches, is to enjoy God and glorify him forever.

Read again the passage that describes Paul's visit to Athens, and how he observed that the people, though quite intelligent, were worshipping many different gods. Paul summoned them to worship the one true and living God.  
When we acknowledge God as Maker and Father, we are then enabled to serve him in conscious assurance of his love and care for us as his adopted children.

**Show Us the Father**  
READ again John 14:8-14, and R join with Philip in the prayer, "Show us the Father." Jesus answered Philip, saying, "He that hath seen me hath seen the Father." We come to know God as Father through Jesus Christ, and only through Jesus Christ.

Jesus goes on to say to Philip, "If ye shall ask anything in my name, I will do it." The greatest need of our day and generation is a fresh understanding of God, his nature and his will. We can know him through Jesus Christ. And we come to know him through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Enoch walked with God. Abraham was the friend of God. David was a man after God's own heart. And Jesus came to perfectly reveal the Father. The determining factor in knowing God as Father is our willingness to believe in the Lord Jesus Christ.

**Belief in God Today**  
THE Bible is a Book for today—any day, every day. It reveals the purpose of creation, both of the universe and man himself. It reveals the loving concern of God for every soul. It portrays his forbearing and his mercy and his exceeding kindness, even to sinful men and women who reject his love.

Best of all, the Bible tells us the sweetest story ever told—the story of how God gave his only begotten Son that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have everlasting life.  
Religion, the Christian religion, is the most practical proposition in the world. Every man is constantly in reach of God, if only he will believe on the Lord Jesus Christ. God is yonder in the loneliest watchtower of the timberlands. He is yonder on the storm-tossed ship at sea. He is everywhere, waiting to own and bless any and all who will come to him through Jesus Christ.

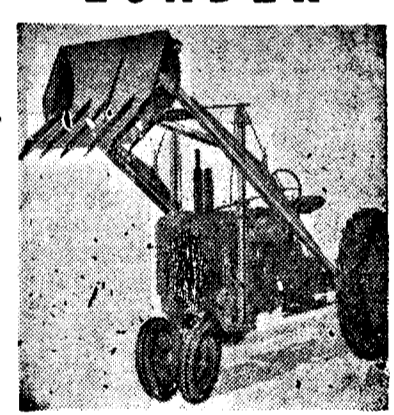

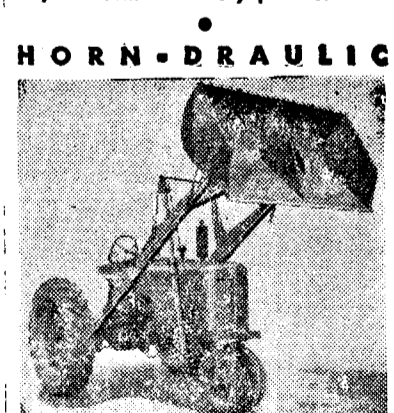

the Horse-Shoe Trail crosses the Saegeloch Creek. A remnant of this dam-breach is there today. At the end of the war a number of the Hessians settled about here and their descendants now live in the neighborhood.

The charcoal fuel for the furnaces was made by colliers in charcoal pits—circular stacks of cord wood, covered with earth, which were kept smouldering for several days until properly charred. The remnants of these pits, usually resembling small circulations, and always retaining their charcoal blackened floors, are still to be found along the Horse-Shoe Trail throughout the Furnace Hills.

About half a mile west of the Cannon Hill Hostel, the Fox Road and the Horse-Shoe Trail, and running into Cannon Hill, is Nigger Hollow, named for the unmarked graves of slaves who had been employed as colliers or furnacemen by the local iron-masters.
